

C. 311. John F. Caswell

October 3.

This is a claim to land in Hamakua Co. East Maui called Ulumatu.

Charles Pocket sworn. I know Mr. Caswell's land on Maui in the district of Hamakua called Ulumatu. I do not know the bounds of it.

When Caswell received this land I was working for Gov. Hoapili. I did a great deal of work for the King at that time. I then told Hoapili that I was to work for none but himself unless I was paid for it. I fixed about twenty muskets for the King, and took them up at his house and asked payment. He said "I have given you a large sum at Hamakua." John Stevens, Kinimaka and others were present. They spoke up, and said No, you have given that land to Freeman (claim). They said "Charles has only two lands from Hoapili." The King then said to me: Oh I did not know you had parted. For we had before worked together in the Blacksmithing business. The King then said, "Let that go then if I get any more work done, I will pay you."

After that I did a great deal more work for him and he gave me an order for Cattle on his headman at Whakahu, which was paid.

The land referred to by the King, as having been given to Freeman Caswell, was Ulumatu, the land now claimed. This was in 1838. Caswell has ever since lived upon it in peace, cultivating it and sawing lumber &c. I never heard of his having been disturbed. nor do I know the quantity of land in this place.

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C. 75. Charles Cocket Jr. P. 132. V. 1 October 3

J. J. Caswell. sworn. I know the lands Makinahina and Niwula, claimed by Cocket on Maui. We worked together as Blacksmiths, in 1837 and in Autumn of that Year Hoapili Kane, gave these lands to Cocket, who took possession of them. Hoolulu, Hoapili's head man, met me in the road, and asked where Cocket lives, and said, he must go and look at his lands - he said they were for Charles, and not for me. I told Cocket of this conversation, and he then took possession of the lands, and held them quietly until 1846; when Namaanu came up, and took away Niwula; and Pahi appropriated Makinahina to himself. I know nothing about the lands, since Namaanu on behalf of Netuanaoa, and Pahi took them

C. 1116. Kaiwoe - Counter 566. J. Mitchenis
See 566 Oct 26

Claimant is Wife of John Mitchenis.

Namaikahialepu sworn. I know this land, it is in the ili of Papaa - Waititi - consisting of a house lot with 5 houses on it; formerly occupied by John Mitchenis: bounded Mauiha by Waititi road; Waialae by Naulio Ramoa's; Maikai by Kealoha's; Konoitu by Keaka's.

Claimant had this land from Kiniau when Mitchenis her husband was in England about 1835. She begged this place from Kiniau for her own land. Mitchenis had a small piece of land at Waititi, near this, given him by the King before he went, and he

left this with Claimant, when he came back he lived with her, and built 4 houses on the land, and Claimant built the 5th house on it: he lived with her when he was ~~at~~ away from home. Claimant has lived on or near this land ever since she had it from Hiniau. Mitcheni sailed to California or elsewhere in 1827 and I heard left his wife nothing to live on - I understand the property is now in possession of Parker Janion & Co.

Dec 24. 1850. Claimant gave up her separate claim to a part of her husband's before Mr. Si & Mr. Robertson this day on the lot.

C. 1386. Ainoa

Oct: 6.

Kaukau sworn. This land is in the iti of Niuhukahi Waititi: it is in one piece of 3 Walo patches.

Bounded Mauka and Waialae by My Land; Makai by Kekuanaoa's - "Kalia" - Honolulu by Kawainoa's.

Claimant has a house in another place but not a lot.

I gave him this land being Konohiki of it under the King - in about 1828. Kaahimanui's time, and he has ever since held it undisputed.

C. 1387. Kawahoe

Kauwai sworn. This land is in the iti of Walu a hole. Waititi: Kula and Walo.

1 Walo Land: bounded Mauka by Kuatui's; Waialae by Kawai's with a stream between; Makai by My Land; Honolulu by Kawai's.

2 Walo Land - 4 patches - Mauka is Kawai's; Waialae Kealiielele's; Makai My Land; Honolulu Kawai's.

3 Small Yard and house on the Sea beach.

Claimant had these lands from me in time of

Waiatae is Kaiheawai's, Makai Pahu, Honolulu is Puipui's.

3. Auwai Kalo - Mautra is Umi's; Waiatae Kalaawai's, Makai Pahu's, Honolulu Umi's.

Claimant has these lands from Kaahumoku and has ever since held them undisputed. He is a sick man and does no poahina work which he would be liable for if well. Kekuanaoa is present Konoheke of this district.

Pule sworn. This land is in ili of Maiputu Kahi. Consisting of 19 Kalo patches and some tucka with 2 houses in one lot. Mautra is Kaunuuoa's lands, Honolulu John Meete or Kahi stream between; Makai Puunoni's, Ewa Kaunuuoa's.

Claimant has this land from W^m Beckley or rather her husband "Uti" in 1832 when wild lands. he dug it and made these Kalo patches, and dying in 1841 left it to Claimant. When Uti died he left every thing to her - they have always lived on the land in peace. Akia is Konoheke of the land - she is W^m Beckley's mother. Claimant has a husband named Kaihuoe or now living with her - she does poahina work.

C. 1391. Paelua

Oct 16

Umi sworn. This land is in the ili of Kalaipohaku - Palama - one lot of 6 Kalo patches; Mautra is lands of Nalauwai. Honolulu Kahi's; Makai Nalauwai Ewa also. Palahiko gave Claimant this land in 1844. and he has lived on it ever since in peace -

C. 1392 Waipuaeoe

Oct. 6

Umi sworn This land is in the iti of Neakua Palau.

Kaliki - Consisting of

- 1 a lot of 5 Kalo Patches - and some Kula Land having one house on it - Mauka is Land of Huea's; Honolulu "Kaloaloua"; Kaunukhua's; Makai and Ewa is Kaunukhua's.
- 2 Upland on Mountain side - planted with potatoes - here and there - Mauka is A. Adams; the other 3 sides Kaunukhua's.
- 3 Upland of a similar kind - surrounded by Kaunukhua's.

Claimant had these lands from Palupalu who had them from Kaunukhua - When Palupalu died they went to his widow - Aki - when she died they went to Uma, when Uma gave them to Claimt. Palupalu had them in time of T. D. Ke and Claimt. has charge of them ever since; he is a son of the land. I know of no Countess Claimant. Uma is sick - and puts in no claim to them to my knowledge.

Palau sworn This land is in the di of Kalia in Palama - in several pieces.

- 1 House lot in Honolulu - Mauka is Liniakuni's 4th; Waititi by Nakhoo; Makai is Hewa; Ewa is Mumeutu's (another man from C^t) This land is

partly fence. There are 3 houses on it. one is Claimant's, 1 Hali's, and the other Pineo's.

2. Kalo Land. Consisting of 2 Kalo patches and an awai - bounded Mauka by my lands, Honolulu by Kawelo's, Makai by Umacama's, Ewa by Puahini's.

3. One Kalo patch - Mauka is Kauliokamoa's land, Honolulu is Puahini's, Makai is Kudo's, Ewa is Nahini's.

4. One Kalo patch and part of an awai - Mauka is the Honolulu is Kauliokamoa's, Makai is Keawe's, Ewa is Ahualua's.

Claimant had the first lot in Honolulu from Kalamaina, Konoheki of Honolulu, who was living at the Fort; and has retained it undisputed to the present time. Claimant had the other 3 lots from Puahini, Konoheki under Kekuanaoa. in time of Kinau and they have never been disputed.

Hali sworn, and confirmed the preceding testimony; he owned a house as stated in the first lot but not the land.

C. 923.

Wm Blossom Wilson.

Oct. 9

Kapu sworn. I know this place. it is in Honolulu. a house lot fence. it has two houses - one wood and one grass, belonging to Claimant. he lives there.

Mauka is Hotel Street. Makai is yard of Kaailauala, Waititi is Kaupo's, Ewa John Meek's.

Claimant had this place from the King about 1826. it was given to him in friendship, and he has held it, as far as I know, without dispute.

Pawai sworn. This place is in Kalia. it is of Mokauea.

in 4 pieces.

- 1 House lot. Fenced and C^t has 1 house on it. Mauka is Kekuanaoa's land; Honolulu also; Makai and Ewa.
- 2 Kala land - of 5 patches and some Kula - Mauka is Kaloa's; Honolulu is my land; Makai Keaveamahi's; Ewa is Kahi's stream.
- 3 Two Kala patches - Mauka is Kaunukohua's; Honolulu is Ohule's; Makai is Umai's; Ewa is Pao's.
- 4 One Kala patch - Mauka is Nawaakaua; Honolulu is Ahis; an auwai between; Makai and Ewa is Pao's.

Claimant had these lots from me in time of Hinaiu. I was friend of Palupalu, Honolulu under Kaunukohua who owns the land, and he gave me these places when waste, & on condition of cultivating them I gave them to him; which he has done, and he has ever held them undisputed to this time.

Umi sworn. I know this place - it is in Honolulu - and in one piece of 3 Kala patches and an auwai.

Mauka is Kamei'kahuli'pua; Waititi is Kalaiokeho's; Makai is Kakuimokis; Ewa is Tradebastineo's.

Claimant had this lot from Kamei'kahuli'pua in time of Hinaiu, and has held it undisputed until the present time.

Ewa sworn - I know this place and that the testimony above given is true.

C. 1385. Kaelemakute

Oct 9

Nokomo sworn. This place is in Aiaupai - Waititi

- it is Kalo land consisting of
- 1 House lot - fenced and C^t owns one house on it - bounded Mauka by Kapule's land, Waiatae also; Makai by Sea; Honolulu by Kuapala's.
 - 2 One Kalo patch - Mauka is Kapule's; Waiatae is Nuuanu's; Makai is Nu's; Honolulu is Opupaho's.
 - 1 One Crow of Kalo in a large patch - which is bounded as a whole Mauka by Palupatu, Waiatae by Pahi's (teacher), Makai by Kukeali'eau's, Honolulu by Kana'i (Land). Claimant had these lots from Kamaukule in time of Kaapumanu I. Kamaukule was and is Honohiki under Kōhinau who owns the land and has been held undisputed to the present time.

C. 1296. Parao.

Mana-sworn. This land is in iti of Puiki Palama consisting of

- 1 House lot - with 2 houses of Cain's - unfenced - Mauka is Nuuanu's land; Waititi Kaholo's; Makai R.D. Savies; Ewa by Kehuanaoa's land.
- 2 Six Kalo patches + 2 Auwais - Mauka is Nuuanu's land; Waititi Kaholo's; Makai R.D. Savies; Ewa is Kehuanaoa's.

(The above described places proved to be one lot)

Claimant had this land from Kuauaku in about 1846. he is living at Lihue - he had it from Nuuanu in time of Kinau - they have neither been disturbed in their possession of it to the present time. Nuuanu is the Honohiki under the King.

C. 79 Napehe. W. (counter 923) p. 7 Oct 11

Kamakouha swom - I know this place in dispute: it is in Honolulu - a house lot - Maurais Hotel St. Nailiki, Kauhola's, Makai Kaaitauhala's, Eva John Meeke's.

This place has long been in dispute - it was so between Kaaitauhala and Punahole, husband of Claimant. I was sent by the King in 1827 to settle it. I investigated the adverse rights, and finding Punahole had the best right to this land I gave it to him. After my decision, he held this lot in peace until his death in 1845. His wife Napehe Ct. was with him when he died on Maui. I was present and heard his will when he made it, after ancient custom. He sent for me in prospect of his death. He then said "I am about to die and I wish to make my will. I wish my lot at Honolulu (that in dispute), my land on Maui, and all my lands on the other Islands, to go to my wife. She is to have all of my property." I then went home and wrote this will on paper, and handed it to the King according to the law. Claimant came to Honolulu after Punahole's death, and soon married again. The new husband's name was Kahonu. Her people lived on this place; and she and Kahonu went there to live.

Kauiokamoa swom I know this land - it was willed to Claimant by Punahole her husband, when he died at Maui. After his death, Claimant's people lived on it. How and when and for what reason, this land was taken away by the King & given to Blossom, I do not know.
 Claimant Napehe. "When I married Kahonu,

he greatly abused me, which I bore as long as I could, but then I left him, and went to my old place. Nahoua followed me; and being determined to leave him or get clear of him in some way, I clandestinely took another man to sleep with me; and upon this the King divorced me, and took away my lands. He took this house and gave it to Blossom, this was his arbitrary act.

C. 1207. Kaeina

Oct 11.

Nihopu swain - This land is in the iti of Hamokuaahi Waititi. it consists of 2 pieces.

1 House lot not entirely fenced - Mauka is land of Nekuanao's, Waiatae Kai'keke's, Makai my lands, Honolulu Kaele's - there are two houses on it.

Claimant took it up waste, and has held it in peace since the time of Kaakumanu 1.

2 One kalo patch - Mauka is Kuluwaidheua's, Waiatae Kahakae's, Makai Omalo's, Honolulu, Kuluwaidheua from whom he received this land before 1839, and has held it ever since in peace. Being sick he does no poakua work.

C. 1208. Kawa I

Kalaweecha swain - This land is in Heawamuku, Waititi, Oahu. in two lots.

1 House lot in Heawamuku, Mauka is Kaluawahinemui's Makai and Honolulu also, Waiatae is my house lot; it is fenced and has one house on it.

2 Kalo land in Hamokuaahi - 2 patches. Mauka is Kahakelulikulis, Waiatae, Kaipua's, Makai, Kahko's Honolulu, my lands. I gave Claimant these lands.

as Nonohiki in time of Kaahumanu I and he has held them in peace - he does Friday work.

Neolaloe gave these lands to Claimant in time of Kaahumanu I and he has held them in peace ever since. Neolaloe is Nonohiki under the King - he does poahina.

Claimant had this land from Kuluwaitehua in about 1839 - and has ever since held it undisputed. He did not, but now does poahina.

Ance sworn - I know this land in Kamohu, Waititi, in two lots of Malo land.

Claimant has 3 houses on it; and it is partly fenced.

2 Kato land 1 patch. Mauka is Kaaha's; Waiatae Kamuti's; Mahai Kuluwaitikua's; Honolulu, Makoe's.

Claimant had these lands from Kaaha about 1839 in time of Ninau, and has ever since held them in peace. Kaaha is his Konohiki and he does poalima work.

He has ever since the gift held it undisputed.

Claimant had this land from Kapoo, his elder Sister deceased. She willed it to him in 1834, & he has exercised the ownership of it ever since in undisturbed peace, allowing those living on it to live there during his pleasure. Some of them were living there in 1842, but whether they have lived there before and ever since 1839 I do not know (See Ct. 1230)

I know this place. it is a house lot in Honolulu

occupied by Naaipuaa. Mauhā is Merchant Street. Waitiki is Konokaupū's lot; Mahai Water Street; Ewa land included in Cl. 159. It is fenced, and has 4 or more houses on it, occupied by Naaipuaa and his Comp.

Claimant had this land from Kinau. It was formerly an old play ground, and Kinau took it up and held it until her death, when it came into the hands of Claimant. Naaipuaa, Valuationmū, and others live on the land during Kekuanaoa's pleasure. Victoria is the true Claimant. I know of no Counter Claimant.

No 161.

I know this lot. It is in Honolulu - occupied by Naweiki. It is fenced and bounded Mauhā by Merchant St. Waitiki by land occupied by Umi, Kamakele, and Keolali. Mahai by Water St. Ewa by Naaipuaa's lot.

Claimant had this land from Kinau who took it up as waste land long before 1829 - Upon her death it came to Claimant as Victoria's Guardian.

I know this place - it is in Honolulu
Nekuanaoa stated he had sold this Place to Rauis

Lot's people now live on the land - I do not know their names.

This place is in Honolulu - formerly occupied by Dr. Pickett, and now by G. W. Punchard.

Mauka is W. French's, Waititi Mr. Hoopers, Makai Hotel St. Ewa New Theatre lot.

Claimant had this lot from Kinopu, who willed it to him at his death about 1810. and who had owned it long before 1839 - Claimant has ever since held it in peace - it is his own land - I know of no contestor.

N^o 182. Pa. Wahinealii.

This place I know - it is in Honolulu - Mauka is Water St. Waititi Nachus; Makai, Kinimaka's; Ewa Ulu aloha's. Claimant had it from Wahinealii a chief - to hold for Victoria in 1814. Wahinealii now lives there, and had possessed it in peace from time of Kamehameha I.

N^o 183

This place is in Honolulu, between Merchant and

Broadway. Mauka is Broadway, Waititi Kealahas, Mahai Merchant St. Ewa, cross St. It is occupied by Koiamai and Keahamahi.

Claimant had this from Koiamai and Keahamahi in 1840. They gave it to Victoria, and Claimant holds it for her, and has held in peace, they living under the ^{ever since} Wetuanawa. I know no Counter Claimant.

N^o 181.

This place I know - it is a small piece in Honolulu; bounded Mauka by Broadway St. Waititi by Keitimaui, Mahai by Merchant St. Ewa by Richards St.

Claimant took this up as vacant land, long before the Deeds were made, which made afterwards much injury to this lot. He has always occupied it in peace, and it is his own land. I think he has leased it to a black man named Jack. There is no Counter Cl^t.

C. 218. Joseph Thomas Oct. 20.

Wetuanawa sworn. I know Claimant, and the land he claims. It is in Waialeale, Oahu, and is in the ili of Iki-mau. I know him first in 1830. Since which he has cultivated it ever since with Kats principally. He has occupied the land ever since I knew him in undisturbed peace. I am not acquainted enough with it to give the boundaries; but I should think Mr. Metcalf's Survey of it is correct. I know of no Counter Cl^t to it. Claimant had it from a Chief - Neaumoku, younger brother

of Naahumani. I do not know he ever paid any thing for this land, but I believe he lives there just the same as any other man. I know of no land owned by him but this cultivated one, surveyed. (Claimant said the Governor did not know of his Valley land.)

A Paka sworn. I first knew Claimant when I went with the King round the Island. about 1822. He was then living on this cultivated land. I went that way again in 1827 and he was still there, and has ever since lived there in peace, as far as I know. I do not know the boundaries of the land, but should think from the aspect of Mr. Metcalfs Survey that it was correct.

Claimant had it from Heaumotte as Nekuanaoo states. He was Claimants Lord. I know of no Countess Claimant in it. Claimant has had it without dispute, as far as I know. I know nothing of Kaliaoas claim. J. Thomas stated that Kaliaoas had occupied a small piece of it about 5 years. he did ^{not} wish to quarrel about it and relinquished his claim to it. He was willing for him to retain it. he himself had sufficient land without it.

Louis Gravies sworn I know Claimant has occupied the land in Waialua, called Ihimani, for twenty years, and cultivated it. I saw Mr. Metcalf make the Survey of this land, and think the boundaries given in it are correct. I have always Claimant had this land from Heaumotte as stated. I know nothing about any other land owned by him (Mr. Thomas). He has occupied some other land in a Valley in the district of Mauanie, but I cannot say what his right is to it. He has pastured goats in it, I believe in common with others, and not appropriating it exclusively to his own use. The valley is not fenced, but is a common for general use of those residing thereabouts.

Mr. Thomas stated that he paid something for this land to Keaumoku, but he could not prove of it; and that he would take an award for the Cultivated lands, and let that in the Valley remain, without asking an award for it: he made no claim to the valley as an absolute right. and he presumed he would be permitted as before, ^{his property in it.} to pasture.

Cl. 82. J. Phillips Cont. from P. 233. 72.

Lahaina Nov 11 - 1848.

J. Phillips - his wife - W. Humphreys and others present.
 W^m Humphreys sworn Interpreter for N. witnesses.
 P. Kaenacena sworn on the part of Phillips. "I know the lands Polanui and Kauniopoko, in Lahaina. The first is owned by Hanaina, and the latter by the Carpenter Phillips. I recollect a dispute between Phillips and Makaania - Hanaina's head-man - in reference to the boundary line between Polanui and Kauniopoko. This dispute was of some standing. I first heard of it in 1840, and it continued to 1841 - when I went to the ground to settle the difficulty - in 1841. I was then Luna Aukau of this district. Hanaina's man claimed that the boundary line was on the Olowatu side of where Phillips occupied - and Phillips claimed that it was on the Lahaina side of where he occupied. They could not agree - and I told them, that where they could not agree - it was with the Luna aukau to fix the division line. It was left with me by the Parties to settle - I gave no heed to what either party said, but fixed the line from a point about midway between the two lines claimed by the Parties: in the center of a certain bogpen, to run direct to an old grave yard by the Sea side. This line was then agreed upon by both Parties, and I did nothing further.

I went with Mr. Metcalf when he made the Survey of Mr. Phillips lands - "Lauropoko". I went to paint out the bounds of the land at Mr. Phillips request, and Mr. Metcalf surveyed it according to the boundary line I fixed, and which was agreed upon by the Parties in 1841: that is - the Compass was sighted and the chain was carried from the Center to the Grave Yard at the sea side to the hog-pen inland. This Survey was made according to Phillips direction, who was there on the ground. He found no fault, but the chain was run as he desired: right straight from the Grave Yard up to the hog-pen -

Thomas Phillips sworn for Claimant. I have never seen the land of Caswell - but I remember 7 or 8 years ago, he went with me to the King; and asked him for a land; and the King, who always said "Yes"; when asked for a land, said to Caswell "Yes; you may have a land; Go and look out a land that you are certain belongs to me, and you shall have it. I went again with Caswell to the King, and he said "Yes, Imamuti"; and this was all we could get out of him. Namauu was present and said, I am ashamed to have this man Caswell constantly running to the King for a land; for you know he always will say "Yes"; and in this way he is greatly vexed and guilty of wrong, because he cannot refuse a man, though he would like to do so. Therefore

Namauu said, let him do so no more, and I will give him one of my lands. He mentioned two lands of the same name that he had in Kamathua, and said to Caswell, he might have one of them. I do not remember the name of these lands, and do not know which one he took. This is all I know about Caswells lands.

George Lawrence sworn for C. I know the land of Caswell in Kamathua, on Mirei. It is called Kulu-malo. I heard he had this land from Namauu, he took possession of it, to the best of my recollection 8 or 9 years ago, and has lived there ever since. I cannot give the boundaries of this land: it is in part occupied by Natives, but I cannot say how many. I do not know whether there is any Counter Claimant to this land; I have not heard his title disputed.

William New sworn for C. I cannot say that I know the land of Caswell in Kamathua, but I know he has been living on a land in Kamathua I should say 10 years, to the best of my recollection. I do not know how he got it except from himself, who told me that Namauu was the Kings steward and had given him a land. Resumed p. 381

C. 123. Robert Read

Nov '27

Stephen Grant sworn for C. I know the house lot of Robert Read in Pahaina - it is on the mauka side of Main St. bounded mauka by land of Imiwala, Olowatu side by Isaac Hoare bottles; on sea side by Main St. and on Hanipali side by land of Isaac Lewis. It is fenced and has two houses on it. Claimant had this land from

the King, who gave it to him 8 or 9 years ago, I cannot say exactly when. He has had peaceable possession of the same up to the last April, when he died. It is now in the possession of his Son, Stephen Peas. I know of no Counter Claim to this land.

William Ap. Jones sworn for Ct. I am well acquainted with the lot of Robert Peas in Kahainoa - it is bounded as described by Mr. P. Grant in his testimony this day given. The King gave Claimant this land about 8 Years ago, and he occupied the same in peace up to the time of his death in April last. I never heard his title disputed, and the land, since his death, has been held by his Son and only Child, Stephen Peas, I cannot give the exact time when the land was given to Mr. Peas.

Mahio sworn for Ct. I know the lands of Mr. Grant, they are called Pakea and Pakea, they are situated in Woolau on the Island of Maui. I cannot give their exact bounds, but I could point them out in part. I know Claimant got these lands of Kihia a petty Chief, when Hoapili-hane was Governor of this Island, and when Waauwai was Kunaehau of that district about 1839. They were a mere Gift to Mr. Grant according to the Custom of the Country, and there was nothing paid for the lands. Mr. Grant has had quiet and peaceable possession of them from the time of the Gift down to this day; and I know of no Counter Claimant. I have always lived on the land since Mr. Grant came to their possession.

C. 207. John Shaw

William Humphreys sworn for C! I know the house-lot of John Shaw situated in Pahaina Is. of Maui, on the inland side of the Main Pt. of Pahaina.

I cannot give the boundaries of this lot; it is fenced, and the fence is the correct boundary.

Claimant got this land from a Native called Waikia, and he built upon the same, and has occupied it in peace and quiet for the last 11 Years. I never heard his title disputed.

Michael J. Nowlien sworn for C! I know the House lot of John Shaw in Pahaina - it is bounded Mauka by Thomas Huntley's land - Olewale side by Keau's; Sea side by Main Pt. Hanipali side by land occupied by Ayoung a Chinaman.

He had it from a man called Waikia, who gave it to him - and Shaw built upon, and has occupied the same in peace for more than 10 Years. I never knew of any Counter Claim to it. Waikia has frequently told me that he had given this land to John Shaw

C. 963. John Richards from Page 121 W Nov '27.

Stephen Grant sworn for C! I know the House lot of John Richards situated in Pahaina; it is bounded on the Mauka by what is called the "Back road", on the Olewale side by Keraunohi's land, on the sea side by a Nalo patch dividing it from the premises now occupied by J. J. Holstead, and on the Hanipali side by land occupied by the natives of Naes.

Richards obtained this land by purchase from

Kalaikoa, the father of Koro chu (Chief) about the Year 1839. I know he paid him some money; I cannot say the exact sum; and he likewise did considerable work for him. He took possession of the land & lived on it - for about 2 Years, when he went to the other side of the Island; and the place was then taken away from him by Tiekauonohi, other people; and it has been kept from him ever since.

George Lawrence sworn for A! I know the land of John Richards. it is situated in the town of Pahaina, and bounded as described by Mr Grant in his testimony this day given.

The Claimant had this land from Kalaikoa, he paid him some money for it; and also did some work for him. I cannot state the amount of the money which Richards paid for this land. He built a house on it, and lived in it about 2 Years, and then went to the other side of the Island; when some persons took the lot, and pulled his house down; and he has been kept out of the possession of the same ever since. Claimant procured this lot as I have stated, just after I came here from Hawaii. I think in the Year 1839.

Aniani was a man of Authority, having some charge of the Kings lands, and I suppose he gave Aiyong this in consequence. This lot forms part of the Enclosure known as D^r. Woods dwelling house lot, and is situated in Honolulu.

I have heard he received this lot from Kam-chameha for services. I only know it from hearsay of Cap. Adams and P. Anderson.

John Heddles. solemnly affirmed that he knows the lot. I know Anderson was living on it in 1822 or 1823 and he possessed the same in peace up to the time of his death in 1844 or 1845. I do not know how he acquired his title. I have been on the Island 10 years Anderson was a sail maker.

The above land is described in the application upon stamp above referred to as "forming the rear part of the house lot now occupied by me as a place of Residence; which piece of land is more particularly described in the accompanying Survey made by J. Metcalf. I beg to petition the King in Privy Council, through Your Highness, for a fee simple title to the same, in order that I may hold the same to my Hawaiian heirs & assigns for ever;" and constitutes Part 1 under the above number.

C. 2012. James Riddocks. March 19

Pauahi Sworn. I know this place. it is called Paimi in Honolulu aina. it is not the whole of Paimi. - consisting of Kula and Walo Land in one piece - I saw the land delivered to Riddocks by Mate for Wekahuohi. On Mauka is the land of Waihauka - Waikiki J. Booth - Makai Kalauka. Ewa by Poha - Wekahuohi owned the lot.

This land was delivered to Claimant in my presence by Mate for Wekahuohi. he said "here is your land" - after they had traversed the bounds as above described. Riddocks immediately built a house upon it and lived there a number of years. until after the death of Keoua. and cultivated the upland. When the new Road was made it cut through this land. leaving the greatest portion of it on the Waitea side.

I know Claimant lived on it without dispute till after the Road was made when he gave permission to Kahakiki (Thunder) to reside on it. and build a house. which he did - Kahakiki wanted it as a better place for a house. the land occupied Mauka and Makai by Waihauka and Kalauka was owned by Kahakiki. and he approved the transfer of the lot in question to Riddocks. and made no objection at the time of delivery. I heard Kahakiki say to Claimant - "I only want a house location a little time the land is yours still" - I do not know of any after acknowledgements of tenancy by any payments made to Riddocks by him.

In about 1823. C. Kanaiwa drove Claimant off the land - I do not know of any cause being

alleged for the order to quit the land - He did not go - but
 appealed to the P. Consul - he held it on till 1827 - when he
 gave it up to Pahi's people, upon the demand of Naula
 who has held it ever since - the land has not been planted -
 Andrew Auld sworn. Confirmed the above testimony as

Mc Lee's Case

John J. sworn for Ct. I am well acquainted with
 "Punahou" and its Boundaries - It consists of two parts -
 one inland and the other a sea land - It is bounded
 Mauka by the large land called "Manoa" - Waialae
 by Mauna Pohaku - Makai by Nui'a land of
 Allen - Kapeau, myself & others. I think it extends
 nearly down to the Road leading from Koonolulu past
 Allen's place Koonolulu side by the Road leading from
 the old Allen place to Manoa and by my lands.

The Makai part of Punahou is bounded
 Mauka by "Kewala" and "Kouka" - Waistiti side
 by "Kalia" - seaward it extends out to where the
 surf breaks - Koonolulu side by Koonolulu.

This land was given to Mr. Bingham for the
 Sandwich Island Mission by Gov. Boki
 in 1829 - It was given upon the same terms as all
 their other lands were given to them, and the Grant
 was confirmed, so far as silence proved it, for in
 truth she had no right to set aside this grant -
 From that time to this the P. J. Mission have

been the only Possessors and Nonohiki's of the Land. I was a witness to the Gift - the title of the Mission is perfectly Clear.

The name of the Maikai part is Kukuluaes. There are several tenants on the land of Punahou whose rights should be respected.

L. Kaauloai sworn. I know this land - I heard Poki say to Hoapili Kane concerning the Gift of this land to S. S. Mission that he had given it to Mr Pingham.

Poki's wife made some objections to giving it to Mr Pingham claiming it as hers as received from her Father Hoapili Kane - but Hoapili Kane confirmed the Gift and it was adjudged to be right & proper.

From what I heard at the time of the Boundaries, I should think Mr Metcalf's Survey Correct.

Cc N^o 213 Kaui and N^o 3028 Kaui for Wahineins

Claimants are Brothers -

John Li sworn. I know of the land of Kaui and Wahineins - it is in Punahou; and that they have lived on it since about 1831.

They formerly lived on that part of Punahou inside of of the wall - but when that was built they moved outside, and continued to live there ever since - this joint land of the two Brothers is fenced - which is the correct boundary -

Kaui who appeared for himself & Brother said they desired the land to be awarded to them jointly as tenants in common.

Kamahā. I know this lot, and the Claimant ever since 1824. He has no claim to the West side of the Road - the part on the Ewa side as described and bounded in the Survey of Kalanika-hua is the land now claimed by Puhalahua.

I know he commenced living on this place in 1824 or rather Mahune as his representative who was his ~~agent~~ ^{brother}. Claimant had his right from Kekuipiohi and her husband - its foundation is that the Claimant & his Brother were people belonging to the King - and Kekuipiohi owned land at Maui and went there with her husband to live in 1821. I do not know how long they were away. I do not know whether they abandoned the place - or whether they left any one in it in charge. I do not know of Kekuipiohi ever having given this place to Claimant. I do not know of Mahunes acting as agent, or in what capacity he acted in relation to Kekuipiohi - I only know they all lived together intimately.

Kamahā sworn. The claim of Puhalahua is founded on Mahunes right. I do not know what that right was. I only know they all lived together - and Puhala with them in one place - and afterwards it was divided off into separate places.

Resumed 1-123

C. 10800B. Mataopue

Claimant stated that he had sent by some one a claim to this land in union with his Brother Puhalahua and that his claim was the same as to basis and Evidence.

Kalehu sworn - I know this place - and that it belonged to Puhina formerly from whom Kekupushi & her husband derived it.

I know that Roar Makune was stationed on this place by Kekupushi - and that he acted there for her and not for himself. I never heard that Makune when dying or before if ever laid any claim to it - nor that Puhakua and Malaspu ever did - I have always heard that Kekupushi has occupied and owned the place -

When she went to Maui she left Makune as her agent - and she was backward & forward often - From 1832 to 1834 Makune was a student at Lahaina Luna - and he then left his two Brothers in charge when he left Honolulu. The lot sold out of this land a few years ago to Mr. Makae was sold without Kekupushi's knowledge - but was part of her land. I consider the right of title to this place to belong to Kekupushi.

Wai'ale'ale sworn - Confirmed the preceding testimony and had nothing new to add to it.

Mahony's wife Nake, and her ancestors have had possession of this land from about the time that Kuakini was Governor of Oahu - (about 1830) Mahony and his wife have had the care of this land about 11 years. I and four others live on it. Their names are Ku, Keakalei, Katala and Kane.

Nake is Konoitiki of the land. There was a counter claimant to it named Nehekaopio. Mahony's wife has paid the taxes for C.

C. N^o 608 Paaluki From above. 11 April
 Claim of John Pitiroi as agent for the King claims 1 Kalo patch as belonging to the King out of the Ili or Mro

of land claimed by Paaluki in Stuwaiolimu
Honolulu-aina. Taku.

Paimuai sworn. I know the land of Paaluki in Auwaiolimu - Honolulu-aina. It consists of 11 Kalo patches in all - wet and dry. On the Mauka side is Wekimo's land; Waitei is Gov': cattajen; Makai my land; Ewa is land under Kalama as Konohiki. Besides these eleven patches there is a twelfth one belonging to this land which is a poalima patch belonging to the King or Government. It has been the King's patch from Kamehameha 1st time. It is just Makai of the stream running through the land the Gov' or King have always worked & received the fruits of this patch; and the claim of Paaluki for it is a new thing.

April 13. J. Pitko's agent for the King and Paaluki in No 608 appeared, and Paaluki said, the patch claimed by Pitko's was taken from him by Keaweluahi in 1838 before the laws existed; and that he had not had possession of it since. He said this patch had been worked as a poalima patch ever since 1838.

After this statement the Board decided that the patch having been taken from Paaluki under the old customs and before the laws of 1839 it was lost to him, and must continue as at present a Government or King's patch.

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Manu came into its possession in 1839 I think by a bargain between him and the Government who owned the land. Manu was a school teacher - and he was to have this land by paying 7 dollars each year out of his pay for teaching. He was to have the land upon the annual Rent of seven dollars as long as he saw fit, and also the privilege of buying it, when he wished, on the same terms as other tenants.

William Humphreys' land adjoins this on the Waialeale side - he has a patch inside of this land, but distinct from it.

C. 277 B. Kaleipaihala

13 April

I. Kaauwai sworn. I know this land - it is in the district of Pahaina - bounded inland by Alanui aupuni - Olewale by "Olewa", Makai by the Sea, Kaanepali by John White's land, who disputes with the claimant about the boundary of this lot. White claims a corner of it about 11 ft wide, and I think White's claim is right.

Kaleipaihala got this land through his wife - Ulumehihei, who was a favorite of Kahiinaena. He has had quiet possession from a period long before 1839 to this time: excepting the dispute of which I have spoken with White, I know of no other counter claim - that dispute arose in 1846 or 1847.

C. 420. Kiihelani

16 April

Counter Ting, C. by P. P. P. 10806

I. Kaauwai sworn. I know the land of Olwa - claimed by Kiihelani at Alanui - It formerly belonged to Auwa, who held it as a konohiki for Kamehameha I

He continued to hold it in peace under Kameha-
 meha I. II & III up to the Year 1834 when he died.
 Auwae had great fears, lest when he died, his
 heirs, and the people should be dispossessed,
 of this land; and consequently he laid up
 money to buy the good will of the King, that
 the land might not be wrested from the
 lawful heirs. After Auwae died, Kawailepolepo
 nephew of Auwae, took 40 dollars, (money
 laid up by Auwae) to the King, and Naoo,
 the widow of Auwae, and Kawailepolepo,
 were left in possession of the land. In 1838
 Kataluwalu prevailed upon the King to return
 the 40 dollars before spoken of, & Kataluwalu
 was placed over the land by the King.
 Kataluwalu had this land given to him by the
 King in time of Kaome, but the King would
 not dispossess Auwae. When Auwae died
 Kataluwalu renewed his claim, and upon
 the removal of Kawailepolepo in 1838, came
 into possession. In 1839, Kataluwalu died
 and his Widow has been the Konohiki of
 the same from that time until her death in
 February last. Her name was Keunaohua
 Since her death, the land has returned to
 the King.

Naoo has never ceased to urge her
 claim to this land, as far as Hinow.
 Vukelani is the husband of Naoo. There
 are many natives on this land, whose rights
 cannot be disturbed, let who may have the
 land.

By order of the Board these Claims were taken up for a rehearing. Dr. G. P. Judd and W. E. Maillai appeared for the heirs of Mahune, and Keketupuohi in person.

Paulo Keanoa - sworn. I know the land in dispute between Keketupuohi & the Heirs of Mahune. I knew it when it was all in one street, before the street - called fort St. was laid out. This land was then occupied by Mahune, and others under him. I and a Chinaman had houses there which were destroyed when fort St. was cut through by Kinau by order of Government. At that time Mahune asked what was to be done with these houses, and Keketupuohi answered - "place them on the Waikiki side of the Road, and I think they were put there in 1837. I lived with Kinau & Keketupuohi at that time as Secretary. I never heard from whom Mahune derived his Title, but I know he lived there in 1823 and to occupy this land till about 1834, when Puhikula & his Sister who lived near, set up a Claim to it, and appealed to the Governor to give them possession of it - but he decided that it was Mahune's. The first fence built on this land was stick, and built by Mahune and his people about 1826. I lived on the land then under Mahune, and helped to make the fence. I know he leased the land on Waikiki side of St. to Mr. Smith. It was a written lease and Keketupuohi was not named in it. At that time, myself & the Chinaman moved off. This lease had the approval of the King and Premier. The land was Mahune's, and he

had a right to lease it; and therefore I made no
 objection to removing from it. Mahune built
 the house on the corner of the Ewa lot. When
 Admiral Thomas was here a Chinaman set up
 a claim to this house lot. but it was decided
 in Mahune's favor. I know Kekuapuohi's
 from time of Kamehameha I. She has lived
 under Kamehameha II and III, and moved with
 the Chiefs. I never knew or heard of any
 claim to this land made by Kekuapuohi till
 after Mahune's death. The Rent of \$75 of
 the part leased to Smith & Ann. was col-
 lected by the Treasury Board, of which I
 was a member; and I never knew of
 her claiming any part of this Rent. It
 was paid to Mahune after deducting
 the Gov't share. Kekuapuohi never lived
 on any part of this land to my knowledge.
 but Mahune has always possessed it
 from 1823. I am a II cousin of his, and may
 be a hei. Mahune has an adopted Child.
 and two Younger Brothers Puhakakea &
 Malaspu. He has no real sisters, and
 no Parents living - his Brothers are his
 nearest Relatives.

Cross Ex. by Kekuapuohi.

Kekuapuohi is the Widow of Kaalakahaimalama
 but I do not know he ever owned the land,
 or that he ever left it to any one.

for heirs of Mahune

I take sworn I know the land in dispute
 and that when Kihoriko came down from
 Hawaii to be King in 1819, perhaps - Keku-
 puohi and her husband Kaalukahaimalama
 lived on this land & Mahune lived on it

with the Nurse of Konia - and when I married her, I went to live on it, and continued there until 1837 or 8 when the new street broke up my house and I went elsewhere. I lived under Wapolohau, Konia's nurse. Mahune exercised the ownership of this land from the time the streets were laid out to his death. I never know or heard that Keturua had any claim to this land until lately.
Cr. cr. by Keturuaohi.

I never heard the title of Kaulahaimalama.
~~Possession~~ Kaulahaimalama Sworn - I know the land in dispute - I lived on it from the Kawai war - until 1826 when Pahi mania Konia. I did not during that time of Keturuaohi living there. I know that Mahune had the possession of the land & ownership at the time of the roads being made. I never heard of Keturuaohi making any claim but Mahune leased a portion of it to A. Smith the A. Mover. in which lease or rent Keturuaohi had no part; as far as I know.

~~for Keturuaohi~~ Kaulahaimalama Sworn - I know the land in dispute - In time of Kamehameha II. this place belonged to Pehiuta the Elder. He gave it to Kaulahaimalama, Keturuaohi's husband, before Pihoniko sailed for England. He went with Pihoniko, and made it over to his wife Keturuaohi before he sailed. He died in England. During his absence - Keturuaohi gave this and some other lands into the keeping of Mahune. she gave him this to possess for her. and went herself to live at Maui. In my opinion Mahune and others on this land, lived under Keturuaohi. This disposal of the land by Kaulahaimalama is perfectly clear to me, and has been so understood

Being to the plainness of this Will, Kekuapuohi never objected to this land as far as I know. I do not know to whom Boar Mahune willed it. Cr. ex.

Kaulukaimalama made this disposition of the land on Maui. I heard his Will; it was this - "I am sailing to a foreign country. do you take care of all our lands. You are to hold the Kings lands under the Chiefs. Hoapili's lands under him; the people will live under you. When I am gone, if evil befall you Keota, my Child, will be my heir; Hoapili's Will, however, be over him."

This land in dispute, was the Kings waste land, where his people lived when he went to England.

Puakohake ^{sworn}. I know this land in dispute before Rihoriko went to England. it then belonged to Puhinda - he lived there because he built his house there. He then gave it to Kaulukaimalama. When he went to England with the King, he gave this land to Kekuapuohi, his wife; under whom Mahune and his people lived. Mahune built houses on it at her Command. Mahune sought Knowledge. and I cannot say, whether he lived under her of late Years. The title to this land, is in my opinion, in Kekuapuohi. She has not for the last 20 Years given Mahune any orders about this land; nor treated him as her servant or tenant; but he has possessed it - rather as a Relation. He lived on it as the Kings servant; & looked straight to him as his Lord, & not through Kekuapuohi.

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Pauls Kanou recalled stated - When Mahune leased the Waititi portion of this lot to Alexander Smith it was stipulated that the King was to have 20th Pth Gear out of the Rent; and he has received it accordingly.

J. P. Sudd M. J. sworn - for Mahune - The reason why Mahune sent in no claim to the Commission for this land, was because Pahiula put in a claim for this land; and Mahune contested it, and it was awarded to Mahune. Mr. Richards thought it unnecessary; and acting upon his Award. remained silent.

(Note No award was given to Mahune in form.)
Mahune filed in conforming to the law in not making his claim

23 April

William Garbottle sworn - I know this land - it is a house lot in Honolulu. bounded Maunā by J. Booths National house. Waititi and Makai by my land. Ewa side is Neuanu St. The claimant received this lot for his wife in exchange for a lot destroyed by the making of the new Road - in 1839. Claimant's wife Josephine took possession of the lot at the time and has lived there ever since in peace.

Note Mr. Boyd stated that he acted in behalf of his wife.

Counter C. 14 Ataki N^o 10,613 Part 12. J. Kethuanava N^o 7712.

Pahi claims that part of the land on the left hand side of the road as you go up the Valley known as the Old Thunder place; and marked on J. Metcalf's survey as the "disputed territory";

Kealoha W. sworn for County Ct. I live in Honolulu
I know the land of "Laiini" in Nuuanu Valley -
and the part that was occupied by Kahakiti
or Thunder. It lies on the Ewa or left hand
side of the Road leading up Nuuanu V.
Maikai it is bounded by Kuluauka's land -
Waititi side by Nuuanu road; Maikai by
Kalaunohu's land; also Ewa. There are sev-
eral houses on this land. Pahi received it
from Kehaionohi in 1845. She had it from
Kahakiti, who gave it to her just before his death -
she being his heir. This was in 1843.

Kahakiti received this land from Kalaauka -
one of Kamohamoha's men. Kalaauka died in
1837 or 8. I am Kahakiti's widow; and have known
this land since 1834. Ruddocks never gave
it to Kahakiti - who lived there before Ruddocks
came to live in the Valley. Ruddocks lived on
another part of the land on the other side of
the Road.

Q. or by Ct. I do not know that Kahakiti ever went to
Mr. Ruddocks for him to point out the bound-
ary line between them, nor the reason of
moving a stone fence Maikai of this land.
The boundary side of it on the Road side
in old times was the old Road leading up Nuuanu -
that road was nearer to the Stream
towards Waititi side than the new one. I do
not know that Kahakiti ever went to Ruddocks
to ask him for land, or that he ever built a
house on any of Ruddocks' land; this piece
never formed a part of Ruddocks' land. He
built on vacant land, which was Kuluauka's,
and not Ruddocks'; whose land did not reach

so far towards Ewa. Kakekiki never paid Ruddocks
any Rent for this land to my knowledge; nor did he
Ruddocks ever possess it that I know of. He lived
in a separate place on Waititi Side of it.

Momona sworn - I know the land in dispute.
I first knew it in 1839 or 1840. Kakekiki was then
living on it. It came to Kekaunohi at his death, ^{in 1848} as
his heir, who gave it to Pahi in 1845. The Gift from
Kekaunohi to Pahi was an absolute one. I
never heard of any Counter Cl. when Kakekiki had the
land. Ruddocks was not living on this land when I
first knew it, nor has he since to my knowledge.

Con^{ly} Cl. I lived with Kakekiki - I never heard him say
this land was Ruddocks, or that he had any thing
to do with it.

Kaioha recalled, says. The Ewa boundary of Ruddocks
land was the Old Road. That was the boundary
between Ruddocks' and Kakekiki - The new

See Page 116 Road, made in 1837 or 1838 Cut off some of Kakekiki
land, and threw it on to Ruddocks side; who gained
land by the building of the new Road.
Note Claimant stated that he should be glad to settle the dispute by
an award for the main piece on the Waititi side of the new road.

Kapaula W. sw. Mui in Nuane. I know the land
in dispute - Mauka it is bounded by a small lane
leading to Mr. Rogers. Waititi is Laane's land -
Maha, Keolewa, Ewa Puawina S. It is fenced
and has 1 house on it. Kamaipupa lives on it under
Kekauluohi, or her hei Lunatilo. I gave this land to
Kekauluohi about the time Kinaes first child died
1835. I had it from Kahramitiani about 1826.
Kamaipupa and others have occupied it under
Kekauluohi and Lunatilo in peace ever since.
I gave it.

Kahuaniliani do. I live in Honolulu. I know the land in dispute. Some lived on it. My husband and myself took it up when it was waste. I gave it to Maipaula who lived with me, & she gave it to Kihauluohi, who thus got her title. Ch. ex. 11. I have lived here since the Kauai war in 1824. I went to live there when it was waste. I lived there because I was nurse of Kamanele - a daughter of Kuakini. Pica was foster mother of Kamanele, and wife of Paanui. Paanui had no authority over this land. He never exercised any authority over it in any way whatever.

Mr. J. said that this evidence had thrown new light on the case. and that he & Kanaina would settle it amicably. Kihauluohi seized this land in 1844, and he asked her why she did it? she replied, because she wanted it; and this is the first time he ever heard of its belonging to her by Gift. However, he and Kanaina, through the mediation of P. Kanou would arrange it peaceably.

P. J. Mission N^o 387. Part 2 Section 1
Kauai. Waimea.

May 4th

George P. Dowell do. I am acquainted with the lands of P. J. Mission at Waimea, Kauai. I have resided on them since July 1846. They are correctly described according to the best of my knowledge in the Claim before the Board.

That description corresponds with the Mission's possessions since July 1846. excepting one, called "Naauiki", as in the last clause of Section 6 of

This Claim, which title was disputed by Kekuauonohi in 1844, I think now by Kekuanaoa. In connection with the land of Moopuna ohua is a sea or fish and moss ground, which has lately been taken from the Mission; or rather, the title has been disputed. These are the only disputed parts to my knowledge. Paulo Kanao Sw. I know the lands of Kaauiki and Moopuna ohua claimed by P. S. Mission on Kauai. Moopuna ohua has a sea belonging to it, whose name I do not know. There was a dispute about this sea between the Mission and a man on the beach; and on a trial before me with the hearing of witnesses, it was clear to me that this Kaahakai belonged to the Mission, and thus I decided; this was in 1845.

There was also a dispute between the Mission & Kekuauonohi about the land of Kaauiki in 1845 and it was brought before me as acting Governor to settle. After enquiry, the weight of testimony appeared to be against the Mission, but they retained the land. It was again brought before me in 1846 and after hearing evidence on both sides I was in great doubt, because the Mission witness was an old man, deriving his knowledge wholly from himself about the land, while on the other side were many witnesses, who were young, and had their knowledge from others. I decided that matter should remain as it was: the Mission having their food from the land, and the title remaining a mooted question, which it does to this day. Resumed Page 261

Part 2. Section 2.

Kauai - Waiole.

W. D. Alexander Sw. I am acquainted with the

Waiole lands, situated in the district of "Katalaia". Consisting of two pieces - one the Missionary Residence in the Ahupuaa of Waiole; and the other a piece belonging to Mr. Johnsons select school in the Ahupuaa of Hanalei.

The surveys of these two lands made by J. Metcalf marked N^o 1 and 2. Contain the correct bounds of these lands to the best of my knowledge. I lived on N^o 1 nine years from 1834, and know well its boundaries.

The first part was a Gift from Gov. Kaitheoewa before 1832 and has been held by the Mission in peace ever since. I know of no counter Cl. to it - and never heard the Mission title disputed. The second part was also a Gift from the same Chief to Mr. Johnson and myself, both members of the Mission. It was given us to Cultivate, but we afterwards transferred it to the Mission for the use of the select school. Its boundaries were well defined by Kaitheoewa on all sides - The Mauka and Northern were defined by the border of a Marsh - Maikai by a rau fence - made by Gov^t to protect the Cultivated lands from Cattle. and South Western parallel with the dividing line between Waiole & Hanalei was pointed out to us by Kaitheoewa, and we planted a row of Mulberry trees along that boundary, which now stand there. The Survey of J. Metcalf of this land, is according to these boundaries. This Gift was made in about the Year 1839 and has been in the undisturbed possession of the Mission ever since as far as I know. I think the Gift was in 1838. I never ^{heard} the

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title disputed till very lately. I left in 1843. to live at
Pahainaluna.

George B. Rowell sw. I know the Mission lands
at Waiote. I have ^{heard} Mr. Alexander's testimony, and
it is correct as far as I know. I lived on these
lands from 1843 September to July 1846. during
which time they were in the peaceable possession of
the P. I. Mission. I went there to live just after
Mr. Alexander left. I never heard their title
questioned to the first part, and never to the
second part until after the Constitution of the
Land Commission.

Abner Wilson sw. I am acquainted with these
lands in question at Waiote Kauai - and to the
best of my knowledge acquired from a Residence
on them from July 1846 (when Mr. Rowell left.)
I should say Mr. McCreeps Surveys are cor-
rect. I reside there at the present time. These
lands have been held undisturbed by the P. I. Mission
since July 1846. to this time. I never knew of their
title being disputed until the early part of last
Year, when Mr. Johnson informed me that the
title to the second part was disputed by D. Proke.
Perhaps it is a Year ago I heard of this.

P. I. Mission No. 387. Part 3.

Molokai

May 1,

Harvey D. Hitchcock sw. I am well acquainted with
the P. I. Mission lands on the Island of Molokai.
I went to live there in 1832 (October), having resided
there ever since in charge of them.

These lands consist of 4 pieces, situated in the
district of Nakuaka - 2 of which lie together, 1.253

and are bounded as follows: East are the premises of Kawelo: South is Road leading along the Sea beach: West is a line running a few Rods E. of the Bell house in a Southerly direction, until it meets the Southern boundary: North are Hacinia's lands. It is fenced round, and this fence is the correct boundary. N^o 1 is separated from this by a Road leading along the Northern part; and is enclosed by a stone fence, which is the correct Boundary.

Lot 1 was given to P. J. Mission Oct 7 1832 by Autea, then acting Governess of Malakai, and it has been in the peaceable possession of the Mission into this time. I have resided on it all this period, and never heard the title disputed.

Lot 2 was given to me for the use of the Mission by Louis Dubou - a Chiefess of the Island; about 1837 or 1838, who had it from Hoapiti Wahine. The Mission has also held this lot in quiet possession from the Gift to this time.

Lot 3 was given to Mr. Munn for the use of the Mission before 1839; I think 1837. It was given by Lazarus Kalohi - a former Governor of the Island, a Chief of Note.

This lot had a house and some small improvements on it, for which Mr. Munn as the Mission agent, paid £60. This land has been held undisputed to the present time.

Lot 4. was bought of a Colored man - Thomas Cooper - a Mason, now at Lahaina - who held it by purchase, or as a reward for work done for Lazarus. I paid him

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I think twenty dollars for his Improvements as agent of the Mission - The exact date of the purchase I cannot say - but it was before 1839, I think it was in 1835. and the Mission have held it ever since. I would state however, that there is a School house standing on this piece belonging to Miss Lydia Brown - built at her expense and her property.

2. Kaauwai Sec. I am acquainted with the lands of the Mission on Molokai, I have heard Mr. Hitchcock's Testimony - and know the boundaries he has given are correct. I know these lands have been peacefully held by the Mission from before 1839 to this time.

S. I. Mission No 387. Part 4. Sec: 1
Hawaii - Hilo. May 1.

Titus Coen sec. I am well acquainted with the Mission lands at Hilo - I. of Hawaii. Punahoa is their general name of designation - This land lies in one body. There are two lands known by that name - This is the Westerly one. He own a part of the Easterly one also. We formerly owned the whole but have relinquished most of the Easterly land. I know the boundaries of these lands - having lived on them for the last 12 Years. Mr. Metcalf's survey now before me is correct in its boundaries as far as I know. This land was given to Mr. Joseph Goodrich as I have always understood, by the King I Kaakumane about 1827, and has been in the undisturbed possession of the Mission for the last 12 Years with the exception of a small piece just north of the large Church, and marked on Mr. Metcalf's

See B. 201

Survey as "Wm Beckley's Claim". This piece forms a portion of a land which was given to Mr. Puggles by Kaakumanu in her Regency. It has been in the undisturbed possession of the Mission during my Residence at Hilo, and I have heard, for a much longer period.

Mr. Andrews I think formerly lived on this lot, when connected with the Mission.

About 10 Years since a Chief Woman, named Lydia Opiopio, came to me and asked permission to build a house on this part of the Church, and I gave it. She lived here under the Mission until 3 or 4 Years ago, when she died; and since her death, a friend of hers lived on it by spells with our permission.

The Claim of the Mission to this piece was never disputed, until within the last 3 Years when Isaac Eels, of Honolulu, who pretends to be the Nephew and heir of Opiopio, took advantage of our absence, and setting up a Title to it, sold it to Wm Beckley for the sum of 200 dollars, as I have heard.

Beckley now disputes the claim of the Mission to this small piece; but the Mission has never relinquished its possession -

There are some Natives living on the land of Tunakoa, some of them are Kamainas or descendants of them; and others have leases or permission to live there from the Mission.

I wish to correct my testimony and say that the portion of land Maikai of the Church referred to as the Wm Beckley Claim, was not occupied by Opiopio. Her house was further Maikai on the other side of Koteco

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street. In fact - the part the Mission claims, has never been out of the possession of the Mission since I have resided at Hilo.

David P. Lyman Esq. I know the Mission (lands) at Hilo - Hawaii. I went to reside there in the summer of 1832, and have lived there ever since. They are correctly described in Mr. Metcalf's survey before me as far as I know - but I would remark, that in order to straighten the line between the Mission land of Punahoa and Piikonia, a small piece was cut off from Punahoa, just above my house, and a piece of nearly equal size was taken in from Piikonia, up near the Crater. The piece given to Piikonia was more valuable than that taken in; but I agreed with Kaunika, Konohiki of Piikonia, to let the Survey stand as correct.

This land has been in the peaceable possession of the Mission ever since my residence at Hilo - now 17 years next July, excepting the small piece just makai of the Church, marked on the Survey - "W. Peckley Claim." I built a house on this little piece, when I first went to Hilo in 1832 and lived there; occupying it for the Mission nearly 3 years. After I left, some Natives, with permission, planted a single crop, now and then, but no permission was ever given to Opiopio to build on this spot, for fear of endangering the meeting house by fire. She planted it once, perhaps more; her house being on the other side of Volcano St. further seaward.

The Mission title to this land was never disputed until after her death; when Kaeo Gleebe claimed it by right of Inheritance from Opiopio. When Mr. Coan and myself were absent from Hilo

attending a General Meeting at Honolulu, Kaele took advantage of our absence, and sold this land to W^m Beckley. The Mission has never relinquished its possession of this lot; and Opiopio had no other right in this spot except that I have stated. She was a Konoiki of the great land to which this small piece once belonged, but never used this without permission of the Mission.

Lorrin Andrews sw. I have heard the testimony of Messrs Coan and Lyman; and know the piece of land referred to by them as the "W. Beckley Claim". When I was a member of the Mission I lived on this small piece of land - in 1829 or 1830 in the house of Mr. Ruggles. He was there often, and said, this land was given to him on behalf of the Mission. The Mission Claim was not then disputed to it; I occupied it 9 months for the Mission, when Mr. Green, another member of the Mission took it into possession.

C. 8.305 Paulo Kanoua. May 4

Pakua sw. I know this land, it is in Palama Oahu. Called "Kainiapuaa". Cut in two pieces by the Road.

Mauka piece. Mauka is land of Kalualoa. Honolulu is Kuhuimanu. Kekuanaoas land. Makai Road from Honolulu to Ewa. Ewa a stream.

Makai piece. Mauka is the same Road. Honolulu "Kuhuimanu" and land of Kiahote. Makai side lands of Kuxana and H. Zupplien. Ewa the stream as before mentioned.

Claimant received these lands from the present King
 in 1840, perhaps - and has ever since held them in
 peace. I live on the land under Kanoa - and
 been there 12 Years. There are several Natives on
 it - but they have no Claims to the land. They are
 all under him, subject to his pleasure as to the
 term of their location on it. They have put in
 their Claims to the Commission for their houses.
 Their names are

Kapoe. Sw.

I have heard the Testimony of Pahuca -
 it is true. I live on the land, and have put in my
 Claim for a small house lot in this land.

I know of no Counter Claimant to Kanoa.

Kanoa stated that Ninou - who lived
 in Honolulu, lays claim to a part of this lot
 and I asked him to come here to day and
 have his Claim adjusted. I do not know
 whether he has put in a Claim for this land
 or not

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Note. The above claim was alleged by Claimant
 to have been given into the hands of the former
 President of the Board at the same time as
 No. 981, his other Claim previously examined -
 and in consequence of this statement, at his wish
 the same was taken up earlier than its number.

R. W. Holt - sworn - (The will of Joseph Elliott -
 (Marked A being handed to Witness) This is the last
 will and Testament of Joseph Elliott, who died
 as near as I can remember, in 1836. I drew
 up this will, and signed it as a Witness. Elliott
 declaring the same to be his last will & Testa-
 ment. The 100 dollars mentioned in this will
 was paid to his wife.

James Mahoney - sworn (the will being handed
 to him) I signed this will at request of Mr.
 Elliott, as a witness to the same. Mr. Elliott
 said, this was his last will and testament
 and desired me to sign it as a witness.
 I did so. I know Mr. Elliott is now dead.
 he died I think in the Year 1836.

"Be it remembered, that I Joseph Elliott
 now residing on the Island of Oahu, con-
 sidering the uncertainty of this mortal life,
 and being of sound mind and perfect mind and
 memory - blessed be almighty God for the same,
 do make and publish this my last will and

I am acquainted with the Mission lands at Kauai. I was the first Missionary who occupied this station. I resided here first in 1834. These lands were received from Kāihioewa Gov^r of Kauai - excepting a small piece I exchanged with Kapuniāo. I exchanged with him one large bed of Kalo at Kuāla for 3 Kalo patches called Paakōne. Gov^r Kāihioewa gave these lands to the Mission in exchange for certain possessions of theirs in the district of Waimea - Kauai. I resided on these lands until 1841, when I came to Oahu. During all this period the Mission held peaceable possession of them, and no one ever disputed their title - to my knowledge to the present time. Some member of the Mission has constantly resided at this station.

The surveys of J. Metcalf of 3 of these lands are correct, but there is a 4th land called Omāo - a pasture land belonging to this station, not included in these surveys - containing I should think 100 acres of pasture land. It lies on the foot of

land lying between the two streams of Wai-hanono and Kahoolenapea. The title of the Mission to this last-named land is the same as to those surveyed, and of which I have spoken. The mauka boundary of this land is the wooded hills of Kaneohe. I have never heard the Mission's title to this last-named land disputed. Resumed Page 387.

Hawaii Kailua

May 5

Asa Thurston Sec. I know well the lands of the Mission in Kailua - Hawaii. The lands I have in charge consist of the dwelling-house premises where I reside, and one other land, called "Hiciaoali." The first are enclosed with a stone fence; the last is not enclosed. I have resided on these lands since 1824, and from what I know of them I believe Mr. Metcalf's surveys of them are correct as laid before me.

These lands were received by verbal gift from Kaahumanu I in 1824, and have been in the peaceable possession of the Mission from that time to the present.

Governor Adams gave the dwelling house lot to the Mission; and Kaahumanu gave it (Hiciaoali). The titles by the application to these lands have never been disputed.

Some Natives live on the last-named land one only of whom "Kuae" is a "Kamaaina." The others have been placed there by me and hold their titles under the Mission.

I am acquainted with the other Mission lands in Waialua, lately occupied by S^r John Andrews. They are situated about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile South of my place. These lands have been in the peaceable possession from about the Year 1821, to now, and I always understand they were given to Mr Bishop on behalf of the Mission. I know the boundaries of these lands and believe that Mr Metcalf's surveys of them now in my hands are correct. The name of this main land is Waiaha¹, and there is a house lot and cow Yard also.

Hawaii - Kohala

His Bond. sw. I reside on the Mission lands in the district of Kohala, and know well their Bounds. I shall have been 8 Years resident the next Month.

These lands consist of two pieces. The one on which the dwelling house stands - in the ahupuaa of Iole. The other is a Banana Garden in the ahupuaa of Niulii. The first is enclosed with a stone wall, which is its true boundary.

The other is not enclosed, but contains two acres, more or less. I do not know the exact bounds.

The land in Iole was given to Mr Bliss for the Mission in 1838 or 9 as I have always heard. When he left, I took possession of it, and have held it ever since on its behalf without disturbance. I never heard the Mission title questioned to these lands.

The Honohiki of Niulii gave Mr Bliss the Banana Garden in about 1838, and I be-

held it to 1841 when it was given into my keeping and have held it quietly for the Mission ever since. I never heard this Title disputed till within the last Year: when Hi'aikomou, the Konohiki of Poleiohoku, set up a Claim to this lot - but he took no active Measures to dispossess the Mission, and they have held on to it as ever - (In iti of Kupuleau)

C. No. 509. J. J. Paris. May 5
 Kau. S. J. Mission - Hawaii.

J. J. Paris. sworn. I know these Mission lands ever since Sep. 1841. They consist of two distinct pieces: one a Church lot, and the other a Garden & Pasturage. They are both enclosed with a stone wall, which is their correct Boundary.

The Garden and Pasturage is however bounded on one side by a ditch. This last piece is intersected by a stream. The plans of these two pieces presented to the Board, contain true descriptions of these lands.

The Garden and Pasturage was given to me for the Mission by Tou 'Adams in 1841. He said to me - "There is plenty of land - Go and take what you wish, only do not take any of the water Kalo patches or lois, I took accordingly this, enclosing about 2 acres of it in 1841 - and 2 Years after I enclosed the whole. The Mission have held it in peaceable possession ever since.

The Church lot was given to me for the Mission by the Luna Auhau of Kau David Pipi

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as he said, in the name of the Governor about 5 yrs ago. He marked it out to me, and it was immediately enclosed with a stone wall. Since then a good stone house has been built on it - and it has been used as a place of worship. These Mission lots have never been disputed in their title to my knowledge.

J. T. Bonds Esq. I am acquainted with the Mission lands in district of Kana. I of Maui. I went to reside there in January 1837 about, and was there to Sep. 1848. These lands are mostly fenced round. I was present when the Survey of Mr. Metcalf before me was made; and the bounds set forth in it are correct.

The Mission had this land from Hoapili Kane Po'i of Maui through I. Waauwai, in 1838 or 9.

Since then they have been in undisturbed possession of the land - excepting a portion occupied by Uluwahale. But he has confessed that this land belonged to the Mission, although he has sent in a claim to the Board. (See 615) Uluwahale is now dead. Beyond this, I never heard the Mission title disputed to any portion of this land. I would remark however, that Karamiwi, has sent in a claim for a portion of this land on which he resides; but whatever right he had in the land, he had from me. I gave him permission to live on it; until the Mission wanted it; I told him he might enclose a piece, and that he should be compensated for such improvements. He then enclosed a piece, and has occupied it on the terms I have stated. He has told me he knew this land

belonged to the Mission - and that it was given to them by Hoapili Kane.

C. 37 D. B Antonio Silva Pahia 15 May

Kuakamauna So. lina for Co. I know this claim for a house lot in Pahaina Maui. It is bounded Mauna by Kalo land of Kihauonohi. Heleale by land of Victoria in charge of Kekuanaoa - Mahai by Ahanni aupuni - Kanapali by the Kings land. It has a stone fence which is the true boundary. Nii, father in law of Claimant lives on the land in Claimants absence.

Stephen Grant Sr. I know the land here Claimed by Mr Caswell. It is ^{the} Hamakualoa, Island of Maui, and called Ulu-ma-lu. It is a very large land, but I know nothing of its bounds.

About 1837, Caswell came to me and asked me if I could let him have some money and I asked him what he wanted it for. He said if I can raise forty dollars I am going to get a land in Hamakualoa from Namauu. I told him I was short, and could render him an assistance. I saw him a few days afterwards, and he told me he had managed to get the money and was going over to take charge of his land. Some time afterwards he told me he was all night, that he had got a fine land in Hamakualoa. I knew he had possession of a land over there, and that he called Namauu his chief, that he used to get offerings from it on the working days of the Chief, namely on Fridays.

The land was always spoken of as Caswell's. I never heard Namauu or any one else than the Claimant say anything about the land. He planted sugar cane on the land, and took timber from it. Namauu was in Lahaina at this time. Caswell held this land at the same time as I held mine, i. e. according to the Customs of the Country. Namauu was the Lord of the land, and Caswell did his *poalima* work. We held our lands at the sufferance of the Chiefs and when they saw fit to turn us off, they might with impunity.

Mataia Kekuanaoia says that there is a portion of Ulu-ma-lu, which was given Caswell's wife, a small piece and he has no objection to her having this, but for the balance Caswell has

no Claim.

L. Kaauwai Sw. I know this land, Ulu-mala. It is an Ahupuaa in Hamakua, Island of Maui. All I know about Caswell's Claim is what Caswell has told me. When the King was living at Lahaina. I met Caswell in the road near Laahuli's house. I asked him where have you been? he answered, to the King's place with Namaanu. I asked what business have you been transacting with the King. He said I have ^{been} appointed a luna of Ulu-mala under Namaanu to see to the people of this land, over look their work, and act as a kind of Honoiki.

He further said Namaanu and the King had consented to his planting sugar cane there, and that he was going to do it and build a Sugar Mill. I said why did you not get the whole. He said because I could not. The Chiefs were stingy and would not let me have but a small piece when I am going to plant. He said Namaanu had refused to let him have more than this small portion, altho he had made him a luna over the whole. Afterwards he built a Mill there and ground the cane. I don't know the bounds of it but I have always heard that it was about 4 1/2 acres.

Stephen Grant recoll'd. I know the portion of Ulu-mala which Caswell planted to sugar cane and worked. It was makai of his house, and contained about four or five acres planted. I went around and across it. The part Makai of the house was the cane land or land fit for cane and contained about fifty acres I should think. The whole land I supposed was his according to my testimony the other day.

L. Kaauwai recoll'd and Oafs Examined by Mr. Parsons.

I never heard Caswell say that he gave Namaanu anything for this land. I never heard of Caswell's giving Namaanu forty dollars for the land. I know of Namaanu

Caswell's taking timber from the land. He paid Niamau for the same I have heard. I was tax gatherer of the land in 1811, and before, and this land was always considered as Niamau's land. I believe Niamau paid the tax for the same. The tax was paid in hogs. Niamau gave orders to the people on that land, (not through Freeman) to deliver the hogs and they were delivered accordingly. (Fifty acres ordered by the Board to be surveyed, for the Claimant at the extent of his right.

It is bounded, Maunaka, by W^m Beckley's lot. On the Waikiki sides, by the lot of Kahikona and the lot of Bent & Co. Mahai, by Broadway Street. Cor. by Cross Street. No one lives on this lot except those who live under Kaeo.

A. Paki Sr. I have heard the testimony of Kaauwai, and it is strictly correct.

Part II. This is a House lot at Lahaione, Maui.

T. Kaauwai Sr. I know this lot. The Clt. rec^d it from his mother, and she had it from Kahikaha before the year 1820. Her title nor his has ever been disputed. Some of Kaeo's

people live there but they have no claim for this land. It has always had a fence around it. It is bounded Mauka, by a small lane dividing it from the land of Kekuanawa and the Govt. Kowale, by A. Pahi's lot. Makai, by the sea shore. Kaanapali, by Kekauono-hi's lot.

A. Pahi Sw. I know this lot, and have heard the testimony of K. Kaunoi respecting it. His testimony is correct. Part 3. House lot in Lahaina.

K. Kaunoi Sw. I know this lot. It is in Lahaina, Mauka of the Church Lot of the Protestant Mission. I first knew this lot in 1836, when it was possessed by Manono, under Kaaimalolo the mother of the Ct. who made Ct. her heir. Manono's title was never disputed until 1846, until that time he had it in peaceable possession. Manono entered his claim for it very early, and it was heard by Mr. Richards at Lahaina. Keaupuni is Manono's heir, he being dead at this time. He died soon after entering his claim in 1846, I think. Keaupuni is a counter claimant to Haas. Luakamauna took possession of the lot for Keaupuni on the death of Manono and the claim stands registered in his name. (See Claim 303 to 307, and testimony taken concerning this lot.)

This lot is in Inaa, Lahaina. Kaaimalolo gave this land to Manono, and that Keaupuni is Manono's heir. But I know nothing of the merits of the controversy between Haas and Keaupuni. I always understood that Kaaimalolo gave this lot to Manono to take care of for Keaupuni at the time of her death.

A. Pahi Sw. I know but little about this title. I cannot say with any certainty who is entitled to it.

Kaunoi Sw. I reside in Honolulu, but resided in Lahaina until 1845. I know the lot in dispute between

Kaas and Kaupuni. This witness stated nothing new or positive.

The will of Kaaimalalo, duly proved, was introduced in evidence, wherein she recognized the rights of Manno in this lot.

Part 4. The Claimant said he had no witnesses present.

Part 5. The Claimant withdrew this claim.

Part 6. House lot at Lahaina, Maui.

T. Kaunui Sw. I know this lot it is in Puako, Lahaina.

The Claimant received this lot from his mother Kaaimalalo. She took it up when it was waste land about 1820, and improved it. Afterwards about 1825. She gave it to Puao, who held it until 1836. when he died and left it to his wife Kamailohi, she held it until 1846. when she died and left it to her brother Nihio who has possessed it ever since. Nihio is the Counter Claimant. (See his Claim N^o 6781. heard at Lahaina.)

Puao Sw. I lived with Puao on this lot, but I always understood that Puao lived under Kaaimalalo. Thus with Kamailohi, and Nihio. I was present at the trial between Nihio and Pihani before Sekaulohi and heard what was said by Kaaimalalo, but in my opinion it was only, by way of distinguishing the lots, that she said to Nihio, let Pihani have that lot, and you take this.

C. 8594. Ch. Sekaunohi.

Counter Claimant to 935-Keaka. p. Vol II, 266 1/2
for Kalaupohine & Coocata to Kalaema 718

Maabla appeared for Mr. Sekaunohi, and Mochau the wife of Keaka for Keaka.

Maabla said Sekaunohi did not dispute the title of Keaka to the Hale land, but only to a small part of the House lot. That half of it which lies along the Mumanu road.

Kealoha Sw. for Mr. Sekaunohi. I know the piece of land in dispute between Sekaunohi and Keaka. It is a part of the ili of Kalaupohine. Kahiki lived there under

Nekauonohi in 1836 or 1837. Kahuiki was my husband. Keaka lived on Waikahalulu but I never knew of his having any claim or title in the title of Kalawahine. From the time my husband lived there to this present time. I have always understood this to be the land of Nekauonohi.

Makawa Sr. I know the land in dispute. This land in dispute belongs in my opinion to Kahuiki or his heirs. Of late years it was been in Keaka's possession, but how it came there I don't know.

Makawa Sr. I know the lot in dispute. This land was Nekauonohi, and she let Kahuiki and Keaka was one of his tenants living there under him. Afterwards Keaka had the lot fenced, I think in 1842, and paid \$10.00 for the same. I never heard of Keaka buying this lot in dispute. It now belongs to Nekauonohi in my opinion.

Hanunu Sr. for Keaka. I know this lot in dispute. It is in Kalawahine, Kowhulu aina. It was formerly owned by the father of the Queen Mahekekeke, and by him given to Numawa, and from Numawa it went to See-ku. It was fenced by Keaka and I helped to build the fence with other tenants of Kalawahine, according to the directions of Kahuiki who was the luna of the land under Nekauonohi. It was built as Keaka wished it and I always heard that Keaka gave \$10.00 for the labor.

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Ch. 7588. Nekauonohi. Counter Kalaimamahu 7588^B.
 Kalaimamahu Counter Claimant for the
 Moiki, Ahupuae, Hamakua, Hawaii.

The Counter Claim made oath that he gave in his Counter Claim to Mr. Smith the Secretary of the Land Commission on the 13th or 14th of February 1848. (It cannot

be found on the Register.

Palau Sr. I know the Mooki in dispute between Namoro-
whu and Kalaimamahii. In the year 1831 or 1832. Keamiani
gave this land to Kabiepu to take care of, and he did so up
to his death in 1846 and the present counter Clt. is the true child
of Keamiani, and his heir. Namoro-whu is the sister of Keamiani.

To Kaamoa Sr. After the death of Keamiani this dispute
was taken before the Governor of Oahu, and Solon Si, and after
a trial both the Governor and Mr Si decided on the 6th of
April 1847, that this land belonged to Kalaimamahii and
their decision was filed in the Office of the Minister of the
Interior. Kalaimamahii is now in possession of the land.

Cl. 7123. Kawabakui.

This is a claim for $\frac{1}{2}$ of the ili of Wataihakoko, at Lo-
laupeke in Kailua. It was given to the Clt. by the King at
the recent division of lands. (See the Record of the division
of lands in Mr Pomy's office.)

Cl. 1999. Natimu.

Dec^r 28. 1849.

Maaka Sr. I know the land claimed by Natimu. It is
one House lot in Waiala, Waikiki which is fenced, and has one
house upon it.

It is bounded. Maaka, by Mappahuelima's land. Waiala,
by the same. Makiki, by Loau's land. Konolulu, by a water
course belonging to Mappahuelima.

He obtained it through his wife called Wamakani,
who obtained it from her ancestors who lived on this place
in the days of Wamehameha I. There is no dispute of
Clt's title and he has occupied the place in peace for the
last nine years.

Kanvakahiki Sr. The testimony of the Clt. is correct

but I do not know how long the ancestors of Olt's wife have lived there.

C. 2004. Makaina.

Malua Sw. I know the land of the Claimant. It is a Fish Pond, and a kula land lying together in the ili of Waiupe, Waikiki.

It is bounded. Maunā, by Kamaha's place. Waiālae, by Kaula's lands. Makai, by land in the charge of Pūhiki, but belonging to the King, I believe. Honolulu, by Pololu's lands.

The Olt. received this land from the Konoehi, Pūhika, in the time of Kamehameha I. and occupied the same in peace up to 1843. when the present Konoehi Malaea the sister of Kamaha took it away, but the Olt. has not been disturbed in his enjoyment of the kula. The fish pond only was taken away, but why it was so taken, I cannot tell.

Kamaha Sw. I live on this land, and know it well. What the witness Malua has stated, is correct. I know of no reason why Malaea took away the fish pond.
See P. 575 V 14

C. 2006. Mahe

Maaha Sw. I know the land of the Claimant - It is in the ili of Kalokūhi. Waikiki. Oahu. It consists of five lots in one piece, and a house lot on the sea beach, but he has no title to this sea beach, except that of residing there at sufferance.

The lots are bounded. Maunā, by Wauha'o's land. Waiālae, by Wamakāhuna's land. Makai, by Kalia's lands. Honolulu, by Kalaimoku's land.

The Olt. rec^d this land from Waiānia the Kono-

1859

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iki in the days of Waahumanu I, and his title has never been disputed.

Kamakahi Sr. I know the land of Maie and what Kaaha testified concerning it, is correct.

Ct. 2007. Mahulia.

Waha Sr. I know the land of Mahulia. It consists of three lots, in one piece, in the ili of Iki, in Waikiki, Oahu.

It is bounded, Waikoa, by Waikoa's land, Waialae and Mahai sides, by the same. Honolulu, by Pūuli's land.

The Claimant received it from Kamahine who is now dead. He received it in the days of Waahumanu I, and has possessed it in peace ever since.

Wahikuli Sr. I have long known this land, and the testimony of Waha is correct. I am a neighbor of the Ct.

Ct. 2003. Makalua.

The Claimant appeared and said he wished to withdraw his claim, for he occupied it under Wani.

See also Ct. Page 24, 25, 714.

Ct. 6249. Wani.

This is a claim for an ili of land called Makalii, and an Ahupuaa of land in Hamakualoa, Maui, called Hamawana.

The Ct. appeared, and substantiated his claim, by showing certificate by G. P. Judd that these lands had been set apart to him at the division of lands with the King, as will more fully appear by reference to the register in the office of the Minister of the Interior.

Cl. 2005. *Mumukau.*

Pahoa Sw. I know the land of the Clt. It is not true land however, it is only a house which stands on the land of *Kawahakui*. The Clt. said this was true, the land belongs to *Kawahakui*.

Cl. 2000. *Mahala.*

Waluahinemui Sw. The Clt. has no land but lives under me. She has a house on the lot but the land is mine.

The Clt's wife said the statement of the witness was perfectly correct, and that this claim was made by mistake. The Clt. is a sailor now at sea, and his wife *Paumako* represents him (See the claim of *Waluahinemui* N^o 236.)

Cl. 2009. *Mano.*

Hale Kona Jan. 1 1857.

The constable said that the Clt. was dead and his land sold to *W^m Gill*. He said he found his wife, but she said *Mano's* title was dead.

Cl. 2014. *Maha.*

This is identical with claim N^o 1356 which has already been heard. (See Vol. 2. Testimony page 497.)

Cl. 2016. *Makakani.*

Pelama Sw. I know the land of the Claimant. It consists of 2 lots in the *vi* of *Kanemulu*, in the *Ohupuaa* of *Makawa*. *Ewa*, *Oahu*.

It is in one piece bounded. *Maunaloa*, by *Hekuaialiaki's* and *Kawana's* land. *Honolulu*, by *Kamakahi's* land.

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Makai, by Kamalanai's and Humuokalani's land. Waianae, by the Govt lot.

He received these lots from Kamalanai in the time of Kinau, and his title has never been disputed. Kekuanaoa is the Lord of this land.

Kapule Sw. I know this land, and have heard the testimony of Pulama concerning the Ct's title it is correct.

C. 2017. Ohule.

Haunaleu Sw. The Claimant is dead, and so is his wife. Their heir is Niwaa their boy. This land is at Waikiki, in the ili of Kamookahi, Island of Oahu. Since the death of the Claimant that is, on the 23^d of October last Kahaikai the Konoehiki under Kekuanaoa took the land away and has it now. The land consists of two lots lying together. And one House lot in the ili of Halepaka, Waikiki, which last piece has never been taken away. Kekuanaoa is the Lord of both lands.

The keale land is bounded. Mauka, by Kaluahienui's land. Waialae, by Palaualelo's land. Makai, by the kula waale land. Konoehiki, by Kuluwalehua's land.

The House lot is bounded. Mauka, by the Alani'i Au-puni. Waialae, by Hakeli's land. On other two sides, by the Government land.

The Claimant received these lands in the days of Kamehameha I. from Natiu. His title was never disputed until after his death when the Konoehiki took away the keale land as I have already stated.

Makuaole Sw. I know the land of the Claimant, and have listened attentively to the testimony given by Haunaleu. It is truly correct.

Cl. 2019. Pūpū. Fr. P. 60

This claim was partly heard Dec^r 22. 1848. but one corroborating witness was wanting who is now produced. Keakea (w) Sw. After hearing the testimony of Kuanae read which was given on the 22^d December that it is 'pololei maoli'.

Cl. 2021. Pāhāhiko.

Kamooohu Clt's wife appeared, for her husband, and offered as a witness.

Maie Sw. I know this land. It is six lois, and a small kupa, in the ili of Kālanihale, in the Ahupuaa of Mananaiki, Ewa. Oahu. It is in one piece, and bounded.

Maieka, by Isaac Harbottle's land. Honolulu, by Pūhi's land. Makai, by the River of Wāiawa. Waianai, by Pūhi's land.

Kamooohu gave this land to her husband the Claimant in 1846. and she received it from her brother Keawani, and he from Kamohameha III before the year 1835. Joseph Lovell has lately bought this land of the Government, and taken the food from the lois. The Claimant is a hoaina of the land. This land was given to the Government at the recent division of lands, but the tenants titles I suppose remain the same.

Cl. 2022. Pūnia.

Maie Sw. I know this land of the Claimant. It consists of one lake where he plants his kalo, and grows his fish. It is in the ili of Kipoho, Aiea. Ewa. Oahu.

It is bounded. Maieka, by Keimimaka's land. Honolulu, by Kalili's land. Makai, by my land. Waianai, by

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The Government Lot.

The Claimant received it from Kikapala the former Kowhiki before 1829, and his title has never been disputed. The King is the Lord of this land.

Kainoa Sw. I know this land and its title. I have heard the testimony just given by Naiku, and it is correct.

C. 2025 Paik.

Kikaha Sw. I know this land of Olo. It is in Nuuanu Valley, in the ili of Laimi, and the Ahupuaa of Kauluwela. It consists of 3 lois and a kula land all in one piece.

It is bounded. Mauka, by Thomas Phillip's land. Waikiki, by Pahi's land. Makai, by Kamamwai's land. Coa, by the lands of Pupuha and Kamakahina.

The Claimant received this land in the time of Kuanu and Kahakili, from Pahi, and his title has never been disputed.

C. 1983. Kapule.

Pulama Sw. I know the lands of the Claimant. It consists of seven lois, and one piece of kula lying together. It is in the ili of Kawahanaeae, in the Ahupuaa of Malawa, Coa. Oahu.

It is bounded. Mauka, by Paawela's land. Honolulu, by the river of Malawa. Makai, by Paawela's land. Waianae, by the kula of Kamalanai. John Young is the Lord of this land.

The Claimant received this land from the Kowhiki Paawela in 1816, and Paawela received it from John Young in older times. This Olo's title was never disputed.

Kainoa Sw. I know this land. I live near it. I have heard the testimony of the former witness Pulama and it is correct.

C. 2010. Mauu.

Kaila the wife of the Claimant appeared, and said she

and her husband wished to restore this land to the Honohi-
hi Kahaha, and withdraw this claim.

Cl. 1990. Naie.

Haiwa Sw. I know the land of the Claimant. It is in
the ili of Kepoh, Uea, Eua, Cahu. It consists of two lots, and
a small piece of kula in one piece.

It is bounded Maaka, by the land of Puniu. Anohelu,
by Pua's land. Makai; by Kiuimaka's land. Waianae,
by the Government lot.

The Claimant received this land from Puniu, in
the days of Kiuau, and his title has never been disputed.
The King is Lord of this land.

Pulama Sw. The testimony just given is correct and true.

Cl. 2011. Maule.

Kumaihana Sw. I know the land of the Claimant. It is
in the ili of Kalawahine, Nuuanu Valley, Anohelu
aina. It consists of four pieces.

- N^o 1. a small house lot
- " 2. is two lots, one dry, and one not.
- " 3. " " dry lots
- " 4. " 3 " "

The Claimant received these lands from Kahakahi
in the days of Kiuau, and held them in peace until 1846,
when the Claimant being sick and unable to work these
lands Kekauonohi wished him to leave them.

Kekauonohi counter Clt.

Cl. 1996. Naia.

Puiana Sw. I know the land of Naia. It consists

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of 3 lots and a small piece of kula in one piece lying in the
 ili of Kuluine, Kalawa, Ewa, Oahu.

It is bounded. Maunaloa and Honolulu sides, by Kane's land.
 Makai, by Hiniau's land. Waiānae, by the Government lot.

The Claimant received this land in the days of Hiniau,
 and has held it in peace ever since.

Hapule Sw. I am a Kamāoaina of Ewa, and know the tes-
 timony of Pulama to be correct.

Cl. 935. Keaka.

P. 1. 236.

January 2.

Kekauonohi Counter Claimant.

Māuānōhaleani (W.) Sw. I know the land in dispute between
 Keaka and Kekauonohi. Keaka had it from his father-
 in-law in older times. Kāhēkēli built the fence around this
 lot. My husband Paahana was the luna who superintended
 the building of the fence, and Keaka paid for the same
 the sum of ten dollars. He contracted with Kāhēkēli to
 build the fence.

Cross Examined by Hoalele.

The money was not paid to Kāhēkēli, but to his luna
 and messenger, Paahana, my husband.

Kāhēkēli Sw. for Kekauonohi. I know the land in dispute.
 I live near it. The Claimant went to live there long ago,
 and lived Kāhēkēli, as I always understood, to fence this
 land he paid ten dollars for the same. This was the talk
 at the time of building the fence.

Cl. 2028. Pala.

Makē Sw. I know the land of Pala. It is a land in
 Honolulu Aiea, consisting of 14 lots and a dry spot all
 in one piece in the ili of Waialeale.

It is bounded. Maunaloa, by Pohiwa's land. Waikiki

by the Honohiki's (Kaules) land. Makai, by Kalawe-
mannu's land. Ewa, by Hekuanapanio's land.

The Claimant obtained this land from Halali,
before the death of Tinai (some year) and Halali
from Governor Hekuanava. He has held it in peace
ever since. Hekuanava is the Lord of this land.
Kauaki Sw. I know the land of Pala and his title.
I live there. The testimony of Male is correct.

Cl. 2029. Kailani.

Pala Sw. I know the land of the Claimant. It is in the
ili of "Kauluwela".

The Claimant obtained it in 1847, from Hekuanava,
but it has in part been taken from him until there is
only a house lot with one loi inside, left.

Cl. 2030. Kamoa.

Pala Sw. The Claimant is dead and his heirs are
three children, one Polani his daughter, and Paikauai
a son, and Haimea another daughter. It consists of
one piece in Kauluwela. 8 lois and some kula land.
There is one foalima loi in it.

It is bounded. Mauka, by the Poalima lois. Waiki-
ki, by the Honohiki's kula. Makai, by Nika's land.
Ewa, by Hekuanapanio's land.

The Claimant received it from Halali in the year
1846, when he died. The Honohiki has given it to
Polani, now the oldest child of the Claimant. Hekua-
nava is the Lord of this land.

Male Sw. The testimony of Pala is correct, for
I know the land and its title.

The Claimant's land was in Kaulawela, but he died in 1848. and having no relative, and making no will, the Honolulu took it and gave it to Nauahi. It consists of Six lots.

Cl. 2035. Makahi.

Ohule Sw. I know the Claimant, and his land. The land is 7 lots, and a piece of kula, in the ili of Mokuauia, Kailua Valley, Oahu.

It is bounded. Mauka, by Pali's land. Honolulu, by Po's land. Makai, by Kauniohuan's land. Ewa, by I. Mook's land.

The Claimant received it from Kauniohuan in the time of Kamehameha's sickness and ever since has held it in peace. Mookhona is the luna of the land under the King or Alexander.

Uma Sw. I live near this land and know what the witness Ohule has testified to is true.

Cl. 2036. Wahimohakiki

Kapahulu Sw. I know the land of the Claimant. It is in the ili of Kapahaha, Honolulu Aina, Oahu. It is two lots in one piece. She has a house but it stands on my land.

The lots are bounded. Mauka, by I. Kaeo's land. Waikiki, by Kaavao's land. Makai, by Haniku's land. Ewa, by Kluhoaloha's land.

The Claimant received this land from me in 1835, and she has held it in peace ever since. Keoni Aina is the Lord of this land.

Cl. 2038. H. Kalamau. (The Queen.)

Pulea Sw. I know the land here claimed. It is a house lot with a stone fence around it, in the ili of Pauhale, Kalahi, Oahu. It has two houses on it.

It is bounded. Mauka, by Kaunimohua's land. Mo-
nolulu and Makai sides, by the same. Ewa, by John
Li's land.

The Claimant received it from Ohule in the year
1830, and has held it in peace ever since.

Ohule, Sw. I gave the land, here claimed by the Queen,
to the Queen in 1830, and she has held it in peace ever
since.

Cl. 2041. Kika. W.

The Claimant appeared, and said she has no
true title in the lot claimed. That it belonged to Ka-
luahinenui, and she lived under her. (See Claim 236.
Kaluahinenui.)

Cl. 2042. Kauashilo.

Kaua Sw. I live in Kalawa, Ewa. The Ct's land is
there, and I know it. It consists of three lots, and a piece
of kula, in one piece.

It is bounded. Mauka, by Kawaha's land. Mo-
nolulu, by the river of Kalawa. Makai, by Kealohani's land.
Waianae, by the Government fence.

The Claimant received this land from the Honolulu
named Makaihekeka about 1843, and his title to
the same has never been disputed. In truth the Claimant
has always lived on this land from a boy.

Kaupali Sw. I live in Kalawa, Ewa, and know what

Keawe has testified to, to be true.

C. 20th. Kawaaka.

Keawe Sw. I know this land. It is in the ili of Kūmāna, Hāwāi, Ewa, Oahu. It consists of hula ground and four lots in one piece, and one fish pond in another place.

The first piece, is bounded: Mauka, by Polani's land. Honolulu, by the River. Makai, by Kauaohi's land. Waiānae, by Kane's land.

The fish pond, is bounded: Mauka, by Kūpūhiki's land. Honolulu, by Kamalanai's land. Makai, by Makaihekeheke's land. Waiānae, by Paawela's land.

The Claimant received these lands from Kamalanai in the time of Kamehameha II. and his title is without dispute.

Governor Kekuānāo'a is the Lord of this land.

Kauahali Sw. verifies all that former witness has testified.

C. 20th. Kauahali.

Keawe Sw. I know this land. It is in the ili of Panuku, Hāwāi, Ewa, Oahu. It consists of two pieces. One of 3 lots and hula, and the other is one lot.

No. 1. is bounded: Mauka, by Kauahali's land. Honolulu, by Poalima's land. Makai, by Polani's land. Waiānae, by Kane's hula.

No. 2. is bounded: Mauka, by Pūhūpaka's land. Honolulu, by my land. Makai, by Kauaui's land. Waiānae, by my land.

The Claimant obtained these lands from Kamalanai, in the time of Kamehameha II. and has occupied it in peace ever since.

Kauaohi's Sw. verifies the testimony of Keawe.

Cl. 2046. Kalawaua.

Makauai Sw. I know this land. It is in the ili of Kama-
 imo, Kalawaua, Ewa, Oahu. It consists of four lots and
 one piece of kula in one piece.

It is bounded. Mauka, by my land. Honolulu, by
 the river of Kalawaua. Makai, by Hamakaliki's land,
 Waianae, by Kaina's land.

The Claimant received it from Adamu Kani in
 1846. to be true and his title has never been disputed.
 The Claimant is a school teacher.

Adamu Kani Sw. I was the Lord of this land in
 1846. and gave this land 4 lots and one kula to be
 his, and his heirs forever. He was a good man, and
 came there to teach school.

Cl. 2047. Kekio.

Kaupali Sw. I know the Claimant's land. It is in
 the ili of Kaihuamoo, Kalawaua, Ewa, Oahu, and consists
 of two pieces.

N^o 1. is 1 1/2 lots.

" 2. " a House lot.

N^o 1. is bounded. Mauka, by Kanakaokai's land.
 Honolulu, by Kane's land. Makai, by the same, Waia-
 nae, by Kakeana's land.

N^o 2. is bounded. Mauka, by Kani's land. Hono-
 lulu, by the river of Kalawaua. Makai, by Kane's land.
 Waianae, by the Government fence.

The Claimant received these lands from Sta-
 heana, in the days of Kaomi in 1834 or 1835 perhaps,
 and has held them in peace ever since. Kekuanana is
 the Lord of the land.

Keawe Sw. The witness Kaupali has told the truth.

C. 2023. Puhī.

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Umī Sw. The Claimant is dead. He died at the great sickness in 1848. His heir is Kamakakuhoua his foster child. The land is in the ili of Muliwai, Moanalua, Oahu. It is one piece consisting of 3 lots.

Kalanikathua Jnr. Affirmed that he wrote out this Claim to land and gave it into the hands of Creingant in order to convey it to the Land Commission in the Year 1857. The land was in Awaroahina. Maunahi is the place of Kalia. Wahiti & Maikai the River. Eva Muanau Road. Claimant possessed this land before the time of Keo and held it to the time of his death without dispute. He died in 1849 and left a Widow named Kalamau who is residing upon the lot at the present time and holds it without dispute.

Katawaia confirmed the preceding testimony knowing it to be true. Witness went with Claimant to Kalo Kauwila Land Commission office when he took his Claim there. I know that the widow had since his death sold this land to Capt. John Mack for \$158 already paid and subject to other demands on the deceased husband. The widow is allowed a Residence in her house on it during her natural life. and the free use of the food on it as long as she lives. It has no fence and two houses ~~both hers~~ and a small piece of Waka attached to the Kalo land.

Capt. John Mack admitted the correctness of the preceding statement after hearing it read.

Pitiroi Konohiki after examining the Survey admitted its correctness - & that of the previous testimony

at Waiimea ever since the Kaiau War in 1825.
Maata Poku Sw. I know the St. of Kakalae
I am a Kamaaina of Waiimea, and have lived
here from the days of Kaunuuiali. The St. of
Kakalae was given to M^r. Whitney for the Mission
by Kaunuuiali in my presence before the Kaiau
war in 1825; and he held it in peace to his death.
His Title was never questioned until after
his death. Kakalina, Kaunuuiali W. Sw.
I am a Kamaaina of Waiimea, and have lived
here from the days of Kiao, King of Kaui.
I know the St. of Kakalae in dispute between
the Mission and Kekuanaua. I know that
Kaunuuiali gave this St. to M^r. Whitney when

Deborah Kapule was I am a Resident of Waialua. I was Wife of Kaumuali'i King of Kauai and resided with him at Waimaa at the time of Mr Whitney's arrival and Mr Puggles - about 1820. George Kumeokuma son of King Kaumuali'i, tells his father that Mr Whitney and Mr Puggles were good men of God, and soon after this they met with the King and had a Consultation; whereupon Kaumuali'i said to them that they would need something to live upon and immediately gave Mr Whitney the ili of Kaka'ae in Maheleli Kauai for him and his to have for ever.

To Mr Puggles he gave the ili of Aelea in Waanapepe - and to Mr Whitney Kaka'ae and the food fish, a'uhau, and all other appurtenances. all which he took possession of the ili of Kaka'ae; and held it in peace under Kaumuali'i and all his Successors until his death. Mr. Kekuanooa as Guardian of Victoria Kamehameha's hei of Kinau, disputed the title of Mr Whitney after his death, but never before. I am positive that this land was given to Mr Whitney for the Mission, to have and to hold to him and his Successors for ever.

Kaumuali'i was pleased to have Mr Whitney as a Teacher; and gave him this land to live upon the fruits thereof as a kind of Compensation for his labors.

Oliver Chapin says I am a President of Waialeale
 at this time. I am one of the local Circuit Judges
 of Kauai. When Mr. Whitney arrived I was a Boy
 in 1820. Mr. Ruggles came with him. I then lived
 with the King Kaumuali'i at Waimea. I was
 one of his Kahili bearers. I remember Mr.
 Whitney and Ruggles inquired my age. I did not
 know my years - but they concluded I was 13
 from what I told them. I think I was
 older. I was present at the first interview
 between them and the King. I was with the
 King at the time. George the Son of Kaumuali'i
 had been to U. States and came out with the
 Missionaries. Keata a Native who had been
 on N.W. coast with Vancouver, was Interpreter.
 George claimed the two Missionaries as his men -
 but it was decided at the Interview that they
 were Gods men. Kaumuali'i asked if they were
 going to live permanently at Waimea. They replied
 Yes, if God wish us, and You may bury our bones
 here. He inquired their work - and they said to
 teach him and his people to read and to write &
 to worship the God in Heaven. They then
 went to Oahu, and brought their Wives to Waimea
 Kaumuali'i on their return, offered to give them
 four lands - one each to Mr. Whitney, Mr. Whitney
 Mr. Ruggles and Mr. Ruggles. but they said
 No - one land to each of us (the husbands) is
 all we want. He then gave Mr. Whitney one
 land called "Kahala" an ili in the Ahupua'a
 of Mokuwele - and to Mr. Ruggles the ili of
 Ekele in Hanapepe. Mr. Whitney took possession
 of his land, and held it in peace to his

death - it was given to him to hold for him & his Successors for ever, but if Mr Whitney had given this land away to another, the Chiefs would have opposed it. The title of the Mission was never disputed till after the death of Mr Whitney.

Isaiah Perkins Swi I know Kina's lands in the
 ili of Anoiailimu. Honohu'e aina. consisting of

The House lot & 10 lots are not disputed. The
 other two are. Keaniani gave these lands to Claimant
 when Boti left the Islands about 1829. These lands
 were originally in one piece until cut up by the Nau-
 auu road. Claimant held the land in peace till
 1843 and when the Honohu'e Keaweluaiki took
 away No 1 and 3 on the ground that they were
 poalima lots - which to my knowledge No 3 cer-
 tainly was not. I can say the same of No 2. They
 were not poalima lots in Keaniani's time. I
 have known the land well from the time the
 fort was built.

Naili'li sw. I know Claim^d lands. I was Clerk who kept the Records of the trial respecting No 2 and 3 before Hoolihiamane in 1847. He was una aubau of Honoa and Hoina appealed to him against Keawe'luahi about his taking away these two two lois. He heard at length the parties litigant and decided that the lo's should be restored to Hoina, and that the food in the lo's at that time should be Keawe'luahi's, and the land Hoina's, but Keawe'luahi planted the lo's again and Hoina appealed again to Hoolihiamane who decided as before, that the lo's were not pualima, and ought to be restored.

Naone sw. I am a Tamaina of Hono'ulu, and have known these lands now in dispute from the days of Kamehameha II. The lo's No 2 and 3 were not pualima lo's, and there was not foundation for the dispossession of Hoina by Keawe'luahi or Pitiroi.

Resumed H^e March 1850

Paiunae sw. I am a Tamaina of Auwaiolimu and know the lo's in dispute between Hoina and Pitiroi. They were pualima lo's from time of Kamehameha I to that of Keawiani in 1836, and then he gave these two lo's to Hoina who was one of his women from Tirotau. Hoina cultivated them and had the food from them from that time to the coming of a new Honohiki. Keawe'luahi, who took

them away from her in 1842 and held them until
the trial before Kooliainanu in 1846 or 7 - he
decided that the lois did not belong to Hoina
but belonged to the Konohiki as Pooalima lois.

Kane Sr. I am a Kamaaina of Auwaeioimee
and know these lois, and have from Kamehu ¹
^{when} Lapawale was Konohiki, and Kauli Kooaina
who then cultivated them - they were not Pooalima.

Kapumau was then Lord of the Land, who going
to Hawaii gave it in charge of Kanohapu and
Kailli was continued as Kooaina of these lois.
When Kauli died they were given to Kahikapu
and she was then over him at Konohiki.

Kahikapu held them until my father Naone
begged the use of them from him, and put fish
into them - my father was Konohiki of the land
the fish were the Kings; and the food Kahikapu
when Doti left the land came into the hands
of Elaha, and Keanyani was appointed over it.
He took the land from my father and his wife
and gave these two lois to Hoina as his Koo-
aina - from that time to 1842 Hoina had
these lois till Keaweleahi took them away.

Kooliainanu tried the case and gave them
back to Hoina, as having a good title. I am
not related to Hoina and do not live with her.

Kekeino recalled. I know N-3 was a Pooalima

Kiapua sw. I am a Kamaaina of Waialae
 and was born there and have lived there all my
 life. In Kaahumanu's time my father
 an old Resident, took me with him I shewed
 me all the boundaries of all the lands round
 about. The bounds of Waialae, Kapahulu
 side are as said by Kepo the last witness.
 Kekio is a land Maikai of the Road of
 Makana and a small piece Maikai Kapua
 a sea and a Cocoa nut Grove - "Kii Kii".

Kehea sw - Iawa Kamaina of Waialae, and have always lived there. I know its bounds, and they include the disputed land of "Kaainuu". I have known them from the days of Kamehameha I.

Kaula sw - I have lived at Waialae since the death of Kaahumanu I. My knowledge of the boundaries of Waialae is the same as given by three former witnesses. My Brother - a very old Kamaina of Waialae pointed out the boundaries to me.

The house lot has been correctly bounded by Kalanikahua - Cl^o had it from Hekeia-Maou in 1837 or 8 - he took his lot for a street and gave him the lot, and he held it in peace until his death in 1849.

it is only partly fenced - Moos - Claimants husband is her heir - since her death Kaapunihi has disputed "moos" title.

Cl^o had N^o 2 & 3 from Kaha in 1842. her title to these was never disputed.

March 26. Kiaapiki came as a Countess Clermont and offered Mumukia as witness. Suon - I know Mr House lot in dispute with Kiaapiki - it belonged to Hoanaki who got it from Gov^l of Oahu in 1839. She held it in peace until 1846 - when she went to Hawaii and died - leaving Kiaapiki as her heir. Kaumoana lived in the same lot - but under Hoanaki - who first went to the Governor who consented she should have the land - which she fenced - After wards Kaumoana went and the Gov^l gave the place to him - they both lived there together, and after Hoanaki's death the trouble fell down.

Kawahakui Sw. I am a Kamaoia of Honolulu and know this lot in dispute - it was given to Kaumoa by Kekeanani about 1839 - and he had lived there in peace ever since, except that Kiaapiki has claimed it as the heir of Hoanaki. Clermont & Hoanaki occupied it together until the death of Hoanaki.

John Si Sw. I know this house lot in dispute between Kaumoa and Hoanaki. When Kaumoa was near death in 1840 he said to me, he wished to make his will and give this lot to Moo - his heir. He died in about 10 days. I do not know the merits of this dispute.

Andrew Sw. I know Mr Reynolds' house lot in this claim. He got it from MacKintosh who bought it from Rich^d Ridley about 1838. MacKintosh

J. Reynolds sw. I know this lot - it is at the corner of Beretane St. and Fort St. Honolulu - C Brewer bought it from Capt. Gorham to Nye between 1831 & 1833, and has had peaceable possession of it ever since.

R. W Wood de. appeared for Ct. and offered in Evid^e a deed of the Premises from Elizabeth Grimes to William C. Little, deceased husband of Claimant - dated Nov^r. 30. 1837.

J. Reynolds sw. on deed being shown to the Claimant. "I am a subscribing witness to this deed - and was present at its execution: it was signed and sealed by Elizabeth Grimes. Mr. Little had possession of these premises until his death in 1838 - and his widow (Ct.) has had peaceable possession of the same ever since. I have always understood that she had these premises as her dower out of W. C. Little's Estate.

R. W Wood sw. I know the premises of Mr. Hooper in this Claim, in Honolulu Oahu.

She rec^d them in 1839 as her dower out of the Estate of W. C. Little; and has held them

in peace ever since. The Governor of Oahu, then acting as Judge of Probate, subsequently ratified the action of the Administrators of W. C. Little's Estate in setting these premises ^{apart} aside as her third or dower. C. Paevee and W. Ladd were those administrators.

Claimant married her present husband in 1839 Mr. Hooper - but before the marriage, they entered into an abtenuptial agreement, by which these premises were secured to her. It is on Record in the Registrars Office.

Gov^t Kihuanoo was notified to attend this day before the Commission, if he had any counter claim to this Land - which he did not do.

Kusha Sw. I know of Nancy's living on this land for the last 10 years, and of her paying its taxes. I live on Nuuanu lala.

Praepitau Sw. I am a Tamamaia of Pau, though I do not live on the land. I know Nancy's title to this land is good. Because she has paid the taxes on it for many years and received its fruits.

Aimaha Tekehuapio was present. but said she had no witnesses to bring forward - but added that this land was set apart to her husband at the recent division of lands; and this was the foundation of her claim.  before Hoapili dies - I went as one of the Com-
 -pany of Kekuialike, whom Mapu gave a

 Kekuialike this party went to Kaula - but I
 and Hoanaloa remained & lived there under
 Mapu - Soon after about 1840 when Kika was

Kahalemahe Sw. I am an old son of Lahauna
 and well know this land in dispute - Mapu
 had it from his sister in Hoapili's time -
 while Nahienaena was alive - and the sister
 being Keewa - the land was taken from her,
 & given to Kahuwa & Mapu lived on it under
 Kahuwa as his Koaaina - Kahuwa then
 divided this land called Hoapili with Mapu

each treating a part as his separate property. I lived there under Maapu. Tektualike being in trouble for a place came & asked Maapu to live under him. He agreed & so they lived there a while & then left with all his people except Umi'umi, & his sister who remained under Maapu. Tektualike left in 1835. I heard him ask for the place - Maapu gave him a spot on the express conditions, that when he left it should revert to him - (Maapu). Kuaamauna took the part occupied by Tektualike about 1842. And has since occupied it - not in peace - for Maapu has constantly disputed his claim.

Kekuamauna admitted that he held this land under Maapu - he had the same right in it, that Tektualike had - he said he held it for Kakaama - Tektualike's son. Kaka see for Kekuamauna. I am an old Resident of Lahaina and know the disputed land - In 1825 Maapu & I lived on this land - and in 1826 Tektualike came - and we consented he should live there - which he did till 1835 about - when Maapu and I divided the land - 250 fathoms was given to Maapu in length and 17 in width; and mine was 207 by 8 fathoms; his part was mauiha & mine Makai. Kekuamauna's house lot was then in Tektualike's hands; and was in the part belongg. to Maapu. Tektualike lived under Maapu. I consider Kekuamauna is now in possession of all the rights of Tektualike. viz he has a right to live on the land by paying a tax: he lived there from 1813 - but disputed, though not constantly, by Maapu.

Mataia Kenui, see. Soon after the Hawai was in 1825 I came here to Lahaina with Tektualike following in the company of the Chiefs.

When we landed we looked for a residence, Kekuaitike found a place under Maapu's shade - where they lived together till the land was divided with Kahuwa. But Kekuaitike still lived under Maapu. It is clear to me that Maapu is the superior; & Kekuaitike and all claiming under him are the inferior dwellers on this disputed lot.

Kaunakakai saw Kekuaitike, when he came here, made friends with Maapu & went to live in his place. Kekuaitike was a man of property, and went to Molokai bringing food to live upon & gave to Maapu - he lives there in peace - but was under Maapu.

Concerning Kohokalo Pohakapu ili of Pohakupua Waimaku as claimed by Kane and opposed by Hialea, owner of the ili, as belonging to Kooles of the Honohiki. Present Hialea and Kane with the latter witnesses. Witnesses of Hialea are Sarai I. I's wife - Katekemahewa of Kapalama. Neither present.

Paioa saw fa Kane - I am an old Resident of this place from my youth, and I have always known the Kohokalo in question and have never known it as a Kooles of Honohiki it always belonged to the deputy of the Honohiki who used to reside with the King - (the Honohiki proper) I have never known the deputy to take fish or food from the Kohokalo as tribute to his superior. When the Honohiki visited the place, perhaps at the deputy's

house. The latter would take food or fish from the loko for his entertainment. I have never known the ^{eligible} people of the place to in the loko on Koele days. They used to work on those days in the Koeles called Maakole in the moovinas adjoining the loko of Pohakupu.

Paele sw. I am a resident here from Kameh^a-1. I know and understand all about the loko of I-o-ha-kupu - it is not a Koele - it is like a moovina of a Kanaha under the Konohiki - it always belonged to the deputy of the Konohiki, as his land. The Konohiki was a King's man & resident with him. He usually chose one of the resident people of the land, but sometimes another from another place as his deputy - and when he visited to obtain food and put up the house of the deputy, he was sometimes fed from the food and fish from the loko - it was in another place where the people wrought on the Koele days. I know that when a Konohiki became offended with the deputy, he had power to turn him off from his lands. (In reply to Kalelea)

the second wife by whom he has two children.

Aikanaha gave him a piece of ground in 1825
the same piece now occupied by the stores of
Loana Ho = & the Chinaman. he ~~was~~ on that

piece of land till 1841 as his own land without
 dispute till 1841. he was his professed friend. having
 married his wife out of his family. Pahiwa then
 took the land away, claiming it for the first time
 as his land. Claimant would not consent to take
 his house down till he gave him another piece -
 he then applied to the King and gave him the
 Red Lion Land opposite or nearly so. There was
 only one house on it which was formerly the old
 grog shop of Green & Western & Elliot - who rented
 it while they held it & then deserted it for the
 present land of P. Thompson. he then put his house
 up on the newly granted lot. which belonged to
 Madame Roto who was then dead & now to the
 King as her heir. Healds soon after came & took
 away the part of the land now occupied by
 Nicholson the tailor. & rented it to Jenkins who
 was a tailor, who put up the present building in
 part. he thinks the rent has been paid ever
 since to the Government, & the lease to be 25 years.
 Wylie bought Jenkins out & Nicholson succeeded.
 This alienation of part of the land given by the
 King constituted about $\frac{1}{2}$ of the land -
 and the Claimant has occupied the other part
 ever since without any dispute. he says his
 witnesses are all dead and Pahiwa who
 was the direct agent in the transfer is away
 and supposed dead also. and that he ought
 not to lose the benefit of his Evidence as he
 appeared to his subpoena at Hiale Hauwida
 and no Commission was sitting that day
 to take his Evidence - when he had engaged
 his passage to leave for San Francisco.

The 3 persons who were present when the land was
 delivered to me in the name of the King by Pahiwa

were 10 in number - Thomas Seagram and John Ogden - who are all dead. besides several natives who are also dead.

There was one native named Kaaleo or Monday living on this place with the first foreigners - in a small grass house who went away when he entered.

Kailiniay Wife of Mr. Parker & daughter of Claimant. States that her Mothers land at Waialua is in Palaa - it consists of one piece of Tula and Kalo - it is principally Kalo and a fish pond - it is a large land. Claimant derived it from her ancestors who have possessed it from time of Kamaha-meha! - without dispute - it has a portion of the Sea named Papapali attached to the inheritance of the other - the main land claimed is called Kalia. This entire land was taken away from the Claimant in about the year 1842 or soon after Kiana's death - by the orders of Kekuanoa. at the supposed instigation of Kao's mother ^(in law) Kakuahine. Claimant is his true mother. Poho Kua Wahine was then placed on it - and goes for the owner of the land. Claimant has ever since lived on witnesses land. The land tax of the contested lot was estimated at from 20 to 25 ^{each year} dollars - which was always paid by Claimant through her husband Mokuunui up to the time the land was seized and occupied by Kakuahine. The land was taken away through the influence of Kao the Claimant's son who always behaved bad to her and coveted her possessions - and sought his wife's mother Kakuahine to aid his views.

Claimants Impulsion was altogether an arbitrary act without right and against the laws regarding the right of property in lands and other things then established.

One exception existed to the above statement as to the payment of the land tax. The receiving Agent of it Kauwara in the Year about 1851 rejected the full payment on account of $\frac{1}{2}$ of it which consisted of a fathom hog not being in sufficiently good condition and he then took away about $\frac{1}{2}$ the land from the Claimant - but restored it in a few months upon the payment by M^r. Parker of 10. as an equivalent for the rejected Hog constituting half. M^r. Parker stated that he took the present claim himself to Kale Kautoua and gave it to Judge Andrews in presence of the Pres^t & other members. And that Claimants Son Kale laau wrote it.

The name is Kapa Kautoua its number added above - About 35 trators under Cl['] were turned off at the time of seizure - and a new set are there constituting a powerful Counties Current of influence against a new settlement of the affair accordg to right. See Page 530

French built the wharf and he & Charlton have occupied it ever since. John Meek sw. & knows the wharf called Charlton's, it was erected by W. French about 1828 - they have jointly occupied it ever since without dispute - He understood then that native vessels were to have the privilege of com^g. along side of the wharf. Com. Gen. Miller sw. said - After Karamohe had granted the land to Charlton, Botke gave

him permission to erect a wharf or wharves.
 In the written grant, no mention is made of the
 privilege of Native Vessels coming along side
 of this wharf nor do I believe any such arrange-
 -ment ever was made. M^r Steiner holds a lease
 from Charlton, of the Premises, including the Wharf -
 this lease has not yet expired.

James Robinson explained the extent of their

 this lot in peace ever since the purchase.

Sherman Test. etc. he knows the Ho^l lot N^o 1 in this claim. In 1830 Dr. Poole was in treaty with Mary Green for the purchase of this lot. She then possessed it. I know Dr. Poole was in possession of it in the August of that year - and he has ever since held it in peace. It is bounded East side by premises formerly owned by Moody & Const-Mauka by Mary Duckles and on all sides, as just stated by Neoha.

Rev. J. P. Emerson Sir In about 1837 Keiaua granted to me a certain part of the land now occupied by Mr. Gulick to aid the Church. This grant included the Western end, contains probably 3 to 5 acres. It did not I think include the spot of Mr. Gulick's house lot. That spot, as I understood Mr. Poole came into an unwritten Contract between him & Peanui, by which Mr. Poole to pay Peanui a certain sum per ann: for the remainder of the land which Mr. Gulick now claims. This land has been in the possession & use of the Mission from ab: 1838. to this time.

Witness admitted Mr. Metcalf's survey correct.

 by Keaumoku's; Ewa by J. Reynolds & Peter's.

This land was formerly Kekuanaoa's. I recollect Mr. Diell's
 application to Winau in 1833 for it; and it was given to him
 for that purpose; it is enclosed - M. Kekuanaoa assented
 to this gift. The House lot was derived in the same
 manner: it is enclosed - bounded Mauike by Kahuana St.
 Waiteke - W Ladd's; Maikai Blonde Gard. Ewa Catholic Prom-
 -ises.

J. C. B. Rooka Sw. Confirmed the above des. George Wood
 superintended the erection of the Chapel in 1833. The
 House lot I think was given to Mr. Diell by the King
 whose private property it then was. (Stated in N. Test³
 to have been given by Kekuanaoa)

C. N. 1210 Kepaa Translation N.D. K. Nov 11.
 1846
 Kuoha Sw. I have no connection with Kepaa, nor
 do we live in one lot - her place is Mauike of Ladd's
 store - she lived with her husband till they disputed
 with the people who lived with them in Liholili's time
 & then we brought them here to live; I gave the piece
 to Kepaa - her right has never been disputed to this time.

Poo sw: Kapa is my Sister (or Cousin) she live in one place, but I have given to her absolutely a part of my lot - and the rights I gave her were mine - no one else had any rights in it.

1849 Kawahakiki County, Hawaii
 Kaupena sw: I know about Kekaule the taking down Claim^t houses by the River, & Manuia sent Kikiau to point out another place for him which he has got - no one has ever disputed his right to it to this time -

Kaluahinonui sw: I have no Connection with Claim^t. In Manuia's time his house stood in front of mine - mauna of John Meeks, & he was driven away by me & Kekaule twice, & Kekaule complained & the house was pulled down and Claimant went to Manuia who found him a place mauna of mine, where he built a house. There was no house or fence on it at the time it was vacant, and since then I have known about it, & he inclosed it this people. I do not know any Cause^t of it.

Kaapuike sw: This place I know: it is at Kahauike - it is cultivated. He made the enclosure which is nearly all round it. He came to me to build his wall in Lou Paul's time 1843 and shortly after the heard it was to be given to his Punahoa - & because he heard it was to be given to 'I'hi, he went to the Monohiki.

G. P. Judd sw: This man came to me and said he wanted to enclose some unoccupied land - I told him to fence it & cultivate it, & it might afterwards be arranged - I do not think it will be taken away from you: that is all

I know.

Ewa sw. I recollect we once talked about the land without agreeing - then he enclosed it - and it has since been a place of Cultivation for us - the cattle being kept separate from it - I helped to enclose it in 1841.

Kalema sw. I am not a relation of Kawahakui we have worked together because my Grandfather was his friend or lived with him - His reason for enclosing it was to procure its Cultivation. The land belonged to Kaumealani. He did not give us permission to enclose it and now disputes it - who wants his cattle to go into the enclosure - Kawahakui is a topa, but I am Kaumealani's hoacina - and we altogether enclosed it - and the produce in it belong to us in common.

The distance from the bank of one River to the other must be 40 or more fathoms.

C. 135 Iona Kiihōi.

Atahi sw. From the mouth of Piliha came the words of the wife of Kulauka - Piliha was his heir and his children under Piliha - All his lands were to go to Piliha & the children were to be the Kamakas; & if they the children did not live right, then the King was to take away the land; therefore the children have done wrong and I have heard that the lands & property of Piliha were taken away by Kameka^{III}.

Stephen Reynolds sw. I knew Oliver Holmes ever
since the year 1811 - his children now living are George
& Charlotte Holmes. I know the land claimed by
George Holmes in Honolulu. Oliver Holmes I know
was in possession of this land from 1811 until his death
in 1824 or 1825 - (On Witness being shown M^r Turners
Survey of the land recognized it as being that of

which he speaks above.) Witness proceeded - Charlotte Holmes lived with her father on this land up to 1823, but not afterwards. The land had been occupied by Mr Bancroft, Mr Spear & George Holmes, heirs of Oliver Holmes, subsequent to his death. I always understood that Oliver Holmes got the lot from Kamekameha & Holmes was an assistant to the Governor of Oahu for a long time. Holmes did not get the land by his wife. I have heard George Holmes admit the rights of some of the Heirs, but he denied that Charlotte Holmes had any claim to this land. saying that she had a house lot elsewhere. George Holmes Charlotte Holmes Heir of Mr Bancroft, & the heirs of Mr Spear are the claimants jointly to this land.

Oliver Holmes died without leaving a will. I am positive he did not devise the land through his wife. I recollect there was a wall put up on the side of the lot next Ewa to divide the lot. The portion next Ewa was designated by George Holmes as Mr Hardwick's portion. & the next part on Waititi's side of the wall was occupied by Mr Spear & his wife about 1833 or 1834. George Holmes afterwards caused the wall to be removed - thereby taking in all the lot into one.

Mr Hardwick & Mr Spear have about $\frac{1}{2}$ of the lot. From all I know of this claim I consider that Charlotte Holmes is justly entitled to one quarter of the lot. George Holmes has possessed the lot for some time, but not undisturbed. He has pretended to hold all the lot since about 1840, I held Mr Spear's power of Attorney, under which I

disputed that part of the claim which belongs to M^r. Speir's heirs, since 1840. When George Holmes leased a part of this land to M^r. Nadal & Nadal was about to erect his house on it, I & R. G. Davies went together to Nadal and cautioned him not to build on the land, as it was in dispute. I think this was in 1846. The wall spoken of as having been removed by George Holmes was removed about the time Nadal erected his house. I think it was taken down after M^r. Davies and I had forbidden the erection of the house on the land.

J. C. B. Brooke sw. I have heard M^r. Reynolds' testimony & I know the greater part of it to be correct. When I first knew the family in 1829, George Holmes occupied a store house & grass house adjoining, which stood on the Waititi part of the lot. Soon after, 1830 perhaps, M^r. Speir enclosed his wife's part of the lot with a slab fence. This I know because I was daily in his house. He after built a cook house upon it. The fence was about the centre of the lot. Charlotte & Mary had a house on the Ewa part of the lot. Their Mother had a house on the Waikaha part.

In conversation with the family, I understood that the division then recognized among them was intended to be observed by the several heirs. I have always heard from old M^r. Young and others, that Oliver Holmes got the land from Kam-ehameha I. Mary's part of the lot was offered to me on mortgage by Hoardwick in 1842. I remember an adobe wall being built between Mary's part of the lot and that of Speir.

George Wood sw. I know Charlotte Holmes I have known the family since 1825. I know the lot in question. I always understood that

Olivier Holmes got the land from Kamehameha I
 I know the four children spoken of by Mr.
 Pegg, notes to have been heirs of Olivier Holmes -
 After their father's death, the children all lived
 on the land claim.

Wm Sumner sw: I know the 4 children of
 Olivier Holmes spoken of by the foregoing
 Witnesses to have lived on the lot in question -
 Just after Helen was married to Hardwick
 I understood from her, that George Holmes
 objected to her building the adobe wall on the
 lot, because she had married a foreigner;
 but he afterwards gave his consent, and the
 wall was finished before she left for the United
 States.

J. H. Brown sw: says - In conversing with
 George Holmes about the House lot in dispute
 he has told me several times, that if Robert -
 (R. G. Davies) would let him alone, he would
 give him the part of the land which he wanted
 as it belonged to Mr Davies' Mother Charlotte
 Holmes. At other times, he has told me that
 the lot on which he lives, belonged not solely
 to him, but that other members of the family
 had rights in it. One of these conversations
 took place in May or June last across the
 fence between our lots.

11-25-4 C. Holmes continued 22 Nov?

Kameulupoo sw: I know the house lot of Holmes
 he got the land from Kamehameha I & lived there
 to his death. When he died, he left all his move-
 -able property to George, and all the land he
 got from the King. His Widow had a part
 of the property, & when she died, George

was Holmes favorite Child. Holmes did not make a written will - it was not then customary to write them.

Poomou sev: I know this lot. Holmes got it from Kamehameha & occupied it till his death. Holmes died in an adobie house on the lot in question. I formerly lived with Holmes. When Holmes was dying he said to George. "When I die, all my property will be Yours; & My Widow will occupy under you." George has occupied this lot since his fathers death. Some of the Children used to live on the lot; but they all left except George.

Houvi sev. I know the lot of Holmes. he got it from Kamehameha. When Holmes died he left all his property to George, & his Widow was to live on the land under George. I did not understand that the other Children were to have any part of the lands.

Opunui sev. I know this lands. I knew Maki the Mother of George Holmes. He knew some of Holmes' Children who lived on the lands.

George Holmes presented the Will of his Mother filed it with the Boards; which follows:—

in those days when any man of note was dying, for all the natives who were dependants to enter the house, and if any will was made it was generally talked about. I talked with the natives in the house the same Evening, but no mention was made of a will - Mr. Hammet who was husband of Charlotte was present when Holmes died, & I have often heard him say that he left no will. There were other portions of Holmes' property which were set off for some of his Children before his death. I have never heard George say that he claimed the property under a will of his father. I knew a many of the people who lived with Mr. Holmes. Five or six years ago or more, one of his dependants called to see me, & said, that when he died there would be none of Mr. Holmes' people left. I have not seen any of them a long time. I have heard from Charlotte long before the Commission, that her father left no will.

John Meek sw: I was intimately acquainted with Oliver Holmes & his Children. I have heard them talk about their father's Estate. I remember Mr. Speis living there - & have heard him in California's speak of building on his Wife's part of the lot.

Mr. Holmes died in a Grass house on the E. or side of the lot in question. I knew all his dependants. I have not seen any of them for some time - I think I should know any of them if I saw them. I believe they are all dead. I have never heard any of the Children speak of a will being made by their father. If there had been any, I think should have known it.

Kanenukoo sw: When Piholoho's remains were brought home I was on Kowari. My house in Honolulu was makai of Pihlabery

house, that lot was Wahi-maikai's - when Holmes was sick. I went to his place - to stop on acc^t of his trouble. I think he died before Liholih's body arrived - but is not certain of it. I was not here when the King was buried. Holmes died after I returned from Hawaii. I went to him to live in friendship - I had to do what he told me. I was born soon after the battle of Muanuu. Holmes had the Delirium tremas some time before his death - this was perhaps a month before. I think he died of it. I heard him speak of his property when he was in good health. He said all his land and personal property was to go to George. Before his last sickness I heard Holmes wish the lot in dispute to George, and his Mother was to live under him, and a part of the land was given to Hannah, and a part to Charlotte. This part of Charlotte adjoins Tahi's land on the Maunua side. it is now occupied by R. G. Davies. I have heard this is the place given by Holmes to Charlotte. Maki, the Mother of George Holmes & Witness were present when Holmes willed his property. Heaka who is dead was present. Hannah & George were there. Charlotte was young at the time. I had then no husband. She was not pregnant when Holmes died. Poomou was one of the persons present at his death. Haui was present when Holmes made his will & I think when he died.

I never knew Spei & his wife to live on the lot. Spei never lived there before Holmes' death. Charlotte & Jane lived after their fathers death, in the lot occupied now by R. G. Davies. I think Mary lived sometimes in Hannah's & sometimes in Charlotte's. I do not know where Mary died - nor where Jane died. I went to Haui & lived there a long time. Poomou sw. I am a Native of Kona Hawaii.

I lived here about 1822. Piholho had not gone to England at the time. Maiki was his Chief. When Piholho's remains came from England Holmes was dead. I helped to bury him. I know the names of Holmes Children - Hannah, George, Polly, Charlotte, Mary & Jane.

After Holmes' death, Hannah lived where her house is. Charlotte lived where R. G. Davies is - & Mary & Jane were going to Hro between this & California. When Mary & Jane were there they lived sometime at Hannah's & Charlotte's.

alternately, but not under George. Holmes had delirium tremens when he died, in the grass house. George & his mother & several natives were there when Holmes willed his property - this was in the adobe house - there were some old men also present - Kaiwioaao - Kama -

& a woman who is dead. This was the nature of Holmes word to George before his death -

- that all the land he got from the King & all his moveable property - to George, subject to the dower of his Mother - I do not know that Speer or his wife ever lived on the lot in question, or that they ever built any fence on it - I do not know any fence dividing the lot, except what separates Hannah's lot from Polly's.

Kaui Sw. I am a native of Oahu - & have lived in Honolulu before the sailing of Pihoriko. Manini was my Chief. He went to live with Holmes when he was sick. He was sick in the adobe house & died in the grass house. I went then to assist by order of Manini - George did not ask me to come here & give testimony. It was Ene,

he asked me to do so about the house lot. I have not talked with George about his father's will. I am just returned from Hawaii. Holmes had delirium tremens before his death. I have heard him talk to George about the property while he had the shakes. I went to live with him when he was sick. Holmes had the shakes after I went there. Mahi & George were present at the time Holmes willed the property to George. I do not know Mr. Speir, nor whether Mrs. Speir was married when Holmes died.

Kaivi Iw. I built the adobie wall dividing Mary's part of the lot. I was employed by Mr. Boardman & her husband to erect the wall. George Holmes was living on the other part of the lot at the time this wall was built. I know that Speir & his wife lived on the side next Waititi. Jane lived near the center of the lot. Mr. Speir built a grass ho^{use} on it. They used the Cook house. I lived mauka of Ho'ouluhu at the time of Holmes' death. I know George took down the adobie wall.

Kaiviaoas Iw. I know the Holmes' lot - it belonged originally to Kam^{ua} 1. who gave it to Holmes. I am one of Holmes' people. I heard his will. He lived in the adobie house & died in the Guest house. When he made his will he was not very sick. He left the property to George - and also the moveable property & the lands. Mahi was to live under George, & with him. I know they after lived together, on the lot. The other children Mary, Jane & some one else, lived at times on the place under their mother. I know at one time when the children lived on the lot, it was divided by fences into several pieces. Charlotte

got her piece through her husband, Hammett
The title is Georges & not the Childrens.
When Holmes made his Will Charlotte & George
and I were present. There were others here -
but they are all dead.

Kama sw: I know this lot. I live on G,
Holmes land. I know O Holmes left all his
land to George, he was to be head of the family
his mother was to occupy under him. Jane &
Mary lived on the land at times after the
death of their father - George had a house on
the lot & Spein this wife lived on it.

John Flandreau sw: "About 3 years ago,
M^r. Hardwick & George Holmes were in the national
house, and they were talking about some property
in Honolulu. M^r. Hardwick asked Holmes if
a part of the property did not belong to M^r.
Hardwick. M^r. Holmes said Yes, a part does
belong to her. Hardwick at the time asked me
to bear it in mind (what George Holmes had said)

D^r. Poole sw: I know the land in question
it was formerly Harry Farmers Goat Pen.

In 1832 I was attorney for M^r. Charlton during
his absence at the Society Islands. This land
formed a part of that obtained by Charlton from
Gov^r. Poole. Among other Instructions given me
by Charlton was this - that he had given this land
to Farmer, & that he must not be disturbed
in its possession.

Harry Farmer gave George Anderson permis-
sion to build a house on the piece in question
but I never understood that he gave away
the land. I know also that Charlton was

angly with Farmer for even allowing any one else to
claim upon it. saying that he gave it to him for his
own use only. My impression of it is that Charles
gave Farmer the use of the lands for himself and
family only. I know he so expressed himself.
Claim disallowed by vote of the House

"Resolved that the Report of the Committee on
the division of the Chief's House lots be received
and adopted, except so much as refers to the lands
of Charles Kianaina; and the Land Commission
be and are hereby authorized, to award the house
lots in accordance therewith.

It is proper that we should give our seasons for assigning so small a portion of L. L. & Nonia's lots to the Gov^t; which will be found in the fact, that they have heretofore made liberal grants to the Gov^t. for roads, a Cresset lot &c.

4th Joshua Kaco has two lots in Honolulu & it being impracticable to divide them, we would recommend that royal patents be granted to him for said lots, upon his conveying to the Govern^t. the Ahupuaa of Kukuihala in Puna, Hawaii.

5th Neoholia & Ka Patea have 3 lots in Honolulu, which we would recommend should be granted to them in fee simple, without division; they first conveying to the Government the Ahupuaa of Keala-hua in the district of Kula - 1st^d of Maui.

P. Reynolds sw. I know the lot claimed in Honolulu it is bounded Mauka by Peretania P. Waititi by Samu Maku's lot, Makai by R. C. Church's lot - Ewa by Mr. Vidai's & Pimides.

Mr. Crowell came here before 1836. He was a blacksmith & married Pamela with whom he lived till his death. He got the lot from some foreigner. I think the Bill of sale may be in the U. S. Consulate. I think he died 1839 - his Widow and Child have lived there ever since his death. When Crowell died he left the Property to his Child - The Widow after married Whiting - a blacksmith - & after he died she married J. Kassel, another Blacksmith. I have never heard their Claim disputed.

Gov. Kekuanaoa, sw. - I know Mr. Kanoua's land in Kapalama it is the ili of Kawapuaa - I know the E. boundary it joins my land - it is bounded E. by an old auwai clear from the Maunaloa boundary to lot of John Needles. The Kula lands called Nanala and Kumpali are not included in the boundaries claimed by Kanoua. I gave Kooli, Kiamani, the part of the "Pa Hooli, Kiamani" which lies E of the old auwai. This auwai is the boundary between Honolulu & Kapalama. There was a fence formerly running

along the old Auwai form^s. the boundary between what was given to Hood's claim and Kanoo's land Kaapuu^{ka} Sw. I know the land called Kainapuaa. - The bounds are - Hon^u - an old Auwai - Makai, Neddles stone wall. Ewa Ho, Zupplien - Kuumupali was in the hands of my father formerly - it is makai of Neddles place; the ili of Nauata is W of Kuevas Ho. Zupplien.

Kaau^{rou} Sw. I know Cl^d land in Kapa - Sama. it is the ili of Kainapuaa - mauka is the land of Kahuatou - Honolulu an old Auwai - bound^s. Kapalama & Honolulu - Makai land called Kuumupali - Ewa Ho Zupplien. Kuumupali lies makai of Neddles house. No part of it is included in Kanoo's Claim. The ili Nauata has no Kula in it; it is not included in Kanoo's Claim.

I am a Kamaeina of that place & live close to it now. My ancestors lived there before Kapue Sw. I live in Kapalama know Kanoo's land there, called Kainapuaa - The bounds are - mauka Kahuatou - Honolulu Kuhuimans separated by an old Auwai - Makai Kuumupali - Ewa Keli^{keli}awa - land of Zupplien. No part of Kuumupali is included in Kanoo's Claim. The ili called Nauata has no Kula land; it is Kula land to the W. of Kanoo's Claim. I have lived there, and therefore know well the bounds Kainapuaa extends from Kahuatou to the Kahu^{ka} stretch makai.

Anu^{nu} Sw. I know the boundary of Kainapuaa - Honolulu an auwai - makai the road to Ewa - Ewa Kukelewai stream

I was born in Kapalama, and my Ancestors lived there before me. They planted potatoes in the ihu Nauala. The land Raunuku lies between Waiaipuaa & Nauala.

Pi'ai Kulanani sw. Confirmed the boundaries given by last Witness, and said he was well acquainted with the boundaries of the land in dispute.

Hooolekua sw. I know the land in dispute, Waiaipuaa, I have planted patches in Nauala (Kala land) I do not know of any Kula belong^g to it.

Kanoas land joins Ho. Tuppicians.

Kaha sw. Kooli'iamanu said to me, "Do you build the fence round the pua. I do not know the boundaries."

Kanoa offered to bring forward 10 more Witnesses to confirm Kekuanaoas statement - Waapuuhi, Waamoua & Kapua - which the Commⁿ thought unnecessary.

M. Kekuanaoa sw. "We had a meeting at Ollauna Kila. The ahaolelo met there, and the Claim of Deadman was brought forward in the name of D^r Rooke. This was in 1843. It was understood that Rooke had the same right of lease to the land (kookimalama) in question that Deadman had. I do not recollect that the right of Rooke was at that time acknowledged by a vote of the House - it was not a regular meeting of the Legislative Council, but a meetg. held to consider the subject of D^r Judds sitting as a member of the B. Commⁿ and D^r Rooke's claim came up incidentally."

Joane Ia sw. I was present at the Chiefs meetg. spoken of by Kekuanaoas - it was not a regular

of the leg^{al} Council, but merely a Consultation - I do not recollect exactly its proceedings. I think it related to Lord Paule's proceedings. The Claim of Deadman was introduced incidentally. The transfer by Deadman to Brooke was spoken of. Brooke wished the land to be Confirmed to him on the condition on which Deadman got it from Kaiaha. Deadman or his Representatives have fulfilled the condition of the first grant. The King's letter was merely Consenting to the transfer by Deadman of his right to S^r Brooke. I think so - that right was not recognized by a formal vote of the meeting. I think those proceedings were not recorded as those of the Ahakolelo are. I think the subject was brought up incidentally either by S^r Judd or myself with a view to hear the opinions of the Chiefs about the Claim. This Claim was not brought before the Legislature of Tahiti in 1823.

Martin Beck testified that he had known Cairn ever since 1825 living in Honolulu and to have lived on the lot claimed from 12 to 14 years.

The survey of M^r Meyers is correct - he has never heard his right disputed - according to its bounds as they are seen in the fence standing.

I have heard M^r Duke say he got it from Gov^r Brooke, but I do not know any thing of that myself beyond what I have heard.

Masli. m. I know M^r Duke to have lived on this lot 15 years. I never heard of its being disputed.

The lands of Kalaeothoi at his death
consisted of the C^o: of Kamaketa in Honolulu
& the Ahupuaa of Lapakohoe in Hamakua
Hawaii. Formerly these lands belonged to the
King who gave them to Kapotini who sailed with
Boti & then gave them to Hoatilio - Hoatilio
when he went abroad, gave them to the King.

And the King gave them to Kalaeoketoi. Child of Napokini by Keatua. Kalaeoketoi was 25 years or more of age. I do not know who is the heir of Kalaeoketoi, but I have heard the King was his heir, & that Mr. P. Johns was, and also that Natrookoo, brother of St. Johns wife, was the true heir.

The land stood on the books of the Home Office as Kalaeoketoi's & now stands so, but Stevensons wife, Natrookoo, has had charge of the same from time of Napokini. I heard Stevenson had a lot in Tamakela, but I do not know of what Character. He lived part of the time here, spent at Pahia. I do not know whether Moa or Natrookoo was present at the time of Kalaeoketoi's death.

The Parties said the King was an important Witness, and it was agreed between them, that the Pres^t. should Enquire of the King what was the Will of Kalaeoketoi at his death; and his answer, not made under oath, should be binding on both parties.

Before we went, I sent word to Waihe who had charge of Kona at that time, to build & thatch 2 houses for the Missionaries, which were ready on our arrival. They stood on the land now claimed by Kawainii. I saw him there at the time, living Makua of the Government ~~Board~~.

These houses were destroyed by fire in 1837 or 8.

The Missionaries were in difficulty on this acct. being obliged to live in houses of the people.

They went to Hoapili at Pahana, & asked for a land held by Wahie, which he refused, because it belonged to Gov^t. Adams.

Hoapili then told me, to give them a piece of his own. I found Mr. Conde & others before me, on my arrival at Hana, in 1838. I went with Conde & Ives to select a place for them.

They wanted some of Kuakini's land - which I refused - I then pointed out the place they now occupy - Kawainui's place was on the other side of the stream - he came to Mr. Conde while I was there and said "If you get the land, then, who will I live under?" Mr. Conde replied "You will live under the Chief": it was settled accordingly.

I believe that Kawainui & Muanaheli's claims are both good. Mr. Piu built the fence which marks the boundary of the Mission land, along the stream between that & Kawainui's.

The premises were sold at Auction by J. W. Thompson on 12th May 1848. for £700.00 - accordg. to the Bill of Sale produced (all papers left) &c. taken by Mr G. W. Robertson)

Dec^d by A. Bishop on 10th June 1851 at Ewa in Ct. of Heakaka 5877 contested by A. Manuel. Ct^d deced Kamauoha in 1st Feb^r 1851 - Waimani Ewa.

Manuel states this land when first purchased of the Ahupuni about 2 yrs ago was all Mahelakela - Claimant was not living on it & was gone to Puloa - He told me he had given it up to Government. I told him I had bought it & asked him to return & take charge of it for me. he declined - saying he was sick. After it was measured - he agreed to live on it & if I would do by him as I did by my father-in-law - viz hire natives to plant it, and let him oversee them. He died soon after in 1850 - when I sent for his son Heakaka, and he refused to look after it; & I took him before J. W. Opunui Lunakuaahu who tried without effect to get him to live on the land. I then tried to get him convicted in the penalty of \$10 for forsaking the land, which the Judge said could not be done because he had not received the land from me: from that time I have held it - and he has cultivated nothing on it.

Opunui Sw. I asked Ct. if he wished to have the land of his Father when he was before me. he said he did not. I asked why? he said because Manuel wanted him to catch his Bullocks on Kooke days as his work for the Landlord. I refused to fine him because he had never held the land nor wished to do so on such terms, - he said he had never planted

food on it - and what grew was Manuel's.

Keatkata denied his voluntary passing the land in bearing of Manuel - but he refused his conditions of every day tending Cattle for food. He says he afterwards tried to occupy the land to cultivate. Manuel forbade him. saying he had no land - witness and not Manuel appealed to Opunui to get the land.

Manuel said it was only on those days he wanted his work - and both of them appealed together to Opunui - Opunui cited both.

Manuel said he offered to pay £1, 10/- monthly - food & clothes to Keatkata to live with him. Neither party has any witnesses of these statements.

On 15th Hina came as witness for Keatkata - who being sworn said - I heard their conversation together after the death of the T. - Claim - said I wish the land to live on & cultivate - Manuel said NO - You take care of Cattle & I will plant your land for you - Cl. said - No I will do that & work for you on those days. Manuel then denied him the land. Manuel objects to the above les³ because Hina is interested on acc^t of her being forbidden a two patch which she expects to get again if Keatkata succeeds - and as to his turning him off. Opunui told him he would be fined for such an act.

Keatkatu sw. he was long with Manuel at the time of these occurrences referred to - he heard Manuel offer if he would follow after his Cattle, that he would cultivate the land for him & provide his food & fish & give him the produce of the land as his Compensation -

Kearatia refused - but offered to live on his own land and help Manuel on Kalle day with the Cattle. When Manuel refused him the land on such terms.

Next day I again met Keniau at Kialunai, the lunaakoo of Eiohokai prepared to take his Test^g which he declined giving because he was not present when the other was taken. Yesterday.

John Li Sw. I know the bounds of the
lot of Polly Holmes. it is bounded Mauka
by the lot of Mary Li & P. Reynolds.

Waaititi by Cap. Grouse premises - Maikai by the
 Globe Hotel Premises - belong to heirs of Hannah
 Holmes & Premises of Geo. Holmes & other Holmes
 Children - Ewaby Premises of Saml Thompson -
 property of John Needles. In Kamehameha 2
 time in was enclosed by a stock fence - perhaps in
 1822 - I did not hear that Hannah Holmes
 had any property in this lot then - but there
 were others living on it under Polly as I under-
 stood. After Pollys death there arose a dispute
 between Hannah & the children of Polly about
 the property - The Cooperage Premises were
 once leased or a part of them - to Pitman - as
 I heard, by Pai, who was a sailor - His name
 was Sam. Pai. It was a piece of Pollys
 yard formerly. I know of the arrangement
 made by Hannah & heirs of Polly, after Pollys
 death - (Mr. Gulick then offered in Evid.
 a settlement in writing made by Hannah
 Holmes alias Hannah Jones with Mr. G.
 acting for Pollys children, by which it appears
 the portions of the several children of Polly
 Holmes were set apart (see document marked
 A1.) I. J. Cont. - At that time in 1823 it was
 settled that J. G. Lewis should have a part
 adjoining Hannahs lot, which he occupied
 as a store, & the place occupied by Washfield
 was given to Isaac Lewis & Mr. Mills -
 another child of Pollys - and the Heap and
 Greenwell Premises were set aside as the
 portion of Thomas Crocker, but the house
 thereon was upais. The portion of Pollys
 lot on this side of fort St. now occupied
 by Benedict & Robert Davies, was not

settled at that time - as Hannah insisted on it, that this part belonged to her - her claim to it I had not heard of before.

My own opinion was, that the portion on this side did belong to Polly at this time and I did not yield it to Hannah. I know when the lot was cut in two by Fort St. it was about 1838, after Polly's death. Kapukana & Upai had houses in the road that were destroyed. - They erected the house standing on the present ground or lot occupied by Heap & Greenwell. I did not consider the settlement I made as excluding Polly's children from inheriting any property other than that set aside to them, in case it should be proved to belong to them.

Old Mr. Holmes lived makai of the Premises in dispute in the old Holmes House. I heard that Polly & her family quarrelled, & that Polly left, & took her lot, then unoccupied & enclosed it. I do not know who built the fence. Kiri - an old man, lived inside of it.

Polly's street fence, I think included the Premises now occupied by R. G. Davies as a store, & by J. Peurdick as a Coopersage, on Waititi side of Fort St.

I was the Representative of the Polly Holmes Children in the settlement made in 1843. Hannah Jones did not at that time claim the Heap & Greenwell Premises.

I did not know of Pipman leasing the Premises of Hannah Holmes - I heard Sam Pai leased to him - Pai owned the house there - Kiri lived on the land.

under Polly, as I understood.

John Meddles sw. I knew Polly Holmes from the day of her birth to her death. I was acquainted with the boundaries of the Old Holmes Estate - as claimed by Oliver Holmes. Polly Holmes' lot was bounded Macaula by P. Reynolds Library S. S. lot. Watiti by the old road - Makai by Hannah, George Gray & Jennys lots (Hannas part is the Globe Hotel & Ferrides) Ewa side by P. Thompsons lot. Polly's part was included in the Old Holmes enclosure. It was a stit fence formerly, & after an adobie. - Bounded Makai side by present King Street - Watiti side by the old road - I do not know how Polly came by her part of this lot, but I think it was a division from her Father - it was divided among the children. Polly had undivided undisputed possession of these Premises, called hers, & I never knew of any other claim to them. I lived in the same lot, I had a slaughter house there, which stood nearly where the Barber shop now stands (Augustus) I think the Premises occupied by P. G. Davies on the corner of Hotel & Fort St. was not in the Polly Holmes Premises, but am not certain, to swear to either way. Polly went to the old Road, I am clear. Ruricks Cooperage was in the Gard belongg. to Mills. the husband of Polly - his native name was Palu. Pollys fence was first stit & after adobie. The Keapt Greenwell Premises were in Pollys lot

Hannah Hooper sw. I knew Polly Holmes from her Youth - & the lot of her Father

I knew in which the Children lived - all of
 them. Hannah married & then her place
 was set off. Afterwards went to live
 with Cap. Lewis & her part was set
 off on the mauka side of Hannah's lot.
 And the old Holmes House. This lot was
 a round lot on one side, fenced with sticks
 & was set off on account of some difficulty
 in the family. I think when Purdie's
 Cooperage is, was in part, the old road.
 The mauka boundary of Polly was straight.
 Levi's sw. I knew Polly from her birth
 to her death. I lived with her & knew
 the bounds of her lot - it was bounded

 the Polly Holmes lot as I understood it.

to be given by my Father, to include all the property belonging to the Holmes Estate on the East side of Fort St. now occupied by Stackfield & Heap & Greenwell - all above the Elde Hotel Premises up to Stephen Reynolds & Mary J.'s lots - The Burdick Cooperage Premises & R. G. Davis' Store lot were not in Polly's enclosure. I am not quite sure the Heap & Greenwell lot was inside Polly's enclosure, but I think it was. All between Burdick's & Hotel Street was given to Hannah Holmes by Kinan. I was present ~~at the death~~ of Polly. I did not then or at any time hear her give Hannah the Heap & Greenwell Premises. I heard ^{her} Hannah to take care of the lot for her children - because she was afraid ~~of~~ her last husband, would sell it.

Hannah Holmes rented the Heap & Store but in what capacity I do not know. Cross Str. ^d. The old road ran between Burdick's lot & Cap Snows or Brewers & Co's lot - I think Burdick's was not in Polly's lot - I am sure R. G. Davis lot (Store) was not within it - Hannah see & this from Kinan it is a new thing.

Tho. Cummins dec. for R. G. Davis - "I was a Clerk for H. & Pierce & Co while they occupied the Brewers & Co's premises. In 1840 Tomlin & Poir occupied the Burdick Cooperage lot, it was divided on the north side from Polly's lot by a stick fence - The old Road ran between Burdick's & Brewers & Co's lot - & where the Davis Store lot was a common, & I always understood Kinan gave this piece of Common to Hannah - I am not

Certain whether the Ruridick lot belonged to Polly or not. but I understood it was in the care of Kino for Hannah. Pitman got the lot as I heard through the good offices of Sam Vai, who came from U. S. The Batchers shop that Needles occupied was in Pollys lot, & just below Augustus Barber's shop now standing. Pollys fence was stout. I do not remember whether it stood before I went to the U. S.

Stephen Reynolds sw. for Davis &c.

It is impossible for any one to describe the boundaries of lots as they were in former times - I have lived in Honolulu 29 Years The Polly Holmes lot - as stated by Mr. D. & others, was partly a circle - bounded mauka by a stilt fence separating it from what was then called "Squeezed gut alley" coming out into the large square - On the Waialeale side, the line ran in a round direction - R. S. Davis's Store lot I am sure was not in the Polly Holmes lot - the Ruridick Cooperage was neither original fence; nor was the Heap & Greenwell Premises - But when Mr. Mills - Pollys husband, moved her fence mauka, he included the two last-named Premises - this was in about 1831 Mills was a kind of public man or general agent for Govern^t. He said he moved the fence by the Governours consent. The house on the Heap & Greenwell lot, as I understood was commenced by Kino & Hannah & Vai helped him to finish it, Hannah had the care & leasing of that lot - Polly died in 1838

Hannah leased it in March 1841 to Marshall & Tolson (see lease marked A2 offered in evidence) (Mr. Bates then introduced a lease of the Purdick Coopersage lot from Hannah Holmes to Benjamin Titman dated July 1. 1839 A3) also a lease from Hannah to Preser d Nov 7. 1842. marked A4)

Hannah Holmes said to me just before she died "That property (speaking of 10 days) is not mine - it is not Williams - but I took care of it for the children, & so he must take care of it for the children. Isaiah has had his part & John has had his part - but William Mills & Thomas Crocker have not had their part, & when they come, it must be given to them; They were both then abroad. W. Mills has since returned (about 6 months ago) and soon died.

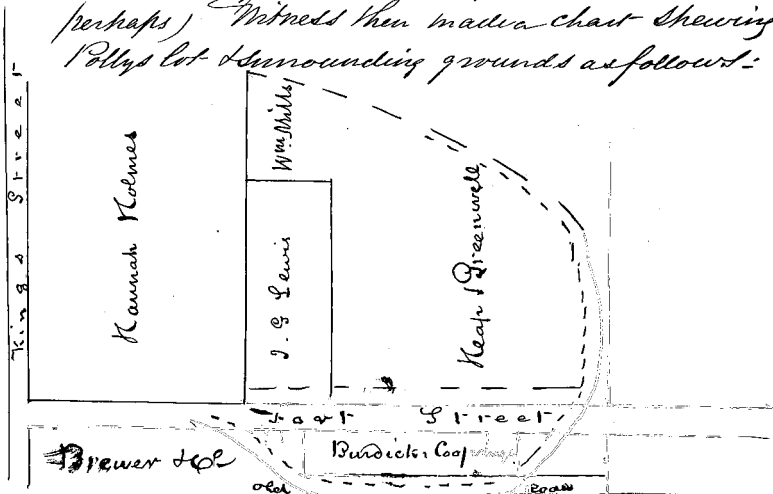

Kino was formerly Hannahs nurse & lived under her in her lot (present globe premises Hotel) After the Kavaai war (1825) Hannahs houses were burned down, and a quarrel arose between Hannah & Kino, & she drove him off; he went & lived where Fort S. now is, about opposite Heap & Green Store. His house was destroyed when Fort S. was cut through; & Kino & I were

him the place now occupied as Purdie's, Cooperage. R. G. Davis store Premises was then an unenclosed Common. The Heap & Greenwells Premises were in Polly's Enclosure; the land was hers - but the House built on it - was Unpaid. Hannah has always had the charge of the Cooperage Premises - but I do not know whether she owned the land or not. The Purdie's Premises were inside of Polly's fence, His was Uncle of Hannah & Polly; & after Hannah drove him off, he lived under Polly - Polly's fence ran to the old Road - She made William Mills her only heir; but after her death it was divided among all her Children. by John G.; by Command of Kincaid. I am sure the Heap & Greenwells Premises were in Polly's Yard. her original fence enclosed it; her fence was afterwards extended across the Road; and included the Purdie's Premises. The land right back of the lot of John G. Lewis sold to Hannah was William Mills part. The fence of Polly was extended before the death of Kincaid (in 1831 perhaps) Witness then made a chart shewing Polly's lot & surrounding grounds as follows:-



J. C. B. Rooke Sw. I was requested by the Governor to assist in laying out Fort Street - it ran through my premises - The original fence of Polly did not enclose R. G. Davis's Store lot, Burdick's Coopers at the Heap & Greenwell premises - but afterwards in 1831 perhaps, extended the fence so as to include the Heap & Greenwell premises, but it did not enclose the premises on this side of Fort St. for Pierce complained against it.

I am not sure that Polly's original fence did not enclose the Heap & Greenwell premises - but I think it did not - and that it was a separate enclosure occupied by Kino. I cannot swear that Polly's fence did not come into Fort Street. I think it did not, or if it did, very little. I mean the fence of 1829.

Cap. J. Meek Sw. I have lived in Honolulu ever since 1824, permanently - & off & on since 1809. When Fort St. was cut through it ran directly through Kino's house. I do not recollect the Burdick premises as in Polly's enclosure. Kino's enclosure was in the street & took in part of the Greenwell premises I think. Polly's enclosure was a stick fence I was one who laid out the streets of Honolulu & we had much trouble with Kino about his house Sw.

G. P. Sudd Sw. I know the Heap & Greenwell premises & witnessed the lease from Hannah Jones to Marshall & Johnson dated March 6, 1841 (marked A 2) Hannah at the time hesitated about signing it - she said - "I do not know that it is right for me to sign this, for the property is not mine -

It is Upai, but I saw Upai & she said
let Hannah sign it, for she knows how to
do business.

All Parties said they had no more
evidence - the hearing was closed for the
present.

Hawaii - I know Pili Kalani held this land - he was an under Konohiki - but held it as a koacaina (the land in dispute) He planted it with his own people & also with the labor on Konohiki's days. This land is a Woele from ancient times, & continued so to the death of Pili Kalani.

Ct. Ex. The Konohiki's men who worked

On this Kihapai were Keawe opala, Naauhana,
 & Kahalee - I know that this land was worked
 as a Koele under at least 3 Konohiki's,
 I do not know how many of Lilitakalani's
 people helped to cultivate this land - I
 know Lilitakalani fed his own Pigs on the produce
 of this land - I do not know who took
 melons when ripe - I have heard that
 Lilitakalani occupied the land under
 Keakua wahine - This Kihapai is one of
 the 3 old Koeles.

Kaahalama sw - I know that Lilitakalani
 was a luna on the whole land, but the piece

Hana'i, sworn, confirms in ~~fact~~ the testimony given by Hinahina.

Mahiai, sworn, says she knows the claim of Puiwa, in Kalawahine, Koushiki Aina. He owns five kalo patches, which form one piece. Bounded Manka by the land of Helela, - Waipiki side by Kaauhakula's land, - Mankai by Haalelea's land, - Ewa side by Helela's land.

Claimant received this land from Kaauhakula in the life time of Nahienaeua, and has held it and cultivated it

Kaaka, sworn, says she knows the land of Clt. The boundaries are the same as given by the last witness. Clt has an House Lot. I do not know of any opposition to Puiwa's claim.

Kaaca, sworn, says this claim was written out by Kaiakunama, and carried to the Land Commission by him, in November 1847.

Witness knows the land claimed by Apie. It consists of two Kale patches in Kakekuma, Honolulu. The 2 patches form one piece, bounded on the North by the poalima of the Kouohiki, - East by the land of Hawea, - South by a foot path, - West by a patch belonging to Mahala.

Claimant derived the land from Kaipuhaa in the time of Boki, and has held it in peace ever since.

Kaipuhaa, sworn, says she knows the 2 Kale patches of claimant. I gave these patches to claimant at the time Boki went away. I know of no one who has any right there but Apie.

Kekuanaoa County Government for the

Sonu Kapene Esq. knows the premises in
dispute - they formerly belonged to Kaahumanu
and supposed belong to her heirs now.

Charles Kanaina Esq. I know the premises
in question - they belonged to Kalamoihi
& from him passed to Kekauluohi who
occupied them under Kalamoihi. Then
Kaahumanu lived also under Kalamoihi -
so also did Kaihikaoi. When Kalamoihi
died, he willed that the others should
occupy the Place under Kekauluohi -

The name of the land was "Pahuhaina" -
when the time came that the Chiefs wished
a place set apart for the Royal School
it was proposed 1st to have it under
Punch Bowl Hill - but Kekauluohi wanted
it on the premises in dispute -

It was said at the time between Keka-
luohi & Kinau, that when the lot should
no longer be required for a R. School
the premises should revert to Keka-
luohi. - When the Houses were built
M. Kekuanaoa was the luna of the work
& the labor was got from the men of all
the Chiefs - like the building of the Fort
in

C. J. Sudd Esq. " Before Victoria's birth
I conversed with Kinau about the

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establishment of a Royal School. She
said she would send Victoria when born
to the school - but had no control over
the other children - but would speak with
their foster parents about it. After Kinane
died Kekaunohi became Premier -
& I revived the proposition -

Kekaunohi agreed to have a Chief School
and in her capacity of Premier, she set
apart the Premises in question for it.
I understand that Kalaemioke when
Agent of the Govern^t. or Chiefs used the
means of the general gov^t. to enclose this
whole land - on which are the School Premises
Kaakumanau, Kinane, & Kinane^{ha} - 3, all
got a part - I suppose that Kinane
said to Kekaunohi - let us set aside
this place for a school lot & it was
done. When the Houses were to be
built, the Prisoners were sent to cut
stone. they made adobies - Kekuana-
naua bought lumber in for the
Houses. After I took office in the
Treasury I paid Mr Kekuanaoas debts
as Gov^r of Oahu - I believe that Bills
of materials for the R. School, housed
One acc^t. I paid was over 7,000.
After that, at various times, Gov^r ex-
pended sums of money on repairs
of the Houses - from 2,000 to 4,000
per ann.

Ahahi, Sr. "Kalaemioke enclosed
this land when it ^{was} waste - After him
it came to Kaakumanau, Kinane and
the King - After Kaakumanau it came

to her heir, Kinau - Kalamoku built the
fence for Kaahumanu & the King - The
Ewa people found the ~~slits~~ - which were
taken from the wharf to the place by ^{all the}
People. My people made the adobies for
our side of the school house, on accⁿ of
Reconalto - I understood the lot was
apart by Kinau - I never heard the lot
belonged to Kekaoluoke. The houses
in the lot formerly belonged to Kaahumanu
but were built by Kalamoku. The
school house was a sort of Joint work
by all the chiefs, who all assisted in it.
I think the lot belonged to Kinau and
the King - Kinau derived fr. Kaahumanu.
Pestunanaoa said the Kiteana now belong
to V. Kamamahu.

Dr Armstrong - Kalamoku was the luna
man of the work of the Chiefs or Gov^t at
the time of building the first fence round this
lot. He was the great agent under Kaahumanu
- manu - after her Kinau was premier & had
charge of the Gov^t.

Mr. Kekuanaoa Sw. The lot in question
belonged to Kaahumanu - the fence wood came from
Ewa - After Kaahumanu's death then
Kinau & the King were heirs of the land.
I do not contradict S^r Judge's testimony as
to Gov^t helping to build the school houses &
S^r Judge helped to build them on accⁿ of my
children - The school & improvements
belong to the Government - the land belongs
to V. Kamamahu

The lot was set apart by Kiniau for the purpose of a School; & when she died, the intention was carried out by Kikaulooke

This business was considered by the King & Chiefs in Council - Kiniau died without a will - The Chiefs consulted who should succeed her & have her Property - They decided Victoria to be her heir & successor.

B. Armstrong Minister of Public Instruction for the Government claiming the school house & premises for the Hawaiian People.

1st Because in the division of lands in 1848, this lot was not set apart for Victoria Kamaeale - for whom it is now

claimed.

2nd Because no claim for this lot was presented to the Land Commission by the parties who now claim it, within the time prescribed by the law for presentation of claims.

3rd Because by Sec. 7 of an act to provide for the better support & efficiency of Public Schools passed July 9, 1850 the premises in question belong to the Government.

4th Because the Govern^t has expended a large am^t. of money on said premises & houses at various times, for the promotion of Education; & the P. School still needs the Houses & Premises for the same purpose for which they were first given -

Hanunu, sworn, says he knows the Kalo land of Claimant, in the Ili of Kalawahine, Honolulu Aina. There are 2 patches, forming but one piece. They are planted with Kalo. The new Road leading from the Royal School to Kuumanu Road has cut off part of this land. It is bounded Mauka by the land of Haalelea, Waikiki side by the same, Makai by Nanis land, Ewa side by the Kuumanu Road.

Claimant received this land from Kinopu in the time of Kachumamu, and has held it ever since without dispute.

Kuapaeu, sworn, says he knows the House Lot of Clt. in Kamakela, Honolulu Aina. It was formerly enclosed, but the fence is fallen down. Clt does not reside there at present. The House Lot is bounded, Mauka by Kalua's land, Waikiki side by Keaweluakahi's land, Makai by a road, Ewa side by Wabie's land. Clt inherited this lot from his father, Puhiki, who died about ten years ago. He has held the Lot ever since, without dispute. The testimony given by Hanunu, in regard to the Kalo patches is correct.

C. Kanaina states that the C^{lt} left his land in 1849, and gave it up to the Konohiki.

Claimant says he did not give up the land to the Konohiki, but that his wife being sick, at Ewa, he told the D^y Konohiki to take care of his patches for a little time while he attended his wife in her illness. He went to Ewa and stayed there till his wife died, when he returned to take possession of his land, but the Konohiki refused to let him have it again. He was gone to Ewa but a few weeks.

Hanaiakeakua, sworn, is the deputy Konohiki on the land in question. In the year 1849, C^{lt}'s wife was lying sick at Ewa, and he was anxious to go and see her. He therefore gave up his land to me as Agent for the Konohiki. C^{lt} possessed no land at Ewa, that I am aware of. He returned after the death of his wife and wished to have his land again, but the Konohiki would not let him

have it. Naumeke did not give me a writing to show that he gave up his land to the Honohiki.

Kanahina, sworn says- I know of Naumeke's going to Ewa on account of his wife's illness. I heard the Dy Honohiki say that he had given up his land. Did not hear Naumeke say so. I know that after the death of his wife he came back and demanded possession of his land, but he did not get it. He was gone to Ewa about 3 or 4 weeks, perhaps.

Makakoa, sworn, confirms in full the testimony of the last witness.

G. P. Ukeke, sworn, says he knows the Loko ai (large kalo patch) claimed by Kaikaina, in Waiono, Koolauloa.

It is bounded, on Punahoa side by the land of Kawai, - Mauka by the Honohiki's patches, - on Naunala side by a stream, - Makai by C't's House Lot.

Claimant derived this Loko ai from A. Paki, in the time of Kaomi, some 20 years ago, and has held it ever since in peace.

Kaia, sworn, says he is a Kamaaina of Kewalo. Kaholoan was Luna of Kewalo in the time of Kaakumanu. After him were Mahina and Keako.

The name of the small piece of land now disputed is "Kapuni". It belonged to Kaakumanu. The above named Lunas were under Kaakumanu. "Kapuni" is a paikua aina in Kewalo. It does not belong to Kalokohouu. "Kapuni" was always included in Kewalo in the collection of taxes, and the people of "Kapuni" always worked for the Kouohiki of Kewalo. Kaone, the present tax collector has lately caused this paikua of Kewalo to be included in Kalokohouu.

Mahina, sworn, - I was Luna of Kewalo in the time of Kaakumanu, after Kaholoan. This paikua of land now in dispute, called "Kapuni", always formed part of Kewalo. Kapuni was always included with Kewalo in taxation and the people of "Kapuni" worked for the Kouohiki of Kewalo. "Kapuni" never belonged to Kalokohouu.

Mahoe, sworn, says he is a Kamahina of Kewalo, and knows the piece of land now in dispute, called "Kapuni". It has always formed a part of the ili of Kewalo, from ancient times.

Broff &? I have lived on Kewalo since the time of Kai, the Konoiki, in the time of Kamehameha I. I know the boundaries of Kewalo uka pretty well. I know Kaelapulu who lives there, but he is a new comer. Witness gave the names of a long line of Konoikis.

Paimuai, sworn, (for the Court). I am a Kamahina of Auwahiimu adjoining Kewalo. When I was a boy I lived on Kewalo, when Kapaukahi was Konoiki - in the time of Kamehameha I. I know the paaka ama called "Kapuni", now in dispute. "Kapuni" belonged to Kaahumanu - i.e. to her ili of Kewalo. She had her Lunas there. Witness named some of the Lunas. The men of "Kapuni" worked for the Konoiki of Kewalo. It is about 40 years since "Kapuni" was joined to Kewalo - shortly after the sickness which destroyed the people's hair. "Kapuni" always formed part of Kewalo from that time till Kaone's decision about 18 months ago.

Geo Sw. says I know the piece of land now in dispute - and I know where Paul's house stood - there was a Tamarind in front of it. Paul's name is Mr. Mills' native name - I believe the place where he built his adoptive house belonged to his wife Polly Holmes - which has fallen down -

Isiah Lewis Sw. says he has now no pecuniary interest in this claim -

I know the piece of land now in dispute. (Place shown to witness) Formerly, before J. G. Lewis got his share of the land, there was no fence, but when he got his piece set off, & afterwards, when he sold it to Hannah Holmes, then, it was enclosed by her - but the piece now in dispute, was not fenced in. In old times, Polly's fence stood mark of the piece of land sold by J. G. Lewis to Hannah, and extended from Fort Street clear back to George Holmes' land. Mr. Mills' house stood on the piece of ground now in dispute, which belonged to his wife, Polly Holmes.

After Hannah bought the piece next Fort Street from J. G. Lewis, she fenced in both that and Mills' house site with it.

When Hannah Holmes had the leasing of the house which stood on this place, she used to give us the money she collected as Rent. This piece of ground belongs to Wm. Mills.

Cross ex. The mark boundary of Polly's land ran nearly straight from the street to G. Holmes' land - there was a slight jog in it.

The land of Hannah did not seem so far maucha as that of G. Holmes. Hannahs maucha boundary came up to about 3 feet makai of Mills' house.

The steps to the door of his house led up from the Hackfield lot - the back of the house might be about 12 feet from old Mr. Holmes Tomb.

Waha Sw. Says - the Pau in dispute belongs to Polly - Mills house stood near the makai boundary Pollys land; the present fence is maucha of the old house site.

Cross Cr. The tomb of Old Mr. Holmes is back of the Mills' House; the old fence between them was straight - I lived there in time of Mills - under him and Polly. The boundary between Polly + George was an adobie wall I think it is still there.

J. C. B. Rooke Sw. Says I remember the makai boundary of Pollys land - it went a little makai of the Mills house. The stair case of the House was maucha - the back of the house joined to G. Holmes Land - I was present when Polly died. She left the House to ~~Wm~~ Mills - I never heard that the land on which the adobie house stood, did not belong to Polly. Mills had a large grass house a little maucha of the Adobie house - the Grass House was standing before Polly built the Adobie House, which she always said she built for Wm Mills, her son - I think the Adobie might have been 30 feet by 18.

I think the distance between the back of it and the tomb might be 25 or 30 feet.

I am not sure whether the boundary ran exactly straight or not. I leased that

House from Hannah Holmes at one time; the Steps went up at the end of the House - Hannah's Pery stood makai of the fence in her own lot.

J. Reynolds Sw. (Place shown to him) The makai boundary, as far as I remember, ran close to the end of the Adobie House. - I think Hannah claimed a piece of land in back of the house between G. Holmes land & back of the adobie house. The adobie House stood on what was called M^r. Mills' land, or partly on that, and Polly's own. When Polly was sick, she passed all her property into Hannah's hands to take care of for the children.

(Three of the Commissioners went with the Pades to the land in dispute; next hearing to be 13th Inst.

Continued Oct 13th

A Pahi Sw. Knows the land of Polly Holmes deceased, but not exactly the boundaries of her land. There was a fence between Polly & Hannah on Makai - Ewa side Thompsons Place & Kino lived outside of Polly's wooden fence on Waititi side. The Cooperage stands on the site of Kino's old House; the new Road Cut through Polly's place (or fence) & left Kino's place on the Waititi side of Fort Street. I do not know who gave the place to Kino - perhaps he took it as waste land for himself; he was Oliver Holmes wife's brother. The Waititi boundary of the old Holmes' Estate was the old Road. When Fort Street was made, the old Road was

given to Holmes' heir. Kuroa arranged this matter between Drewes & Hannah, and gave the old road to Hannah.

(By R. G. Davies) I never heard that Polly had any right to the Cooperage place; it was outside of her fence. I never heard of any dispute between Polly & Hannah about this place.

(By Indict.) I do not know whether or not Polly was alive when Poman leased this place from Hannah. Kuro formerly lived within Hannah's place. I do not know why he removed out of it. I never heard that Kuro, when on the Cooperage lot, lived under either Hannah or Polly.

(By J. S.) I do not know who settled the property and affairs of Polly after her death, nor who settled the affairs after her husband's death.

(Mills).

J. Cummins Sw. I came to the Islands about 25 years ago; & for some years kept a Billiard Room. I engaged with Mr. Stunnewell in 1829 who kept a store where Cap. Snow does now. My business then closely confined me to that place. I remember the old Road well as it ran; it ran between the Cooperage lot & Peices Premises, before the present House was erected. We had frequent trouble with Kuro & Hannah Holmes for encroaching with their stick fence on the old Road.

Hannah seemed over Kuro in the matter - he was called her Kahu. I never supposed at that time, that Polly had any right to this place; but always thought it to be Hannah's

Polly died in 1836 or '7. The difficulty with Kimo about the fence & with Hannah, was while Polly was alive. John P. Poo Sr. knows the land of Polly Holmes and the place where Kimo lived - it was outside of Polly's land. There was a stick fence between Polly's & Kimo's; and a large fence outside of all on Waaititi side. The place where Kimo lived formed a part of Old Mr. Holmes' estate. I think Hannah was over Kimo; who was, I think, her Kahu. I did not hear that Hannah drove Kimo out of his place to live on this. Kimo was Polly's Kahu as well as Hannah. Polly & Hannah were sisters. I understand that Hannah took care of Polly's property & children, after her death. I do not exactly know the boundary between their places; the place in dispute joined Polly's land, but not Hannah's.

John P. Munn Sr. I have lived on the Island about 27 years, & know the place now in dispute. I should say Polly's land formerly extended one or two fathoms into what is now Fort Street, to a stick fence. It is not clear to me, who the different portions of land belonged to, but I remember the stick fence which was along side of the old road it did not include the Purdick house side. I am pretty certain. The place in dispute belonged to the Holmes' family. Hannah seemed to have the control of it.

Tom Hunter Sr. I am 36 years old, and was in Honolulu when the streets were made. I knew Kimo's place - it bordered on the old road.

There was a fence on the Widditi side of Kenos's place; I went, I think, into Polly's lane. There was a stick fence between Polly's & Kenos's - I knew Kenos; I never heard at that time, that Polly had any right to Kenos's Place. I know Hannah leased this place to Wiman before the new street was made. (after Polly's death) I always thought Hannah the person who had the leasing of the place.

(By J. S.) There was a fence between Hannah's and Polly's lots; the lot in dispute was on Polly's side of said fence. Hannah had the arrangement of Polly's property after her death.

John S. Sw I was requested by Hannah Holmes to mark off and apportion the land of the heirs of Polly Holmes - I made a rough plan of the ground - Hannah agreed to my arrangement. I did not do anything about the place in dispute at that time - because I did not think there would be any difficulty about it. I supposed that Hannah was taking care of it for Polly's children. Hannah & myself did not speak about this place. It was clear to me that the place belonged to Polly; but if her heirs had not set up a claim for it, I should not say any thing about it. Hannah told me to make this division to meet especially her difficulty with Isaiah Lewis; & not for the sake of setting off the shares of the others.

G. P. Sudd Sw. Remember about the

place now in dispute before the new street was made. I understood this place belonged to Old Holmes Estate, of which, Hannah, George, & Mills, all enclosed portions. Hannah told me, she was very anxious to have the land properly divided - In regard to Saiah, it was settled. When Fort Street was made Kinan gave Hannah the old road, and the place where Dr. G. Davies' store stands, as Compensation. Hannah told me, that her father empowered her to divide & arrange with the other children. Fort Street was opened during the lifetime of Mr. Mills. after Polly's death, Hannah told me, that Polly left the property in charge of her, and Tom Mills, her son, to my charge. I think Pitmans store stood between Mills' house & the old road, & that P. D. - man leased the place from Hannah, even before Polly's death. I never heard that Hannah & Polly quarrelled about this or any other lot. There was a fence between Polly's & Hannah's, built probably, by Mrs Jones, but I do not think intended to mark distinctly the boundary between the parties, or that it settled that matter at all. I knew Kins - he was an old servant of Holmes, had lived with their family a long time. I do not think Kins had any right to the land, himself.

(By Inlet) I suppose Kins was a Nahu, of all Holmes' children; but Hannah was the head of them.

M. Keturanaoa Sw. - I recollect the old Holmes estate, and the bounds of Polly's land, and the old road. Her fence did not come out as far as the old road. Kino lived on the land adjoining the old road under Hannah. The old road ran between the Cooperage & Dr. G. Davies Store. When Fort Street was made Hannah got the old road as compensation for her loss by the new Street. When Polly was dying; Kiniau himself heard her will; viz that Hannah should take charge of her property for her children. Kino lived under Hannah. I never heard that Kino's house site belonged to ^{Polly} Hannah. I recollect there was a split fence at one time between Kino's & Mills' land. I always understood Kino lived under Hannah; some wells & a horse shed were lost by Hannah by the new Street and she got the old road, & Dr. G. Davies place to make up her loss.

J. C. B. Poole Sw. - Knows the place in dispute. The Cooperage, to my best knowledge, never was included in Polly Holmes enclosure. I always understood it belonged to Hannah who got it from Kiniau for loss sustained by her in opening Fort St. - I do not think Polly Holmes ever owned any land on Waititi side of Fort St. Pai lived where the street is now, outside of Polly's land -
waha Sw. (for Polly Holmes heirs) - Kino lived on the place now in dispute when Polly

was alive - he lived before in Hannah's land when he lived on the land in dispute he lived under Polly. The old road was the boundary of Polly's land on Waititi side. Kimo & Hannah had a falling out & she drove Kimo away - & she gave to Polly gave him a place to live in on her land. Kimo's house stood where Fort St now stands, and was destroyed by opening the new Street.

Polly went to arrange with Pierce when Kimo & he had trouble about the fence.

I lived with Polly at that time. After Polly's death Mr. Mills had charge of the place & after that, Hannah. I understood that Polly left her property in charge of Mills for her children, but in case he did anything wrong, then Hannah was to take charge. The land did not belong to Kimo.

Fort St. when it was made, cut through Polly's land & destroyed two houses which houses belonged to Kimo & Pai.

(By W. Davies) There was a stock fence between the Cooperage & Polly's. After the place was leased to Pitman a fence was made on the Ewa side of it. Pitman leased the place originally from Polly; but after she died, from Hannah. The Cooperage was not divided from the rest, when Kimo was there first. I think Polly ordered the fence to be put up - there was a fence there before Pitman arrived here - who had his store at first in Pai's house - which was one destroyed by the new Street. The slaughter

house stood in Polly's land, close to the old road, about where I drew the 3^d Gate is now - Polly went to drive P. Man out of Pai's house; & after that, he paid rent to her & her husband - & after she died, he paid it to M^r Mills - I am 32 years old.

Wasquitta sw. I knew Kino when he lived with Hannah Holmes. I was at the making of the new Street - Kino's house was destroyed by the new road. I heard that the House, where the Cooperage now is, was a Canoe house of Kino's - it was a grass house. There was a fence between Hannah's & Polly's lots running S. E. & N. W. Kino lived at that time in Polly's land under her.

(By Mr. Davies) I understood from Hannah herself, that the canoe house belonged to Kino - I heard so from all the people - I cannot say whether there was a stick division fence there or not.

Continued October 14th

Isiah Lewis sw. says he is not now personally interested in this claim, having sold all my interest to J. G. Lewis.

I have heard that Kino lived with Hannah Holmes when I was a child. I went farther inland on account of a quarrel. He built a grass house for himself on what appeared then waste land. Kino's mother-in-law Has - who lived with Polly, invited Kino to come up, & occupy this vacant place. Pai lived with Kino, but had no land of

his own there. After Polly married Mills, ^(Mills) he went to P. Dotu, and got permission to enclose the land occupied by Kins and others within his land. Kins had a stick fence around a his house - but Mills fence went outside of all - & took them all in. The old road was the boundary of Mills & Polly's land on Waititise side - Mills slaughter house stood on the place where Capt. Snow's large Gate is now on Fort St just ~~boundary~~ of Hannah Holmes boundary - The place now occupied by the Coopers shop was then occupied by Kins' canoe house or kaalou. When Pitman arrived here, he lived in his grass house; & I lived under Kins.

After Pitman lived there about a Year Polly & Mills were going to put him out of the house because they were afraid he would claim - but they arranged it, allowing him to live there 2 Years - giving him all the Coopers shop site that is now.

Pitman agreed to build what is now the Coopers shop; & make other ~~improvements~~ on the place, as rent for 2 Years. Kins lived in what is now Fort St. His house was destroyed by the new street.

Polly died before Pitmans first lease expired; and when the time was up - George Holmes & Hannah got the paper from Mills, because he did not behave well; and they made a fresh lease with Pitman. At that time Hannah built Davies' store - she got the lot from Kincau

for it, and then made a fence round the whole. Pitman leased the whole. Brewer got a passage through Polly's lands from Kinau where his Gate on Fort St. now is. Hannah got the old road from Kinau because of her losses from the new St. I think the lane at the back of Pitman's store might have been about 4 fathoms wide. I saw the first lease by Polly to Pitman and that also from Hannah to Pitman. Polly lost the same breadth of land by the street, as Hannah, but not the same length.

(Edw. G. Lewis) I always heard that Kin's from the first lived under Polly. I cannot say for certain, that the place occupied by Kin's belonged to Polly before Mills enclosed it by Bot's permission. Kin's stick fence stood after that. I think Mills went to live with Bot's in 1822 and soon after married Polly. I told John J. when he was dividing the land - that we had a right to land on the Waititi side of Fort St. & I told the Governor so also. J. G. Lewis paid me some time ago for my rights in this estate. J. G. Lewis and myself talked about the land on the Waititi side of the Street - but we were not at all confident of its being awarded to the heirs of Polly.

Rev^d J. S. Emerson, sworn, says he has
not a particular knowledge of the
land in dispute between these parties
in Paalaa, Waialua. His knowledge
is incidental. In 1835. I went over
to the house of Mokuuni, the husband
of claimant, to hold a meeting. They
appeared to be of the wealthy class
of natives, and lived on the land in
question, with a number of natives
under them. This land was then
said to be theirs. Mokuuni was

the head man of the land. Or his wife perhaps was the real Koushiki. She held the land, I presume, immediately under Kinau. I always understood that there was a sea or fishery attached to this land. They lived there for a few years after 1835. I can not state exactly when they ceased to live on it. They had left it one or two years previous to 1842. I always understood that they were dispossessed of the land by Kinau or Kekuanaoa on account of some misdeeds of their son, Kaeo, who was a soldier in the Fort at Honolulu, and I have heard there was some difficulty about the land tax also. I do not know that Kaeo, their son, was the real Koushiki, over his mother. The circumstance of his living with the Governor might perhaps have made it appear that he was the real Koushiki, when he was not so.

I had a claim before the Land Commission some time ago. Kustoia gave testimony on that claim, first in my favor, but lastly against me. I thought at the time that he was influenced by Mr. Kekuanaoa, so as to change his evidence before the Board.

Mr. Barker came to me about 1839, and got ten Dollars from me to enable him to pay the annual

tax of the land in dispute, for his mother in law, Kahakualoa. I think Mr. Barker paid the tax more than once, and I have often heard him speak of having paid it in 1839.

John G. Munu, Sworn, says that in 1850 he saw Kaes, the son of Etti, in Mr. Barker's store in Honolulu. Kaes had a writing in his hand which witness read over. It was addressed to the Land Commissioner and referred to the land at Waialua and the House Lot in Honolulu. The paper was not signed as Kaes said he wished to add something more to it. (Mr. Barker produced the writing which was identified by witness). The paper is dated in 1848 and Kaes died in the fall of 1850. He stated to witness that he had had some difficulty with his mother in regard to the land and that he had not conducted himself as he ought to have done towards her in this matter, for which he was sorry. Witness thinks Kaes stated to him that he had sent in a claim for the House Lot in his own name, which he had no right to do.

The ili consists of 2 separate pieces, one makai & the other mauka, and belonged to the father of claimant from ancient times. The boundaries are the same as set forth in the surveys now shown. Old W. Davis got this ili of land from Kamehameha I.

Kaalemakule, sworn, says he is a Kamaaina of Kapalama. Knows the ili of Kumuahakane. It belonged to Old W. Davis from the time of Kamehameha I. The ili consists of two separate pieces, as shown in the surveys, which two pieces belong to this ili without dispute.

Pahau, sworn, says he knows the land of Paele, at Waikiki, Oahu. It consists of one Kale patch in the ili of "Opukaala"; and 2 patches in the ili of Kapaakea I - a house lot also enclosed by a stone wall.

Thinks the survey made by Mr. Bishop of the piece in Kapaakea is wrong - it looks too large.

Paele got his land from Kaaha the then Koushiki, about the year 1842, and has held it in peace ever since.

Mookini, sworn, says he knows the Kuleana of Claimant. Has heard the testimony of Pahau and confirms it in full.

Paniani. from 226
Counter C. Kanaima.

Kalamakee, sworn, says he knows one of the patches in dispute. It was not a Koele maoli - it was cultivated by the Koushiki, Mokunui, after Peki went abroad. Kapule was Koushiki after Mokunui. Kapule did not make a Koele of this patch, but I held it under him as a hoaima. This was before the time of Kaomi. After Kapule, the land went to Kekuanawa who gave it to Kous Kaupun, who gave

the patch in question to Paniani, who has held and cultivated it up to the present time.

Honokaupu, sworn, says he knows the land claimed by Paniani. When I was made Kono'hiki of that land under Kiana, in 1837 perhaps, there was a man called Kekio on this place now disputed. The large patch now claimed by Kanaina was worked by me as a poalima. This patch was a poalima in my hands until 1847, when I left the land. I let out this large patch to Paniani about 1842, to cultivate under me, in the nature of a koele. This large patch was the only Lei poalima in Paniani's land - all the other patches were his own.

Apikii, sworn, says he knows the large patch in dispute. When Honokaupu was made Kono'hiki of the land, this large patch was cultivated by several of us under him, and the food from a part of the patch went to the Lord of the land.

Mahiani, sworn, says when Honokaupu had the moouina, the large patch in dispute was cultivated by 3 different men. Afterwards, this patch was given to Paniani (with all the moou) and he employed people to cultivate it. There was no poalima patch in this moou.

N^o. 1466. - KaanaanaDisp^d by Kanemakua 1445.

Kuu, sworn, says the House Lot claimed by Kaanaana is well known to him. It was formerly occupied by Kahue who lived under Kanemakua up to 1847, when Kahue went away to Kauai and gave up the place in dispute to Kanemakua. Kanemakua got the place in dispute with some land adjoining, from Kalaiheana in the time of Liko-liho, and it all belongs to him. Kaanaana has no title to any part of it.

Kameheu, sworn, says the title of the place in dispute is wholly in Kanemakua. Kaanaana is only a tenant at will under him. Witness formerly lived there himself under Kanemakua. Confirms in full the testimony of Kuu.

Counter the King.

Maahoe, sworn, says he knows the land in dispute in "Pupau", Kaneohe.

Kawana was the deputy Kōnōhiki of this land. He paid the Kōnōhiki a commutation for the poalima labor of the land, and then applied that labor to the cultivation of the land in dispute. There were three Kōele patches in "Pupau", viz; "Kupapa" - "Kamosiki" - & "Fuloki". The widow of Kawana holds these three Kōele patches at present.

I am not exactly a Kamaaina of that land. The 3 patches above named were Kōeles before the time of Kawana. Kawana exchanged a poalima Loi called "Kealaloo" with a Kanaka for "Kamosiki". The poalima labor on the above 3 patches was discontinued before the death of Kinan. Kawana got the land about the time Kinan died.

Kaulahoa, sworn, says I am a Kamaaina in Kaneohe. Kawana cultivated a patch called "Holawa". He got the land before the death of Kinan. Kawana paid the Kōnōhiki for the poalima labor of the land. I do not know whether the people of Pupau went to the poalima labor on Kawana's land because of the agreement with the Kōnōhiki or not. "Kamosiki" & "Kupapa" were Kōeles.

These two patches are now in the possession of Kawana's widow.

S. Kanaina, sworn, says he knows the land called "Pupau". It was once in my possession. Kawana held the land under me from 1839 up to the Division of 1848. He was my deputy Koushiki. He gave me a part of the food and of the fish and some money (Kapaumi) and the rest belonged to him. When I got "Pupau" it was all a Koele. There was no one on it and I therefore placed Kawana there as deputy Koushiki. Kawana told me there were eight Koele patches in "Pupau", but I do not know if that is correct. He came to me at one time & said he wished to put in a claim for some of this land, but I told him not to do so, but live under the Koushiki as formerly.

Kamehekuku, sworn, says Kawana got his land in "Pupau" as a Hoaina. After the death of a man called Kaiwi, who held 3 patches, his land was given to Kawana. Another man called Namomoku, forsook his land - 3 patches, and these were also given to Kawana. Another old man called Kaahiku gave Kawana one patch, which make seven patches which he held as a Hoaina. Kawana was deputy Koushiki of that part of "Pupau" which belonged to the Koushiki, first under Hoonaunau & afterwards under Kanaina. When Kaiwi died Kawana took his 3 Lois

41

into his own possession. When Kame-
moku deserted his patches they were
taken by Kawana as hake moaaina
& he paid the tax for them as such,
as he did for the patches of Kairi.
The seventh patch was a gift from Haa-
hiku to Kawana, who paid the Kou-
hiki's tax on all these patches. He cul-
tivated these 7 patches as a Hoaina.
He hired the poalima labor of the land
from Kanaia and thus cultivated
his own land. I do not know that
Kawana had more than seven pat-
ches in "Pupau" nona pona. I am a
Kanaia there.

Ta, Sworn, says he knows "Kamooiki"
& "Kupapa". They are in Kawana's
land, but neither of them are poa-
limas. Kawana held his seven
patches as a Hoaina.

(The single patch in "Wai Kahu" is Kouhiki's).

N. 1998. Napauau.

Kaumoia, sworn, says he knows the
claim of Napauau in Kapalama,
Oahu. It consists of a Kalo patch
& an auwai which Clt got from me
over ten years ago. I am the deputy
Kouhiki of the land. Claimant
has always occupied this land in
peace. The survey made by Mr.
Bishop is perfectly correct.

Feb 8th 1853.

No. 824. B.

Kiau.

Kamanawalani, sworn, says he knows the House lot claimed by Kiau, in Kawaiahae, Honolulu. It is bounded Maunaloa, by Puhikakama's House Lot, Waikiki side by a road, Makai side by Puhalahua's House Lot, - Ewa side by Kaima's House Lot. This House lot belonged to Kaiana the first husband of Kiau who got it from Kamuchanua II. Kaiana died about 9 years ago, and I have been told by Kiau that Kaiana left the House lot to her during her life, and after her to Kamaka & Waioha their two sons. The title is without dispute. It was formerly fenced in.

Kaunilapeahi, sworn, says he knows the House lot of Kiau - it is as described by the last witness. When Kaiana died I was present and heard him say that he left this House lot to his two sons. The claim is without dispute.

Kiau, appeared in person & says that Kaiana gave her the above lot in the life time of Kaahumanu, long before his death - that he left her then and went to live elsewhere. and that she (Kiau) married another man with whom she lived on the Lot in question - she denies any right in Kamaka & Waioha.

N^o 2263. Pikai.

Kaluanui, sworn, says she knows the land of Claimant in Kawananakoa, Honolulu Aina. It consists of a House site, unenclosed, on which claimant has one house. He has no land in cultivation. I know that Pikai has lived on this place for the last 12 years.

Kaanaana, sworn, says she knows the Kuleana of Pikai in "Kawananakoa". He has a House site unenclosed. He had some Kalo growing about six years ago, but none since that time. I know that Olt has lived there since before the death of Kinan.

N^o 9119. Kamane.

Claimant being sworn deposes that the land in Kalawahine Honolulu Aina, claimed by her, belongs properly to her husband George Wood, by deed of Gift from A. Keliakonu and M. Kekanonohi, and Kamane requests that said land may be awarded to her husband in his own name.

Palila, sworn, says he knows the Kuleana of Claimant in Kamakela, Honolulu Aina. It consists of 1 Kalo patch (or loko) in Kamakela and a House lot in Kaliu.

The Kalo patch is bounded Mauka by the land of Keoni, - Waikiki side by J. Montgomery's land, - Makai by Shue ula's land, - Ewa by Palila's land.

The House site is not enclosed. He has one house on it. Got red the Kalo patch from Nakoako in the life time of Kinau. The House lot he derived from his ancestors.

I do not know of any dispute to his claim.

Kana, sworn, says she knows the Kuleana of Claimant. It is as described by Palila and is un-
disputed.

Kaunakakaea, sworn, says he knows the land of Claimant, in Hamama-Kowaha, Manoa, Oahu. It consists of six Kalo patches & a House lot.

The six Kalo patches are in one piece, bounded Mauka by "Kamoolapa", - Palolo side by Honohiki, - Makai by Kalamake's land, - N.W. by "Kolowali".

His House site is not enclosed.

He has no house on this place. He lives elsewhere on his wife's land. He got the Kalo patches from Aikanaka in the life time of Kinan. I do not know of any objection to his claim.

Kalama, sworn, says he knows the land of Naiehe - six Kalo patches & a house site, which last is not occupied, as Naiehe has gone to live on another place. He has held the patches without dispute for many years.

N^o. 1926. Kanauki.

Halawa, sworn, says he knows the land of claimant in "Kolowali", Manoa, Oahu. It consists of 12 Kalo patches, a piece of Kalo land and a House lot. The 12 patches are in one piece, bounded Mauka by Halawa's land, - Palolo side by Paniani's land, - Makai by my land, - N.W. by Kanakaitiki's land.

Got the land from Kooloa a relative, who got it in the days of Kaahumanu. It is undisputed.

Kailili, sworn, says he knows the 3 Kalo patches of Olt. He confirms in full the testimony of last witness.

Kaohu, sworn, says he knows the land of Huikau, deceased, in Kamookahi, Waikiki. It consists of four Kalo patches, in one piece, bounded Mauka by the Kouhiki, - Wailele side by Kamaha's land, - Makai by Gov^t land, - Honolulu side by Kakakai. Huikau got these patches from Palauolelo the Kouhiki, in the days of Kaahumahu. When Huikau died about 1849 the land came to his daughter Kaiwi who now holds it.

Palauolelo, sworn, says I saw the Kouhiki of "Kamookahi", and know the land of Huikau. It is as set forth by the last witness. The claim is undisputed.

Kahuna, sworn, says she knows the land of claimant at Anaukai, Waikiki, Oahu. It consists of one Kalo patch, bounded Mauka by a Poalima patch, - Wailele side by Opupahoas land, - Makai by Kalsulele's land, - Honolulu side by Kuas.

His claim is undisputed.

Kamaukolu, sworn says I am the Kō-

Dispt^d by the King.

Aniani, sworn, says he knows the 3 Kalo patches in dispute between these parties, in "Kapalooa", Honolulu Aina. When Kuhia was Kono-hiki of this land - these 3 patches were cultivated by the people on the labor days of the Kono-hiki. These patches have no particular name. When Kuhia ceased to be Kono-hiki, the poalima labor on these patches was discontinued.

Kuhia had ceased to be Koro-hiki before 1845, but he was Koro-hiki until after the death of Kinau.

These patches were formerly in the possession of a man by the name of ~~W~~heakalani who got them from Kuhia in the life time of Kinau. When Wahaakalani was turned off the land was given to Nauaka the present claimant. When Wahaakalani held this land he cultivated the patches in question.

Kekuanani, sworn, says he knows the 3 patches in dispute. These patches were given to Wahaakalani when Kuhia was Koro-hiki, in the life time of Kinau and he cultivated them as a Haaimea. They were not cultivated by the labor of the people as paalimas. ~~W~~heakalani went to live at Waianae, and Nauaka then got the patches in question, since which he has held and cultivated the same. I have lived in that neighborhood since the time of Kaomi.

Makaravau, sworn, says he is a Haaimea of Kapala. These patches belonged to Wahaakalani

a houaina there, in former times. At one time Kuehā wished to plant rice there and asked ~~W~~heakalani for one or two patches for that purpose. ~~W~~heakalani consented & one patch was planted with rice for the Kouohiki. After the rice was cut Kuehā gave the patch back again to ~~W~~heakalani, and when he went to live at Hauanae, his land was given to Namaka who cultivated the same till his death in 1851, when his land to Mahu his widow.

N^o. 1120. Namaka July 28. 1853.

Dispt^d by the King.
Kuehā, sworn, says he knows the 3 patches in dispute. I was Kouohiki of that land in the days of Kinan. I never gave the patches in dispute to ~~W~~heakalani. These patches were made on the Kouohiki's land by the poalima labor under my direction. These patches belonged to the Kouohiki up to 1848, when I ceased to be Kouohiki.

~~W~~heakalani, sworn, says he formerly lived on the land of Kapala, when Kuehā was Kouohiki.

I held the same land which is now claimed by Namaka, and

when I went to live at Waianae
 Kamahe got my land, but the
 patches in dispute were not
 mine, they belonged to the Hou-
 hiki. These patches I know were
 worked by the poalima labor
 of the Houhiki during the
 whole of my residence on the
 land. They were never in the
 possession of any Hoaina.

Disp^d for the Government.

Paa, sworn, says he knows the land
 claimed by Kaalemakule, ^{imp} Kauhau,
 Kaliki, Oahu. I was Luma of
 that land formerly, under Mo-
 honua. Kaalemakule lived there
 at one time. He left this place
 in 1848 and gave the place to
 Liaikalani. Since that time the
 land has been uncultivated.
 It is now walehela

Kaukoa, sworn, says he knows the
 land in dispute. The land of
 Kaalemakule was exchanged with
 the Gov^t in 1848 for some Koels.

Kaalemakule left the land in
 1848 and went to Koolau. I bought
 part of the land from the Government
 and have been cultivating it
 for some years. The remainder

is nahilehale. No one belonging to Kalemakule lives there now.

Maakua, sworn, says he wrote out the claim of Kuaewa in Pauoa. He nolulu Aina, in the year 1848, and carried it to the office of the Land Commission and there delivered it.

Hamea, sworn, says she knows the land of blaimant in Pauoa. It consists of 5 kals patches, in one piece, bounded Mauka by Kukui's land, - Waikiki side by my land, - Makai by my land, - Ewa side by Kaka's land.

blaimant got the patches from me about the year 1840, and has held and cultivated them ever since, in peace.

Disp^d by C. Kanama.

The parties appeared and agreed in presence of the Board that the patches in dispute should be divided between them. The Board directed G. P. Kalama to survey the land accordingly.

This lot is bounded on the South East by Capt. Penhallows, Makai by W^m French, - On Ewa side by Crop street, - Mauka by Beretania street.

The Makai lot has been occupied by the King's people ever since the war on Kauai (1826). It is bounded mauka by Queen street, - Waikiki side by Richards' street, - Makai by the Sea, - West by a lot belonging to Haalelea. I do not know of any counter claim to this lot.

Kimealani, sworn, says I lived with my folks on this lot ~~when~~ the present King's mother in the time of Liholiho. Ever since which time this lot has been occupied by some of the King's retainers.

Kekukahiko, sworn, says he knows
the Lot in Honolulu, formerly oc-
cupied by Koi. It belongs to the King.

Ewa side by Henry St. John.

The King got this lot from Kapu

soldiers for the King before Kinau's
death. This lot is bounded Mauka
by Kaniku's lot, Waikiki side by
R. C. Janison's lot, Makai by Merchant
Street, Ewa side by W. Kamamalu.

Kahaha, sworn, says he knows this Lot. I assisted in building the enclosure round this lot for the King before the death of Kahiawana. The boundaries are as set forth by Kuapani. The Printing Office stands within this lot.

 Lihue, and I sent my man to tell
 him to come to the poalima labor.
 He came back and told me that

The House lot is fenced in and there is one House in it. Keaka has sold his claim to Kioea.

Keaka got this land from his Ancestors.

Uikahanna, sworn says he knows the land of Keaka. The 6 Kale patches & House site are joined together. Keaka sold this land to Kioea some time ago. Confirms the testimony of Kaha-Kaniwa.

Nalukulu, sworn, says Pulaunki returned the land claimed by him in Waikale, Ewa, to the Kouohiki, in 1848, and paid \$10. He went to live with Rev A. Bishop and subsequently died in his service.

No. 854. Huluhulu.

Hokamumumu, sworn, says he knows ^{the land} formerly occupied by Huluhulu, at Waikoloa. He held a whole mos containing eight patches. In 1846 Blainant went to reside at Lihue. He has lived there ever since. The luna of the Koroehiki has had possession of the 8 patches since that time. Olt has not gone to the labor days of the Koroehiki since he went to live at Lihue. There is no one living on these 8 patches at present. They have been left uncultivated until about 3 weeks ago when Olt commenced to take the weeds out of a part of them.

Makuna, sworn, says the patches claimed by Huluhulu have not been cultivated since he went to live at Lihue.

Blainant appeared in person and stated that she had given up over her land to Kamoana, and desired the award to be made accordingly.

Disp^d by Haalelea.

Kaualoa, sworn, says she knows the large patch now in dispute, called "Kauhina". It belonged formerly to Kekauonohi & now to Haalelea, but G. Wood has cultivated for several years. He did not have at the time of Kiaman's death. The patch is an old Koele. I never heard that Kekauonohi gave this patch lilo loa to G. Wood. I used to live with Kekauonohi.

Wahineonakai, sworn, says she knows this patch. It belonged to Kekauonohi & now to Haalelea. George Wood did not get it till after the death of Kiaman. I was living with Kekauonohi when Mr. Wood got this patch. He did not get it lilo loa but only under the chief. The land he got lilo loa is distinct from this patch. This patch is a Koele, & was cultivated by the hoalima labor under Ulualoha the Luna under Kekauonohi. Kekauonohi gave Mr. Wood a deed for the land she gave him lilo loa but it does not include "Kauhina".

M. Kekuanana, sworn, says he knows the patch called "Kauhina". It formerly belonged to the Govt but in 1830 perhaps it went to Kekauonohi. After it went to her she kept it as a poalimua. I think George Wood has cultivated this patch since about 1840, but I never heard that Kekauonohi gave him this patch lilo loa.

Keekepa, sworn, says my husband Pehu, was Luma of this land under Keliakoumi. "Kauhina" was a Koele at that time. Kahakili gave this patch to George Wood about 1844 perhaps. Kahakili was a Luma under Kekauonohi. All I know about it is that George Wood has cultivated this patch since that time. I do not know that it was given to him lilo loa.

Koi, sworn, The land which Wood has enclosed was given to him when Kekauonohi lived at Maunaloa. The patch in dispute was given to him in 1844. I was at Kekauonohi's house when she was preparing to go to Hawaii. Mr. Wood came there and Kekauonohi asked how for some silk, cloth &c. Mr. Wood gave her 3 rolls of silk bought at Reynolds' store. Kekauonohi

gave Kamann (Mrs. Wood) \$90 to pay for the silks &c. On the same day Kekamomoki gave orders to her Lina to let the Woods have the patch called "Kaukina". & gave them that they should not pay any Koushiki tax for the land they held before. Since that time they have held the patch under the Koushiki ~~cession~~. The Koushiki tax was paid by Kamann to save her from going to the poa-lima labor.

Counter Kalaiheana.

Kalua, sworn, says she is a Hama-ama of "Kamewa". Knows the loi in dispute. I was Koushiki of that land about 1827. ~~It is~~ The patch in dispute was a Koele during my residence there up to the time of Kasumi - 18 years ago. I don't know about the patch since that time.

Lekuani, sworn, says this patch was not a Koele when he was Luma of the land in 1842.

Claimant went regularly to the poa-lima labor of the Koushiki for this patch.

Kawaa, sworn, says this patch has not been cultivated by the poulina labor since 1835. Kaluawaa cultivated the patch and eat the fruit of it up to his death, & then left it for his widow.

He lived there himself up to 1845, until he followed the Chiefs to Hououlu. He left his house in charge of his Brother Paupau. In 1847 he took away the place from Paupau and gave it to Koahou (me) and Napapai his sister in law. There is a large Puhala standing on the lot which was planted by Napahi.

B. Kamakeha, sworn, says when we went to Lahaina to bury Nahienaa, Napahi was living on this lot. He rented the lot or gave permission to ~~the foreigners~~ ^{a foreigner} to build on it about 1846, for \$10 p month, but they did not agree & when I was Acty Governor of Maui Napahi bought the foreigner's house & got him off the land. At one time I went by order of the King to settle a dispute between Napahi & Kapau about their boundaries, I put them to rights & they agreed to it. I never knew that any one else but Napahi had any right to this piece of land.

Piiaa, sworn, says this Kuleana was given to Ulu by Kamaha, the Koushiki when she left Waiakea to reside on Piikouua about the year 1835, & that Ulu has been in the quiet possession of it from that time to the present. Piiaa he then lived as a domestic of Kamaha and was personally knowing to the gift of this place to Ulu. The boundary on the makai side is the enclosure since made by Piiaa, a chudaman deceased, - on the Hilo side the Kuleana of Po-hano, from which it is now separated by a road since laid out, - on the mauka side by the Kuleana of Kookia, - on the Puna or South E. side a water course which separates it from the Kuleana of Kei. He examined the plot of the Survey

made by H. M. Lyman, & thinks it correct. Was knowing to Ulu's applying to the Land Commission for this Kuleana, he thinks in 1847, - when Kaawai was here the application was not found, but testimony was heard.

Kahalehau, grandson of Namaha, sworn, says the testimony of Puaa is true.

[The above testimony was given at Hilo before Rev. Mr. Lyman].

N. 1783. Mikaele - for the heirs of Aina - Chinaman.

Kahalehau, sworn, says this place was given to the Chinaman, Aina, by Gov. Adams who wrote to Namaha then Konoiki of Pihonua to that effect. The date of the letter was about the time Aina came to reside on the place - is not able to state the year. Aina and his heirs have been in quiet possession of the place from that time to the present. It is situated between the places of B. Pitman Esq., Ulu, Paulo, Kapapa and Akina & the main road, with a street recently laid out running from Pitman Street South Westerly through about the centre of this Kuleana.

says, moreover, that he himself went to Oahu the bearer of his own and a number of other applications - that Mikaele went with him to the Hale Kauhila, and at the door gave him a paper saying, "this is my application, hand it in with the others", - and he handed it in as requested; did not read the contents of that paper. Messrs. Si, Andrews, Namamau & others were present.

Ulu, Swaru, says he came to live in his present place about the year 1835, and he thinks about three years subsequently Aina came to live on this place and erected a Sugar Mill upon it - and that Aina & his heirs have been in quiet possession from that time to the present. He knew of Mikaele's going to Oahu to put in their claim - The boundaries are as described by Kahalekau.

(The above testimony was given before Rev. Mr. Lyman at Hilo).

N^o 8957. Kūkaumea.

Kanehailua, sworn, says he knows the land of Blainant in Kāhalaou, Manoa valley. It consists of five Pālo patches, in one piece, bounded Mauka by Kūholono's land, - Palole side by Kamakea, - Makai by the land of Kivi, - Honolulu side by Hina. There is no poalima Loi included in the above. Olt derived this land from his brother Kahaiapo, in 1845 and held it since in peace. His brother derived the land from his ancestors who had it before him.

J. C. H. Rooke, sworn, says he knows the two House lots in Kumuann street Honolulu, claimed for the heir of Geo. Wilkinson, deceased.

The Makai Lot was leased by me to Tyhoum, for the benefit of George Wilkinson. It is bounded Mauka by Tyhoum's store lot, - Waikiki side by Kumuann street, - Makai by Kalunaino's lot, - Ewa side by Kalunaino's. This lot was given by Kalunaino to Geo. Wilkinson about the year 1838. Wilkinson held undisturbed possession of it till his death at Valparaiso in '46 or '47. At his death I handed over his will then in my possession to Messrs Thompson & Montgomery, his executors.

The Mauka Lot was bought by Wilkinson from Jas. Ruddoch.

It is bounded Makai by Merrills premises, - Ewa side by French Mission land, - Mauka by Kekuanoo's land, - Waikiki side by Kumuann street. This lot was purchased from Ruddoch in 1843. I advanced the funds.

Wilkinson left here in 1844, and from then till his death, I collected the rents of the two lots & forwarded the money to him. By his will I believe he left his property to his children & in case of their death

to his wife. His wife and all his children except his son Thomas L. Wilkinson, now six teen years of age, are dead.

J. Thompson, sworn, says he and J. Montgomery were the Executors named in Wilkinson's Will. As Executor I have had charge of the two House Lots since Wilkinson's wife returned from Valparaiso. The Mauka Lot was leased by me to a man by the name of Brewster about 6 years ago. A Portuguese called Paiko holds it now. The boundaries of both Lots as given by D. Rooke are correct I believe. The only one of Wilkinson's family now alive is his son Thomas.

N. 824.^B Maui. ~~See page 420.~~
 Ioua Pitkoi, sworn, says he knows the House Lot of Ctt. Says the Ctt lived on this lot with her first husband just after the Kamaui war - 26 years ago. She has occupied this place ever since. I never heard of any one disputing her right to this place until quite lately that a man called Kamaka has set up a claim to it, upon what ground I am not aware. I believe it is wholly Maui's.

Counter the Government:

C. Kanaina, sworn, says the ili of "Wai-kakalulu" was given to Kalama after the death of Kaomi, when Capt. Belcher was here - and at the Division of lands in 1848 this ili was given to her again by the King, excepting only such parts of it as are occupied by the Gov^t or by private parties.

This ile of Waikakalulu is bounded on Waikiki side by "Kaakaukukui" & "Kuwaioluu". Makai by the Sand Point; Ewa side by the inner Harbor; Mauka by Beritania Street.

This ili was formerly in the possession of Kaiana a Chief under Kamehameha I, from the time of the Battle of Muanuu until it was given to Kaomi by His present Majesty.

After Kaomi died it was given to Kalama. The stone or coral on this ili was taboed by Kinan for the Gov^t, but I cannot tell the year. But it was not taboed so that the Kono hiki who held the land could not cut stone on it - no one else could do so however.

I cut stone on it in the life time of Kaakumanu. No one was allowed to cut stone on it without Kinan's consent. Does not consider that this land belongs to the Gov^t as a part of the Harbor.

M. Hekuanoo, sworn, says he knows the

Ili of Waikahalulu. Knows that Hinan tabooed the stone on this ili. When Kuakini was Governor he held this ili. After that it was given to Kaomi by the present King and subsequently to Kalama. Hinan tabooed the stone by her own authority. The Govt. was not organized at that time. If any of the Chiefs wanted to cut stone they had only to ask her, but if any Kanaka cut stone there he had to divide with her. I think the Govt. can taboo the stone but not the substratum under it, for that belongs to the land.

A. Paki, sworn, says when I was acting Governor of Oahu, in 1822 perhaps, my father Hinan had charge of Waikahalulu. After we were gone the land was given to Kalama. In former times, the only taboos on these makai lands, as far as I know, were put on by the several Honohikis. By the Organic Act the coral reefs were tabooed by the Legislature. But the taboo put on before that for the purpose of preventing the filling up of the Harbor was declared by myself, by order of the Governor of Oahu in 1844. But the soil and all the rights & privileges appertaining to the land belongs to the Honohiki never to the Govt.

John Young, sworn, says he thinks the mauka part of Waikahalahulu belongs to Kalamā. By the first Laws it was declared that no private individual could take any property or land which the Chiefs had set apart for the Govt. This was confirmed by the New Statutes, which declare the coal reefs on all the islands to ^{be} Govt. property. The rights of piscary however still remain with the Kōnōhikis. I have understood that cutting the stone on this land was tabooed to prevent the Harbor from being filled up, and since I was made Minister of the Interior none of the Chiefs have been permitted to cut stone there without the consent of the Privy Council. The Govt. had some idea of selling a part of it at one time and had it surveyed by Mr. Metcalf. But by advice of Col Smith, in 1849 perhaps, they declined to sell it. Kanaina never mentioned this claim on behalf of the Queen till recently when the N. P. S. Navigation Company applied for a part of the land. The Govt. has exercised the rights of ownership on it ever since I came to be Minister of the Interior and the taboo on the stone by A. Pahi was done in his capacity of Govt. Agency. The Govt. has disposed of a part of the land to the N. P. S. Company.

L. Kaalela, sworn, says the stone on this land was tabooed by Kinan who also forbid the women from gathering limu there &c. After her death these restrictions appeared to be discontinued, and the people indiscriminately went there for limu. I heard of the taboo declared by Taki in 1844 to prevent the Harbor from being filled up.

G. P. Judd, sworn, - When I came to the Islands, the Harbor and the land in question were in the hands of the Governor of Oahu. In the time of Kuakini (Gov^r of Oahu) the stone began to be tabooed by the Gov^t. & so it has been ever since. I never heard that the Queen claimed this makai lele of Waikahakahu till 1850, when her agent Kanaina started this claim. As I understand it, this lele belongs to the Government as a part of the Harbor, and I do not think the Queen or any one else has a right to it. In former times, all the people were allowed indiscriminately to go and take limu there, I do not know that the people of Waikahakahu alone were privileged to take limu. (This is admitted by Kanaina) At the

Division of lands in 1848, I understood that the mauka part only of this Ili was given to the Queen.

P. P. Kalamā, sworn, says he acted as clerk at the Division of lands, in the Palace in 1848. At the Division of the Queen's lands, the ili of Waia-kahalulu was given to her - that is to say, the mauka part of it only, and it was distinctly stated by Mr. Young, Mr. Judd & others at the time that she did not take the makai ile now in dispute, which it was understood the Govt. had previously set apart for its own purposes.

Kaui, sworn, says he knows the House Lot of Blaimant in Waimea, Island of Kauai. It is called "Puehawaii". It is enclosed with a stone fence. It has an adobe house on the lot, which was built by his deceased brother in law, Keawe. It derived this lot from his ancestors, who got from Kaikooewa. The title of the lot is disputed by Namokuliu, but on what ground I am not aware. The lot is bounded on the East by the prison, on the South by the Coast Road, on the West by Hoopalake's house lot, - on the North by a pali.

Luka, sworn, says he has heard the testimony given by the last witness, and confirms the same in full.

Kalaetoa, sworn, says he knows the land claimed by Kahope, in Kapalama, Oahu. It consists of five Kalo patches in one piece, bounded Mauka by the Kouohiki, - on all the other sides bounded by the same.

Old's House Lot is in the ili of "Kuwili" - Honolulu. It is partially enclosed. There are two houses in the lot belonging to Kahope's brother.

N^o 5820. Kapunai.Disp^y for the King.

Lihue, sworn, says he knows the part of this claim now in dispute, in the ili of "Paali" Kaneohe. There are 2 patches in dispute. They were Koele patches in the time of Kamehameha I, when he lived at Waikiki. - I am the Luna of the Kouohiki on that land. I have been Luna about 4 years, and I have worked these patches as Koeles. They were Koeles also in the time of my predecessor, Panalau. Kapunai planted these 2 patches some time under the Kouohiki & divided the food with him.

Kaholo, sworn, says he is a Kaniaina of Kaneohe. The 2 patches now in dispute were Koeles in ancient times.

I left Kaneohe in the time of Kaakemann. Since that time I do not know whether these patches were Koels or not.

Kuiaia, sworn says he is a Kamaaina of Kaneohe. These two patches are not poalimas. The poalimas are in another place. Panalaeu gave these patches to Kapunai before the death of Kinan. Kapunai never divided the food with the Kouohiki, he took it all for his own use, & held the patches up to the time of his death in 1848.

Kepani, sworn, says the patches in dispute have always belonged to the Kouohiki. Kapunai got these patches from Panalaeu about 1843, and cultivated them up to the time of his death. I do not know whether Kouohiki got a part of the food or not. I know that Panalaeu worked these two patches as poalimas between the death of Kinan & 1843. They were always poalima patches as far as I know.

Clt rec^d this land from the Koushiki Kaa, before the death of Kinan and has held it in peace up to this time.

Kahana, sworn, says he knows the 3 Kalo patches & Kula land of ctt. He confirms in full the testimony of the last witness.

Claimant appeared in person, and stated that he has no right to the land mentioned in this claim, it belongs to the Konoheki.

N^o 5959. Makaualii.
Claimant appeared in person and states that he has no right to the land mentioned in this claim. It belongs to the Konoheki.

Claimant appeared in person and states that he has no right to the land mentioned in this claim. It belongs to the Konoheki.

N^o 6132. Nahuawai.
Claimant appeared in person and states that he has no right to the land mentioned in this claim. It belongs to the Konoheki.

No 6140. Kahalepili.

Haa, sworn, says he knows the land of Olt in Waiaua, Ewa.

It consists of 10 Kalo patches and a House site forming one piece, bounded on Waialua side by the Koushiki, - Mauka by a wall, - the Honolulu side by Haoli's land, - Makai side by the Koushiki.

Olt rec^d this land from Kaluanaina in ancient times. His claim is disputed by Kahaulono the present Koushiki.

[Gov^r Kekuanoua who is Lord of the land allows this claim].

Kailiulaula, sworn, says he knows the land of Olt at Panoa, Manoa Valley. It consists of 9 Kalo patches, in 2 pieces, and a House Lot.

The first piece, of 6 patches is bounded, Mauka & Palolo sides by the Koushiki, - Makai by Kashi's land, - Honolulu side by Koushiki.

The second piece, of 3 patches is bounded Mauka by Kerkamea's land, Palolo side by C. Kana'ina, - Makai by Kalamakee's land, - Honolulu side by Soane Si.

The House lot is enclosed but there is no house in it at present.

Olt lives at present in Honolulu. Heave cultivates the land at present under Kana'ina.

Mamala got this land from Kaawahu in 1839, and he cultivated it till 1848, when Kamaina took away one patch. Mamala has not lived there since 1849.

Pamani, sworn, I know that Mamala possessed these 9 patches in 1843 and up to 1849 when Kasi-kali, the Luna of C. Kamaina, took them away for debt. Mamala then left the place, but still contends for his right to the land. His debt to the Luna was only \$5.50.

He gives up the 2nd Piece of 3 patches.

Counter Kalua.

Kalawaia, sworn, says he knows the land of Nowelo. I have lived near there for nine years. I know the 2 Lokos now in dispute, their names are "Kumuohia" & "Kumuuli". I knew Kalua Sen" the former Koushiki, under whom Nowelo lived. It is customary to give names to all the patches whether Koels or not. There was fish in these patches when Kalua was alive, they were Nowelo's fish. I do not know who gave these Lokos to Nowelo. The fish & food belonged to Nowelo only. There are Bread fruit trees there, planted in ancient times. I do not know

whose they are. I knew Kaiwi
when he lived there.

There was another Hoaina lived
there, his name was Kamanna.
Kalua was a Luma under the King.
Kalua owned the Koles.

Pau, sworn, says he knows the two
Lokos now in dispute. Nowels cul-
tivated the Koles patches under Kalua.
I have lived there 14 years during
which time these 2 Lokos now in
dispute have not been cultivated
as Koles. Nowels has planted the
food in these two patches for 14 years.
He also possessed the fish. I do not
know the names of the 4 Koles patches
in this land.

Cross E? I know that Nowels has
lived there 14 years.

Kalua, sworn, says he knows the
2 Lokos now in dispute. A man
by the name of Kamanna formerly
held these two Lokos under Kalua the
Koushiki. Nowels lived at that time
at "Kanafolei". After Kamanna
left this land Nowels then planted
it up till 1850 when my knowledge
of it ceases. The food of these two
Lokos belonged to the Hoaina, who
cultivated them.

To the Hon. Land Commission,
Gentlemen,

I have given such attention to your communication of the 8th just as was in my power. As to the N^o. of the claims I have no means of comparison, so I quote them as you write. Neither am I sure that in all cases I have found the right person as quite a number of the names are from Mokuiaia and Kawaihapai, where the people are all satisfied with their allodial titles so far as I know.

N^o. 8019. Ahukai.

We know not who he is.

8050. Euaui.

Has abandoned his claim on oath, July 20, 1853, before me.

~~8077~~ 8044. Hikiau.

Abandoned on oath July 20th.

912. Haule.

Dead. wife Kahiki abandoned on oath July 26. lives in Mokuiaia or Kawaihapai.

8161. ~~8165~~. Hanaiiki.

Dead. Wahinehuna his heir abandoned on oath July 26th.

893.

Kalalawalu.

Now lives at Moanahua - most of her children are with her. one came to make oath that the claim was abandoned, but was too young & incompetent to do the business. July 26.

915.

Kaona.

I find 4 persons of this name. Two disclaim the transaction - one has gone to parts unknown - and one is dead & his heirs are satisfied with the Allodial title in Kawaihapai.

2790.

Kaluhia.

Dead. his wife, Kahai, swore that her land claims are awarded by the Land Com. in full.

2857.

Kuaehu.

No information.

2882.

Kakuna.

If of Kawaihoa, his claims are awarded in full. I hear of no other man of the name.

2883.

Kukea.

Swore that his Kuleanas were cancelled by Allodial titles, July 26th.

3179.

Kaleikau.

No information.

2901. Kaula.
Gone to parts unknown - his claim was good for nothing and is merged in another.
4060. Keaweheale.
Both he and his wife are dead. his claim not good by law or justice. his children are at La-haina. his claims are awarded to others.
8307. Kaopulupula.
His claim is good & is surveyed, but, altho' often requested he has never come to furnish testimony to his claim, nor yet to abandon it.
8671. Kaukuna.
No information.
900. Moewaa.
Dead - Aukake, his heir, made oath that the claim was cancelled by purchase in fee simple, July 26.
2768. Maia.
Has not come near me altho' requested.
2717. Puaapilau.
Gone to Kawai.

10,186. Mooi.

He is in Honolulu and Koushiki says his claim was given to Kanepilan & is awarded with Kanepilan's under one title.

10,242. Makuwahine.

Dead. his wife is Kumana - Son Kaupaona. do not come near me.

871. Kiho.

Dead. Aukake, his heir, swore that he and his brother abandon the claim, July 25th.

I might perhaps get more information in respect to two or three persons, by keeping this and spending a days time in hunting up the other persons, but I cannot well spare the time, and I do not think that they will ever wish to hear from the claimers again.

Dominis' Lot, - Makai by Keritania street, - Ewa side by a land called called "Kasopua". - The above boundaries include the Lot given to the late M^r. Richards, - and the lot of Anthony Jenkins (or Stuppelbein's) and some other lots joining the street. This lot ~~belonged~~ was enclosed by Poki when he was Governor of Oahu, and he built a house on it for the King. The King lived there until 1826, when he went to Lahaina. The King has always held this lot without any dispute up to the present time.

Kapeu, sworn, says he has heard the testimony of the last witness, and confirms the same in full.

Kamaelu, sworn, says he knows the Lot belonging formerly to the King and occupied at one time by William Ladd.

It is bounded, Mauka, by Chaplain's Lane, - on Waikiki side by Fort street, - Makai by a lot belonging to Pitkoi, - Ewa side by M^r. Damon's lot.

This lot is a part of what was formerly called the ili of "Kaspuana".

which belonged to Pōki, and after him to Liliha, and from her it came to the King. The King always held this lot without dispute up to the time he sold it to Mr. Boardman. It was leased at one time to W^m Ladd.

Kekukahiko, sworn, confirms in full the testimony of the last witness.

Jona, Pūkai, sworn, says he knows the Loko, called "Kaimukauaka", claimed by the King. It belonged in ancient

times to Kamehameha I. I have always understood that this Loko descended from Kamehameha I to K II and from him to the present King. It was formerly a fish pond, but is now a Salt Pond. I do not know whether this Loko is a part of "Kaakau Kukui" or not. I never heard that the King had given away this Pond to any person. I do not know positively that it belongs to the King.

Kekukahiko, sworn, says he has always understood that "Kaimu Kanaka" belonged to K I and K II and now to the King.

Keliakouini, the late Chamberlain, put in this claim for the King I presume.

Claimant derived this lot from Kalaeluhihonohi his father in the year 1822, and has held it ever since without dispute. This lot is enclosed.

Kamanoualani, sworn, says he

knows the Home lot of Claimant.

He confirms in full the testimony of last witness. There is but one house on the lot & that belongs to Puhalaheua.

Mr. Kekuanana, sworn, says he knows the place claimed by Kasi. It is bounded Manuka by John Heeke's land, Waikiki by a road, Makai by Hannah Holmes, Honolulu by Kekuanana's. It was not enclosed formerly. Kasi lived there about 18 years ago. He once had a dispute with Hannah Holmes about the place and appealed to me. I sent Kapena to settle the matter and told Hannah to confine her boundary to the land formerly given by Peki to John C. Jones.

Hekeu, sworn, says he knows the place in question. Has lived near there since 1843. At that time it was lying waste and unenclosed. There were some houses on the place belonging to Kasi and Wahine. In the same year Kasi went to live at Punalau, where he has lived ever since. Wahine still

lives on this place, outside of the wall of Hannah Holmes. The place where Kasi's house formerly stood is now included in the lot of Hannah Holmes.

N^o. 1173. Wakinealua.

Testimony respecting the Kuleana of Wakinealua, on the ili of Menoho, Waiakea, Hilo, taken Feb 23/53.

Kalua, sworn, says Wakinealua and his heirs have been in the quiet possession of this Kuleana from the time Maalo was head man of Waiakea till the present time.

It lies on the lower side of the main road from Hilo to Puna and Olaa, extending from the Kuleana of Christopher Peakey on the N.W. to the claim of Kealike on the S.E. On the side opposite that adjoining the road it is bounded by the Kamohiki.

Wetup says that he and others gave testimony in this claim before Kaauwai in 1848 at Hilo.

Kamamohaka, sworn, says he is well acquainted with this Kuleana and its occupants, and that Kalua's testimony is true.

W^m Momona, circuit judge, sworn, says he was clerk for Kaauwai when here taking evidence on Land Claims, and is confident from his own recollection that the testimony of Kalua and Kamamohaka, so far as it relates

to the examination of witnesses before. Kaunwai, is true. He says, moreover, that when he took up his residence at Kanohe in 1849, that ili was in the care of his wife, Kahalelanu, and he understood this Kuleana belonged to the heirs of Wahinealua, and has not since heard or known anything leading him to doubt it. Maalo ceased to be head man of Waiakea about the year 1834.

(W. Pitman has seen the survey and testimony, and I understand him to admit the claim as probably good).

Kamanohaka, sworn, says Kealiko and her heirs have been in quiet possession of this land from the time Maalo was head man of this land (1834) that after Maalo's removal she lived under Kahalelanu, who with her first husband, Kaiana, had charge of that ili (Kanohe), and that with their knowledge and full consent she applied to the Land Commission for this place.

It is situated on the makai side of the Alama'i Aupuni, extending from the Kuleana of Wahinealua to that of Parehaha, those Kuleanas being the boundaries on two sides, the third side being bounded by the road. The piece

In surveying, a part was cut off for the Kauhiki on the side adjoining the Kuleana of Wahinealua, at the instance of the Surveyor. Says he gave testimony on this claim in 1848 before Kaaunwai.

Kalua, sworn, says he is well acquainted with this Kuleana and its occupants. That the testimony of Kamanshaka is true, and that their testimony in the case was taken by Kaaunwai, also that of Barewaba, Krahopu & others.

Momona, Circuit Judge, sworn, says he was clerk for Kaaunwai when taking testimony on the Hele land claims, and is confident from his own personal recollection that the testimony of these witnesses, so far as relates to giving testimony before Kaaunwai, is true. He says, moreover, that when he took up his residence at Kenuho in 1849, that ili was in charge of his wife, Kahalelanu, and he then understood this Kuleana belonged to Keali'ho and her heirs.

(W. Pitman has seen the survey and testimony, and I understand him to regard the claim as good. Kauhiki is understood to have been heir of Keali'ho.) D. B. L. -

P. Mahalelua, sworn, says he knows the piece of land claimed by Keoni Ana, at "Owa", Waialua. It is now in the care of Kuikelani, who probably pointed out the boundaries to the surveyor, and by whose land it is surrounded. The plot made by E. Bailey is correct. Claimant received this land from the King about the year 1841.

Knows the lot in Lahaina occupied by Fanny Young. Claimant puts in this claim for Fanny, his sister. The lot is in the Ahupuaa of "Pakala". It consists of several separate pieces now united in one Lot, enclosed with a fence. It is bounded Maunaloa by the Street, - Olowalu side

by Kamae's land, - Makai by the
Paki's half of the Lots called "Kaa-
lolo"; - Kaunapali by Haalon and
Laahili. The claim of Fanny
Young to this Lot is undisputed.

Knows claimant's lot in the
Akupuaa of "Paki", Lahaina.
There is a stone house on it which
was given by the King to Alapai
the deceased wife of claimant in

Knows the Loko of claimant in "Kupeke", Molokai. It is on the sea side. It was given to claimant by the King about the year 1840, and is at present in my charge. The Ahupuaa of "Kupeke" belongs to Peke Davis the sister of George Davis Kuen, or her heirs. The Loko does not belong to the Ahupuaa.

J. C. B. Rooke, sworn, says he knows the Mow of land in "Kapaa Lania" Oahu claimed by Keoni Ana. Wetup himself had charge of it for claimant about 1838. Knows of no counter claim to this lot. Recognizes the lot as surveyed by A. Bishop.

The survey made by W. Bishop of the Kalo land is correct.

Kimo, sworn, says he knows the land of Olt in "Kaliawa", Kaliki, Oahu.

It consists of one piece of land in which are his Kalo patches and House Lot. It is bounded Maunaloa by Hopuia's land, Waikiki side by the Kouohiki, Maunaloa by Kouohiki, Ewa side by a stone wall. Olt rec^d the land from Wth. Beckley about 15 years ago and lived there upto the time of his death a short time ago. I know of no opposition to his claim.

J. S. Nailili, sworn, says the boundaries as given by the last witness includes on the land for

cultivation. Olt's House lot is near the seaside in the Ili "Kionawawana". It is not enclosed. Olt rec^d. the land from my father (Kana'i) in the lifetime of Kaakuaunani. No one disputes this claim to my knowledge.

Kaonohi, sworn, says he knows the land of Kelea in "Keonawawana", Kaliki, Oahu. It consists of a House site and 7 kalo patches in one piece. It is bounded Maunaka by Kaimapau, - Waikiki side by Peapea, - Makai by Kaimapau, - Ewa side by the Kouohiki.

It is near the Seaside just mauka of the public road. It is fenced in.

Witness knows the House lot claimed by Kamanawa in "Kuhaukeae".

This House lot belonged in ancient times to the present King's mother, Keopuolani, but the whole land was in charge of Etti's mother. Etti spoke to the King a few years ago about this lot and he told her to put in a claim for it in her own name. It is on the Seaside just mauka of the main road and is enclosed with a wall.

When the King returned to Hawaii the land still remained in charge of Kaunamakea under Kuikelani. After the death of K.I. the land fell to K.II. Kaahumanu had charge of the land under K.II. "Peleula" is a part of the "Ili" of Kaakankukui. The ili of Kaakankukui belonged to Kaahumanu from the time of K.I. till her death. In the time of K.II the people of Kaahumanu, Kekuanaoa &c. cultivated "Peleula" for Kaahumanu.

After Kaaheuanui's death the title of "Kaa-
 Kaaheuanui" fell to Kinan, but "Peleula"
 was considered as distinct and as
 belonging to the King. In the time of
 Kinan the present King cultivated Pele-
 ula, and Kinan and Kekuanawa
 were Lunas for the King on this land.
 After Kinan's death in 1839, Kekuanawa had
 charge of "Peleula" for the King, and in
 1845 I and the other Kulu-manues
 assisted in planting this land with
 trees &c for the King.

Isa Pitkoi, sworn, I do not know

positively as to this land in ancient times but have heard that it was a Kikapoi of K.I. The same as to K.II and that it came from him to the present King. When the King came down from Lahaina in 1844, the King said to me "go to Kekuanaoa for 'Peleula'". I went to Kekuanaoa and told him the King wanted "Peleula" to cultivate. Kekuanaoa consented, but said the land is mine & you may plant it under me. So I planted the land with the King's men. I leased a part of the land to G. Pinsky for the King about the same time as I planted the Kukui trees. Kekuanaoa made no opposition to the lease. At one time I recollect Kekuanaoa saying to me "I have heard the King & you have mortgaged 'Peleula', I object to that." When the King's claim was sent in for this land I spoke to him in regard to it, and he said yes that is right, that land belonged to my father and then to my brother and then to me."

Kenaku, sworn, says She knows the Kuleana of claimant in Kahookane, Honolulu Aina. It consists of a House Lot in one piece, and two Kalo patches in another piece.

The House site is not enclosed. It is bounded Mauhaka by my lot, Maikiki the Water works, - Makai by Kawanau's Lot, - Ewa side by Kuuau Road.

The Kalo land is bounded Mauhaka by the Kouohiki, Maikiki side by a stream, - Makai by the Kouohiki, - Ewa side by the Govt. land.

The Kalo patches are bounded Mauka by the Kouohiki's land. - On Waikiki side by a stream. - Makai by the Kouohiki's land. - Uwa side by the line of "Kewala". This land was given by Kuhia a Kouohiki of this land, in the time of Kamae, to Hikian a son of claimant, from whom claimant derived it. Elt lived on this land up to the time of his death about 1848. A. Paki, Sworn, for the Gov^t

Knows that the fish pond called "Kawa", in Honolulu, was broken up in the year 1847, & the materials of the wall taken to help "construct the wall or Breakwater erected by the Gov^t on the west side of the Harb^r for.

The Gov^t got permission from M. Kekuanāoa to take the materials of the wall of "Kawa" to make the Breakwater. He did not give the Government any portion of the soil of "Kawa", or of "Kaakaukukui". The land on which now stands the Government Slaughter House, occupied by John Meek, is a portion of the ili of "Kaliu". I do not know what title the Gov^t has to that place, but I have heard that Kekuanāoa had given it to the Gov^t - this I state as hearsay only.

G. P. Judd, Sworn, for Gov^t, says, I was the Hawaiian Minister of Finance in the year 1847, and remember when the wall was built from the present Lime Kiln House running over to the land of Sea & Summer, known as "Koholaloa". It was built to prevent the filling up of the Harbor of Honolulu. It was thought advisable to remove a part of the wall of a fish pond in "Kawa", which I supposed belonged

to the Government. Finding, however, that it was claimed, by M. Kekuanana, for Victoria, Mr. Young and I, applied to him for the privilege of removing it, which he granted to us, and accordingly it was removed under the direction of Pukoi and the stone put into the new wall first named, and my impression is that we built a new partition wall for the Governor's fish pond: I will not be certain however, Pukoi will know. Pukoi ran a plow through the fish pond to give direction to the stream and divert it from the harbor. I never knew of any definite cession of the fish pond or other land to the Government, but I think Kekuanana consented that the Government should divide the fish pond, in Privy Council.¹⁸⁴¹ I didn't know that he claimed the land where the wall runs from the Lime Kiln, but I don't recollect ^{that} ~~it~~ he said any thing particular about it.

J. Kapena, sworn, says he was born on the adjoining land to "Kalin" & has a Kuleana on that land now.

It received this land from the Kouhiki about the year 1842 & has held it in peace ever since.

Hoohila, Sworn, says he knows the land of claimant - it is as set forth by the last witness, whose testimony he confirms in full.

Mehula, Sworn, says he knows the place in dispute, it is called "Kaoa aopa". Keawe poole lived on the Lot from ancient times up to the time of his death. Keawe poole died when Kuakini was Governor of Oahu about 1832. Kahakualoa the daughter of Keawe poole lived on this lot up

to the year 1839. I have been living on Hawaii for more than 14 years. I returned last November. When Keawepoole was near his death, she sent Kaeo to fetch KeKauonohi to see her - when she came, Keawepoole said to her - You are our chief & here is your Kanaka (meaning his grandson Kaeo) you shall be over him & this lot. I was present at this conversation.

Pale, sworn, says he knows the lot in dispute. Kachukupahu, the husband of Keawepoole was the first occupant, - he died & then his wife lived on it up to her death. When Keawepoole was dying, she sent for KeKauonohi - when she came there Keawepoole said to her, I am about to die & I have sent for you to say that I leave my place to you.

Kahakualoa & Kaeo were both present and heard this speech of Keawepoole. After the death of ~~Kaeo~~^{Keawepoole} the lot was occupied by Hawaii & Hookeia. I saw Kahakualoa also living there after the death of her mother, and up to about 1834. I did not see Kaeo living there after 1834, but Hawaii & Hookeia who were put there by KeKauonohi continued to live there. Meehala was present at the conversation between Keawepoole & KeKauonohi.

Maikahi, sworn, says she knows the place in dispute. Witness was present at the time Heavepoolle made the verbal bequest of the lot to Kekauonohi. After that time Kahakualoa lived occasionally on this lot. Kekauonohi placed a man called Kawai on this lot to live under her. Kaeo did not live on this lot after the death of Heavepoolle to my knowledge.

J. P. Kalama, sworn says he knew G. Kaeo, from 1840 to the time his death.

When I knew him first he lived on Merchant street. About 1842 when Kekauonohi went to Kamae as Governess, G. Kaeo went with her in her suite. He went about with Kekauonohi until 1845, when she left Kamae & returned to live at Honolulu - & Kaeo lived in her house.

Kalaweannoke, sworn, says he knows this Kuleana. Claimant received this land from Kawaia, the Konoiki, in the time of Kinau, and held it in peace up to the time of his death in 1848, since which time his widow, Kailikoli, has held it.

Kalawaia, the Luana of the Konoiki, approves this claim.

This lot was anciently a waste place and was taken up by claimant in the time of Kiana & he has held possession of it ever since, without dispute.

K. Kapaahea, sworn, says he knows this House Lot, and confirms in full the testimony given by Kee-
Kapu.

N. 7713. M. Kekuanawa (Jr. & Kamamalu)
from p. 528. Counter the Govt.

Keoni Ana, sworn, presents a plan which he says was made by Order of the King in Council, in the year 1848, perhaps, and placed in my charge, as Minister of the Interior. The plan shows two rows of Lots laid out from the Beach seaward. The Government built the wall or Breakwater in the year 1847, I think. The Government claimed no more land as I understood the matter than what is shown on the plan. When the wall was built by the Government, no opposition was made to its erection by any private party. The wall was erected by the Government to prevent the Harbor from being filled up with the mud washed down by the Nuuanu River. When this wall was built the wall of the Loko called "Kauwa" was taken down and the size of the Loko reduced. After the wall was built, this plan was made by

the Govt and laid before the Privy Council, who resolved to sell the Lots as laid out, for the benefit of the Treasury. Two of the lots were accordingly disposed of with the approval of the Privy Council, to Louis Gravier. After that, a proposition was made in Privy Council to sell some of the Lots to a Steam Boat Company, but at the suggestion of Mr. Kekuanawa, the proposition was dropped. Kekuanawa advising the Council that they were disposing of the Government property too fast.

After the report of a Committee appointed by the Privy Council on the subject of the filling up of the Harbour, the Council resolved to remove the wall of the Loko called "Kawa", and Mr. Kekuanawa assented.

I do not know to whom the land really belonged. I have always seen this, that when the Government wanted a piece of land for their purposes, the Kauhiki, have always given their consent. At Pahi, who had charge of "Kalin", and Mr. Kekuanawa, who had charge of "Kaakaukukui" were both in Privy Council at the time referred to. I consider that the place where this wall is built belonged to the

Government previous to that time, because by Law the Papa Koa and the Harbor belongs to the Government. All the Chiefs were in Council at the time these things were transacted. The place where the wall is built is Papa Koa, perhaps, and perhaps.

Iona Kapena, sworn, says the names of the lands lying between the Wall of the Gov^t and the Loko called "Kawa", are "Kaakaukukui" and "Kaliu". I pointed out the boundary line between "Kaakaukukui" and "Kaliu" a few days ago to Messrs Lee and Robertson, the boundary has been well known to me ever since I was a boy. The Breakwater or wall is built ~~in~~ the land of "Kaakaukukui".

Mr. Kekuanooa, states that he never understood before that the Government meant to take this place now in dispute. I have heard the testimony of Mr. Young, who says the Gov^t took it. I gave my consent to the Gov^t to remove the wall of "Kawa", ^{to use the materials} but I did not intend that the Gov^t should take away any part of "Kaakaukukui".

No. 3195. Keekiaku.

Piapo, sworn, says he knows the Kuleana of Keekiaku, in "Kailua," Koolau-poko. It consists of one piece of land, partly Kalo and partly Kula lands. It is bounded Mankai by the Kula land of the Kouohiki, - On the Hanouke side by "Maunawili," - Manka by Kaimehameha's land, - On the Maunaloa side by Kinani.

Claimant received this land from Kinani about nine years ago and held it in peace up to the time of his death of Small Pox, last year. It is held at present by Palani claimant, father in law.

No. 11,229. Opunui

J. Kaeuwa, sworn, says he drew up the claim of Opunui in the year 1847, and carried it in to the Land Commission, for a House Lot in "Kaliki" & some pieces of land besides.

Keloke, sworn, says he knows the land of claimant, in "Kaliki," Oahu. It consists of a House Lot in "Kionawawana," & 3 Kalo patches, in "Maui," & 2 Kalo patches in "Maiani," & 1 patch in "Kaluopaleua".

The House lot is not now enclosed. It is bounded Manka, by the Kouohiki, - Honolulu side by the same, - the same on all the other sides.

The 3 patches in "Maui" are bounded Manka by the land of Wewewee, - On

Honolulu side by the land of Wailua, Makai by Heuweu, - Ewa side by the Gov^t land.

The 2 patches in "Makani" are bounded Mauka by Gov^t and Kalaupolu's land, Honolulu side by the Gov^t land, - Makai by Wailua's land, - on Ewa side by Heuweu's land.

The patch in "Kalaopalema" is bounded Mauka by the land of Hikeekee, - Honolulu side Paris land, Makai by the Kouohiki, - Ewa side by Kalohi's land.

Claimant's wife's ^{sister} ~~daughter~~ inherited this land from her first husband, Kawakamui, in the year 1839, and lived there till her death in 1848, when she left it to her sister, Kahau, the wife of Opunui. I know of no dispute to the claim of Opunui. I am the Luna of the Government who is Kouohiki of the above named land.

N^o 410. Kaanaana.

B. Namakeka, sworn, says he knows the Kuleana of Claimant in the Mⁱ of "Kaala", Honolulu Aina. It consists of 5 Kalo patches and a House Lot.

The Kalo patches are bounded on the Ewa side by my land, - Makai the same, - Waikiki side by a water course, - Mauka by my land.

The House Lot is bounded on Makai side by Keaka's land, - Ewa side by a Road, - Mauka by Kaapa's land, - Waikiki side by my land.

He received this land from me in the year 1839, and he has held it in peace ever since. I am the Koushiki of that land.

17th July 1852.

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N. 6512.

Aki.

Kawakama, sworn, says he knows the Kuleana of Aki, in Mookanae, Kaliki. It consists of a House Lot and some Kalo patches.

The House Lot is not enclosed. There is a House on it occupied by Kaholokai, son of Aki. It is bounded Mookanae by the Kono-
hiki's land, - Honolulu side the same, - Makai and Ewa sides by the same. The Kalo patches are partly walelele. Some of them are cultivated by a man named Hilo, for Kaholokai.

Aki received this land from Mookama in the life time of Kamehameha, before the year 1843, and occupied the same up to the time of his death in 1848.

Hilo, sworn, says he knows this Kuleana. Five of the Kalo patches are walelele. Hilo cultivates the other patches for Kaholokai. I have known the place for 14 years, & Aki was living then before my time. Aki had also a piece of Kuleana land for cultivation.

No. 8207.

Haupee.

Disp. by Haaalelea.

Keola, sworn, says he knows the 2 Kalo patches, claimed by Haupee, in "Kalawahine". I was made a Luma on this land in the year 1845 and acted as such till 1850, during which time Haupee did not go to the labor days of the Koushiki. During ^{part of} this time the food raised in the patches was divided between Haupee and KeKauonohi.

Maanel, sworn, says he knows these two patches. I and my brother cultivated these two patches under KeKauonohi in the time of Keekini. We divided the produce with the Koushiki. After the patches were taken away from us they were given to the father of Haupee, to hold under Kaniku.

This Kanika did not work for the Koushiki on the usual labor days, and the food he raised in these patches was divided equally between him and the Koushiki.

Haupee has held these patches since the death of his father. I cannot ^{now} say precisely how long. I know that about the year 1850, Haupee divided the food with KeKauonohi.

I heard KeKauonohi forbid Kaniku & the father of Haupee to put in any claim for these two patches, as she considered them her property.

11 August 1854.

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N^o 9549. Kāholomōkū.

Pahiha, sworn, says he knows the kuleana of Kāholomōkū, in "Kikūluāea", near Honolulu. It consists of one fish and some salt pans, in one piece. It is bounded, Mauka by M. Kekuanaʻoa, - on Waikiki side by the Kouohiki, - Makai by the same, - Honolulu side by the same. It formerly belonged to Hanau, elder brother of Kāholomōkū, who received it from Kolan in the life time of Kamae. After Hanau died the place fell to the present claimant, who has held it ever since.

Cross Ex^t. - The salt pans claimed by Kāholomōkū were made by ~~him~~^{Paihi}, ~~brother~~. The salt was divided with M. Bingham the Kouohiki.

P. Maone, sworn, says he went with Kāholomōkū and M. Clark the present Kouohiki, last month, to the place in question, when the parties agreed to the size of this claim, viz; the fish pond and four salt pans lying on the Waikiki side of the pond.

21th Aug. 1854.

No. 1164. Hika.

Claimant appeared in person & stated that the land claimed by him in "Kalawahine", belongs properly to Kaanakaohala, No. 795, to whom it has been awarded.

No. 1615. Keoni.

Kane, sworn, says he knows the Kuleana of Keoni, in "Aala", Honolulu Aina. It consists of a House Lot, - 2 fish ponds, - and one acre of Kalo land.

The House site is not enclosed. there is one house on it belonging to claimant.

The 2 fish ponds form one piece. - Bounded Mauka by the land of Pooa, - Hanalei side by the Konoehiki, - Makai by the same, - Ewa side by "Koinin".

The Kalo land is mauka, & is bounded Mauka by the Konoehiki, - Makiki side by the same, - Makai & Ewa sides by the same.

There are ten patches in this piece. two only of which are planted at this time. there is a piece of Kuka also adjoining the Kalo land, which is partially under cultivation.

Claimant got these several pieces from me in 1846, when I was Luna of the land. He went to sea in 1848, when he paid me \$4.50 for

the labor days of the Konoheki. I gave the money to Kalaimokee. Keoni returned from sea in 1849 & has held the land ever since. Apua is the present Luma of the land.

Apua, sworn, says he is a Luma on this land under Pihalele. He does not know that Keoni has any Kuleana on "Aala".

Paoao, sworn, says Keoni was never a fixed resident of "Aala," he is a sea faring man. Kame the elder brother of Keoni, is and has been the occupant of the land claimed by Keoni. Kame was a Luma under the Konoheki some years ago, but is not now a Luma. The house which stands on the land belongs to Kame.

25, Aug^r 1854.N^o. 3200. John.

Maakini, sworn, says I am the owner of the Kouohiki on the land where this claim is situated. The claim of John consists of six kalo patches in one piece, ^{si Kapalama} bounded, Maunaka by the Kouohiki, - On the Waikiki side by Kio, - Makai by the Kouohiki, - Ewa side by a stone wall. The claimant got these patches from me about 1846 or 7, and has held it since without dispute. This was my own Kikapai before I gave it to claimant, and the Kouohiki has no objection to make to this claim.

N^o. 1406. HeKiawala.

Keasani, sworn, says she is the widow of claimant who died of the small pox last year. My late husband relinquished his claim to land in "Puniki," Kapalama, about 1850.

N^o. 1511. Kahiwa.

This claim is rejected.

28 August 1854.

No 8399. Kakaku.

Keawe, sworn, says he knows the Kuleana of Kakaku, in Kapalama, Oahu. It consists of two Kalo patches and a piece of an Auwai, in 3 distinct pieces. The first patch is bounded Manka by the land of Malaekoa, - Waikiki side by Makahuki, - Makai by Palua, - Ewa side by watercourse. The second patch is bounded Manka by a watercourse, - Waikiki side by Kuamui, - Makai by Keawe, - Ewa side by the Kouohiki. The claimant received these patches from Kaikeoewa in ancient times, and held the same without dispute till he died about 1848. I am a Luman on this land under the present Kouohiki, M. Kekuanana, and I know this claim to be a good one.

Keawe, sworn, says the above claimants all died last year, of the small pox. None of them have any legal Representatives left, and their lands have been taken by the Kouohiki.

Keawe, sworn, says he knows the Kulana of Nakoa, in Kapalama, Oahu. It consists of two Kalo patches and part of an auwai adjoining, forming two pieces, also a House lot, not enclosed. Nakoa received these two patches from Kaikeewa in the life time of Kivanu.

The first patch is bounded Manka by Napatis land, - On Waikiki side by a river, - On the Ewa side by the Kula of the Kowahiki.

The second patch is bounded, Manka by land of Kua, - On Waikiki side by the same,

Makai by Naaihele, - On Ewa side by a watercourse. There is a house on the House lot, which is occupied by Nakiiahale the brother of Nakoa, who held this land in peace till the time of his death, some years ago. It is the House site of Hooliliamaun, about the year 1840. Witness is the Luma of this land under Kekuanana.

No 8388. Kahope.

Naaihele, sworn, says he knows the Kuleana of Kahope, in Kapalama, Oahu. It consists of three Kalo patches in one piece, bounded Maunaka, by the land of the Koushiki, - On Waikiki side by a stream, - Makai + Ewa side by the Koushiki. Blainant received this land from Kila about the year 1845, and has held it since in peace. Kila received the land from Kaike-owa in ancient times.

Iona, sworn, says he knows the land of Kahope, and confirms in full the testimony of Naaihele.

N^o 3144. Ku. (Oka in Index).

Keawe, sworn, says he knows the Kuleana of Ku (deceased) in Kapalama, Oahu. It consists of two kalo patches in one piece, and a fish pond in another piece, & a House site besides.

The two patches are bounded Mauka, by the land of Makahuki, - Waikiki side by Mutkis, - Makai by Alua's, - Ewa side by the same.

The fish pond is bounded, Mauka, by the land of Kalamui, - Waikiki side by Nanihela's, - Makai by J. P. Koi's, - Ewa side by the same.

The House site is not enclosed.

Ku received the two kalo patches from Kaikeewa in ancient times, as also the fish pond, and held them in peace up to the time of his death in 1848. His son, Noah, has possession of the Kuleana now.

I saw the Luna of this land under M. Kekuanana.

N^o 3181. Hawaii.

Keameo, sworn, says she is the only surviving relative of Kawai, and she wishes to withdraw this claim put in by her grandfather, as the best part of it has been already awarded to her husband, Pahua,

N^o 1322. Alua.

Keawe, swson, says he knows the Kuleana of Alua, (deceased) in Kapalama, Oahu. It consists of two Kalo patches in distinct pieces, and a House site, not enclosed.

The first patch is bounded Manka, by the land of Ku, - Wai Kiki side by Keawe's, - Makai by the Kouhiki, Ewa side by Nakoas.

The second patch is bounded Makai, by Nakoas, - Ewa side by a stream, - Manka by Kahaku's, - the Wai Kiki side by Ku.

Claimant received these patches from Kekuanaoa about 12 years ago, and held them in peace up to the time of his death, last year. His daughter Karolina is his heir.

I am the Lema of this land under Kekuanaoa.

N^o 1714. Keleho.

S. P. Kalama, says he knows the Kuleana of Keleho (deceased) in "Kapiwai", Honolulu Aina. It is a just claim, and belongs now to the children of Keleho.

Kikei, sworn, says she knows the Loi or Loko in dispute - it is called "Kapakei". I know the patch from ancient times - In the time of Pōke, the Luma of this land was Pūaa. He made this Loko by the labor of the people on the land. After Pūaa, then Namauu was Luma of this land under Kamehameha III, so up to the Division of 1848, when "Kahookane" was given to the King & Namauu ceased to have any right there. While Namauu was Luma of the land, this Loi was cultivated by his man or men. Don't know who eat the food. The man who planted the Loi under Namauu is dead, his name was Mohoula. Namauu took the food himself. "Kahookane" has belonged to the King from ancient times.

Kemakee, sworn, says she knows this Loko, I am a stranger on that land but I have heard that this patch belonged to the King. "Kahookane" belonged to the King from ancient times. I lived on "Kahookane" while Namauu was Luma of it. During that time this Loi was planted for Namauu's wife (Kapoli) by a man called Mohoula. Kapoli reaped the fruit of it. It was planted

for Kapolei at one time by a man called Kioua. Mookoula had begun to cultivate this Lei for Kapolei before the death of Kinan (1839). Kioua had done cultivating this patch before the present disputes about the land up there. When Naimann died (1848) this patch was in cultivation by a man called Kahiola, for Kapolei. Mookoula was a Luna of "Kahookane" under Naimann & had the control of all the Kanakas. He planted this Loko with the poalima labor of the Land. When Kioua held this Loko he cultivated it with his own labor, not with the poalima days. He got the Loko when Kinan was sick before his death. After him Kahiola held this Loko, but I do not know certainly whether he planted it himself or with the poalima labor. He was Luna of "Kahookane".

N^o 8510. Chas W. Vincent.

Claimant offers in evidence a Deed of conveyance of this lot from Isaac Montgomery & wife, to the claimant, dated 22^d April 1843, & recorded in our Books at Vol 3. For Register page 23.

Isaac Montgomery, sworn, says the Deed now presented by the claimant is correct. The lot in question was occupied and held by my wife and her Aunt, Kama-kaka deceased, at the time I arrived in Honolulu in July 1838. From which time the lot was held by my wife up to the time we sold it to the present claimant. Never heard of any dispute to her title.

P. F. Manini, sworn, says he knows the lot claimed by Vincent. It belonged anciently to the ancestors of Mr Montgomery, from whom it descended after them, and he held undisputed possession of it up to the time they sold it to Vincent in 1843.

N^o. 247. C. Kanaina
 vs W. C. Lunalilo.

This is a part of the land claimed under the above N^o. for W. C. Lunalilo & situated on Fort Street, Honolulu.

Kaai, sworn, says he knows this Lot on Fort Street. It formerly formed a part of the same Lot now occupied by the Hudson's Bay Company. It sold to the late M^r. French, some years ago. The shoe store of J. H. Wood stands on this Lot. "Houkaupuu" was the ancient name of this Lot, when entire, and it belonged to M^r. Kekaulaohi, the mother of W. C. Lunalilo.

Pahale ia Kanaina.

In the ili of "Pohua", Honolulu.

Kaai, sworn, knows this Lot, on the makai side of King Street in Honolulu. It is bounded Maunaka by King Street, - Waikiki side by M^r. Kekuanawa & Kelewailehua, - Makai, Kelewailehua and Kaupena-Ewa side by School / Free School / Lane.

In ancient times this Lot belonged to M^r. Kekaulaohi, the mother of W. C. Lunalilo. It was formerly occupied by Kanaina, under the Lord of the land. It is at present occupied by Kiini and others under Lunalilo.

Kapua, sworn, says he knows the Lot claimed for W. C. Lunalilo at "Ka Kaako", Honolulu. It is a House Lot, and is occupied by myself and wife. It is bounded, Maunaka by Laamai Kahiki, - Waikiki side by the Loko called "Kaimukauaka", - Makai by V. Kamamalu, - Ewa side by ~~the~~ the sea side & Laamai Kahiki.

I live there under W. C. Lunalilo, to whose mother, M. Kekaulohi it formerly belonged as a fishing place.

Disp^d by the Government.

The Award made to this claimant on the 4th of May last, having been objected to by the Government as a counter claimant, Ali has returned it in order that the claim may be re-adjudicated by the Board.

Due notice was sent to the Home Office of the time for hearing but no one appeared on behalf of the Government.

J. Kaunwai, sworn - says, on examining the plan of Ali's claim, made by C. Bailey, that the portion of the land lying manuka of the road is clear to him as belonging to Ali, but the portion lying makai of the road is not clear to his mind. Does not know that Ali has occupied the makai part either by cultivation or for grazing purposes. It is very stony land. The manuka part of the land is good and has been used by Ali in various ways, since he got it from Kamanawa, a Chief, over 20 years ago. When I was Luma Auburn of the District about 1830. to 40 the taxes for this land were paid by Ali. I was Koushiki of these lands up to the Division of 1848, and I never knew of any dispute about Ali's title up to

that time. I do not know the boundaries between the several lands called "Onaopio", but I do know that Ali has held the land he claims manuka of the road. The makai part of the land has not been occupied by any one in particular to my knowledge, but the mode of cultivation in that region is, to plant a few years in the manuka land & then to plant for a while in the makai land, as is now being done on the same land claimed by Ali. The whole of the land claimed by Ali, both manuka & makai of the road, is called "Onaopio".

Kuikelani, sworn, says, he knows the land claimed by Ali. I was ~~tax~~ have been Tax Officer of the District since 1841, and during that time Ali has paid the taxes for the land called Onaopio 1^{th} , 2^{nd} , 3^{rd} & 4^{th} , which are now claimed by him. I do not know how long Ali has occupied this land, but I know that since 1841 he has held & cultivated the land & grazed his cattle on it, and lived on it, without dispute from any one.

Joane Ii, sworn, I am not well acquainted with the land claimed by Ali, but I heard about the year 1842, that this land had been given to him by Kamauawa. In 1851 I visited the place and found him in possession of it. I do not know how

many Omiaspiros belong to him.

(On considering the above testimony the Commissioners ordered the Award to be re-delivered to Ali, subject of course to Appeal).
